Requests for Additional Information

I refer to the minutes of the meeting of the LegCo Subcommittee on review of the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance Scheme held on 8 April, wherein the Administration was requested to provide additional information. The requested additional information is as follows –

- (a) With reference to para 18 of the minutes, there were 12 CSSA applications either approved or rejected for waiver of residence requirement about which Senior Social Security Officers had conferred with their senior officers during the period from 1 January 2004 to 28 February 2005. Of them, seven were subsequently approved and five rejected.
- (b) With reference to para 26 of the minutes, the reasons for approving the 198 applications and rejecting the 17 applications involving persons unable to meet the seven-year residence requirement during the period from 1 January 2004 to 28 February 2005 are provided in tables (a) and (b) of the Appendix. Tables (c) and (d) in the Appendix also provide the breakdown of these applications by case nature.

(c) With reference to para 27 of the minutes, of the 2 766 persons aged below 18 with less than one-year's residence in Hong Kong who were granted CSSA during the period from 1 January 2004 to 31 December 2004, 1 472 (53%) were female. Other information relating to the age profile and a breakdown of the persons by case nature is given at tables (e) and (f) in the Appendix.

No information is available concerning whether any parents of the 2 766 persons relied on their children's CSSA payments for their livelihood because they did not meet the seven-year residence requirement for CSSA.
