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**I. Meeting with deputations**  
(LC Paper Nos. CB(2)1419/00-01; 1445/00-01 and 1453/00-01)

The Chairman welcomed the representatives of the various organizations and individual persons to the meeting. He said that the written submissions received by the Bills Committee had been circulated to members before the meeting. He invited each of the deputations to make a brief oral presentation on the submissions.

2. A summary of the views of the deputations was attached in the Appendix.

3. The Chairman invited questions from members of the Bills Committee. The major issues discussed were summarized in the following paragraphs.

Issues raised by members

*Election of the Chief Executive by universal suffrage*

4. Ms Emily LAU expressed the view that the undemocratic way of election of the Chief Executive (CE) by an Election Committee (EC) comprising 800 members had deprived the vast majority of Hong Kong people the right to select CE. She said that EC members, the majority of whom were elected by only a fraction of the total population, i.e. those in the relevant subsectors, could in no way represent all the people in Hong Kong in the selection of CE. She sought the deputations' views on whether the "small circle" type of election of CE could serve the best interests of Hong Kong.

5. Ms Emily LAU further said that there was wide discontent in the community about ineffectual governance and leadership in Hong Kong. This arose from the fact that the incumbent CE was not popularly elected, and that the public demand had been neglected. Government policies were perceived to be only benefiting certain classes of the community such as the business sector and the rich people, rather than protecting the interests of the general public. She pointed out that according to the results of a substantive number of opinion polls, more than 70% of the respondents favoured election of CE by universal suffrage.

6. Mr LAW King-shing and Mr HO King-on said that the Basic Law had already prescribed a method for the selection of CE, i.e. selection of CE by universal suffrage should proceed in the light of the actual situation of Hong Kong and in accordance with the principle of gradual and orderly progress. They said that they did not object to selection of CE by universal suffrage, but that it should be achieved in accordance with the requirement stated in the Basic Law.

7. Mr LAW King-shing added that the constitutional development in Hong Kong progressed well since the reunification, in the direction as prescribed under the Basic Law. He said that at present, matters which bogged the minds of most Hong Kong people were economical issues affecting the livelihood of the general public, rather than political or constitutional issues. To step up the process of political development could add to the instability of Hong Kong. He further said that according to the experience of some Asian countries, universal suffrage for the election of the political leader could be a contributing factor to political instability. He saw no pressing need to proceed to universal suffrage for the election of CE at this moment in time.

8. Mr WAN Lam said that there was no guarantee that direct election of CE could give Hong Kong people a better life.

9. Mr CHOY Shek-chung said that it was not fair to attribute the problems which Hong Kong now faced to the personal responsibility of CE. He considered that Hong Kong had been given more democracy after the reunification than in the colonial days. He said that to advance the pace of democratization ahead of that laid down in the Basic Law might lead to consequences undesirable to the stability of Hong Kong.

10. Referring to the issue of opinion polls, Ms Janet HUI Po-chun said that the results of the polls might not have fully reflected the opinion of the respondents. While most people would favour the ultimate goal of election of CE by universal suffrage, there could be different views as to when it should come about. The polls might not have taken the time element into consideration.

11. Mr NG Leung-sing pointed out that under the Basic Law, all Members of the Legislative Council (LegCo) were ex-officio members of EC. At present, 24 LegCo Members were returned by direct elections in the geographical constituencies. Hence, it was not a matter of whether or not there was direct representation in the EC membership, but a matter of degree of direct representation.

12. Mr LEUNG Fu-wah said that EC members returned by subsector elections represented different interests of the community, including that of the grass-root level and labour groups.

13. Mr KWAN Hong-chun said that because the overwhelming majority of EC members were not returned by direct election, he failed to see how the 800 EC members could be representative of the people of Hong Kong.

14. Miss Grace YUEN said that the people in Hong Kong should have the inalienable right to select their own CE. She added that both she and Miss Kitty CHU had not yet reached the voting age of 18 by 2002 and hence not eligible to vote as such. However, they felt compelled to come out and state their views.

*Winning candidate to declare not a member of political party*

15. Mr Martin LEE said that he could not see the rationale for the requirement in clause 32 of the Bill that a successful candidate who was a member of a political party had to resign from his political party and undertake that he would not become a member of any political party or be bound by the discipline of any political party during his term of office. In his view, the presumption that a CE with political party background would not be able to

perform his functions and duties to protect the best interests of Hong Kong was biased and illogical. He said that in the end, the people would be able to judge for themselves whether their best interests were served. Ms Cyd HO and Dr YEUNG Sum expressed similar views.

16. Ms Emily LAU said that a CE with no political party background did not necessarily mean that the CE would be free from being influenced by sectoral interests. She said that the crucial issue was how to ensure that CE would not be acting in such a way as to be yielding to undue influences, including pressures from the big business corporations and the like. To single out the issue of political party alone might cause misunderstanding to the people.

17. Mr LAW King-shing said that he did not think that the requirement in clause 32 was necessary.

18. Mr TSANG Kin-shing said that provided that CE was elected under a truly democratic system, a CE with political party background could be accepted.

19. Mr CHAN Sze-chung said that CE must be impartial and should take into account the overall interests of Hong Kong when discharging his duties. A CE who was perceived to be influenced by partisan interests would not be beneficial to the overall interests of Hong Kong.

20. Ms WONG Mo-tai said that at present, there was no single political party which could command the majority support of the community. She was in favour of the requirement specified in clause 32 of the Bill.

#### Withdrawal of candidature

#### Polling date

21. Mr Andrew WONG said that he supported the views stated in the submission from the Foochow Association Ltd, namely -

- (a) Reference should be made to the existing Legislative Council Ordinance, i.e. candidates were not allowed to withdraw from the election after the close of nominations; and
- (b) Polling date should fall on a day within a period of not less than one month and not more than three months before a vacancy in the office of CE arose.

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22. Mr CHAN Sze-chung opined that the polling date should be fixed on a day at least six months before a vacancy arose in order to allow sufficient time for transitional arrangements.

#### Appointment and removal of CE

23. Mr KWAN Hong-chun opined that a CE who was democratically elected by the people should not be subject to the ultimate appointment or removal by a separate authority.

## **II. Date of next meeting**

24. The Chairman reminded members that another meeting would be held on 8 May 2001 at 8:30 am to receive deputations on the Bill.

Adm 25. Deputy Secretary for Constitutional Affairs said that the Administration would consider the deputations' views and give a written response in due course.
