Question: Based on the decrease in the actual number of investigations completed (from 2,818 in 2004 to 2,731 in 2005), and also the decrease in the number of persons prosecuted (from 417 in 2004 to 348 in 2005) and persons convicted (from 297 in 2004 to 263 in 2005), why is there an increase of \$22.9 million over the 2006-07 Estimate over the Revised Estimate

of 2005-06?

<u>Asked by</u>: Hon TAM Heung-man

Reply: Under Programme 2 on Operations, there is an increase in provision of \$22.9 million for 2006-07 over the revised estimate for 2005-06. The increase is mainly attributed to the salary requirement for the filling of vacancies, increments for staff and 13 newly created posts to enhance the ICAC's financial investigation capability, and firearms, physical fitness and self-defence training. The increase in provision is to meet ICAC's actual operational requirements.

ICAC's law enforcement work covers many aspects. Apart from investigations and prosecutions, we also conduct intelligence collection and analysis. In fighting corruption, we deploy proactive strategy which has proved effective in preventing and deterring corruption. ICAC's law enforcement workload, therefore, cannot be measured solely by the number of investigation cases completed and the number of persons prosecuted and convicted. Given the increasing use of advanced information technology and financial techniques by offenders to conceal crimes and evidences in recent years, and the facilitation of the transfer of funds due to globalisation of economic activities, corruption cases are fast gaining in complexity. These coupled with the high threshold required by the courts in the admissibility of evidence have added to the difficulty of and the time and manpower resources required for our investigation work.

The reduction in the number of persons prosecuted and convicted is mainly due to the decrease in the number of cases involving multiple defendants (defined as 10 persons or more) in 2005, with only 2 cases involving 33 persons. Compared with six cases involving multiple defendants totalling 81 persons in 2004, there is a drop of 48 persons.

Reply: The ICAC constantly reviews its operational efficacy and use of resources with a view to seeking improvements thereby ensuring effectiveness and professionalism in operational work. In the past few years, we have conducted reviews of our organisational structure, manpower requirements and work procedures. We have also conducted a full review of our standing orders on working practices to enhance supervision and improve the quality of investigations. These reviews have resulted in organisational re-structuring, manpower re-deployment, and streamlining of work procedures to ensure the efficiency and effectiveness of frontline operations. In addition, we have also examined the training requirements of investigators and developed new plans that would intensify the professional training for these officers with a view to strengthening their overall investigating capability.

The ICAC will conduct reviews as appropriate after its operations in order to ascertain the efficacy of its work and to timely surface areas that require improvement. These will provide reference for later operations work.
