#### I. Meeting with the Administration

The Bills Committee discussed with the Administration the updated draft Code of Practice (LC Paper No. CB(2)2872/05-06(01)) which was tabled at the meeting (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

2. The Bills Committee requested the Administration -

Footnotes 3 and 9

- (a) to consider moving the contents of footnote 3 and footnote 9 to the main body of the Code of Practice;
- (b) to consider rephrasing the contents of footnote 3 in the form of directives as with footnote 9, rather than as quotations from the speech to be made

by the Secretary for Security at the resumption of the Second Reading debate on the Bill;

Paragraph 12 – Definition of "private information"

(c) to consider amending "may include activities of a professional or business nature" in the definition of "private information" along the lines of "include activities of a professional or business nature";

## Paragraph 13 – Reasonable expectation of privacy

(d) to consider deleting the last sentence of paragraph 13, i.e. "An individual does not have a subjective expectation of privacy if he has been put on notice that his activities in a specified area would be watched by others for legitimate purpose";

Paragraphs 16 to 22- Aural surveillance and optical surveillance

- (e) to consider amending the subheading "Aural surveillance" along the lines of "Surveillance using listening devices";
- (f) to consider deleting the words "with no one else sitting or standing nearby" in paragraph 17;
- (g) to consider adding to the last sentence in paragraph 17 that in cases where law enforcement officers intentionally approached persons having dinner in a restaurant with the purpose of listening to their conversation with the use of a surveillance device, applications for prescribed authorisation should be made;
- (h) to consider deleting words "at the backstage" in paragraph 19;
- to consider amending paragraphs 18 and 22 along the lines that a person in private premises might not have a reasonable expectation of privacy in respect of his spoken words/activities if such spoken words/activities could be heard/seen by a person without the aid of a device in a public place or in a place where he had the right to be there;

Paragraph 37 – Public security

- (j) to consider adding in paragraph 37 some examples of threats which had an indirect impact on Hong Kong's public security;
- (k) to consider stating explicitly in paragraph 37 that the phrase "carried on by violent means" did not include minor scuffles during demonstrations

or other public gatherings;

### Paragraph 39 – Proportionality test

 to consider deleting the last sentence of paragraph 39, i.e. "The operation will not be proportionate if it is excessive in the circumstances of the case or if the information could reasonably be obtained by other less intrusive means.";

## <u>Paragraph 45 – Information to be provided in an application for prescribed</u> <u>authorisation</u>

 (m) to consider bringing home to law enforcement officers during training/briefings that all relevant information should be included in an application for prescribed authorisation, including information which might undermine the application;

#### Annexes to of Code of Practice

(n) to consider, in designing the electronic versions of the forms at the Annex, specifying the fields for mandatory input, where applicable; and

### Full set of Code of Practice

(o) to provide a full set of the updated Code of Practice, in both Chinese and English, to members when available.

#### II. Any other business

#### Giving notice for moving Committee Stage amendments

3. <u>The Chairman</u> said that the requisite period for giving notice of moving Committee Stage amendments (CSAs) to a bill (i.e. not less than 7 clear days before the day on which the bill was to be considered in committee) under Rule 57(2) of the Rules of Procedure might not be adequate to deal with situations where a large number of CSAs had been proposed. <u>Ms Emily LAU and Mr James TO</u> shared the Chairman's view. <u>Mr James TO</u> said that the issue could be looked into by the Committee on Rules of Procedure.

4. <u>The Chairman</u> thanked members, the Administration, and the Secretariat staff for their assistance in the scrutiny work.
