**Aviation, Logistics and Port development**

**1. Logistics Development**

(a) Lantau Logistics Park (LLP)

Members have expressed concern on the development of LLP during the policy briefing by the Secretary for Economic Development and Labour on 23 October 2006. The Administration plans to brief members on the findings of the feasibility study and other relevant consideration for the development of the proposed LLP.

**2. Aviation services**

(a) Extension of aviation network to the Mainland

The Administration conducts regular review of the Mainland/HKSAR Air Services Arrangement in consultation with the General Administration of Civil Aviation of China (CAAC) with a view to providing opportunities for Hong Kong and Mainland airlines to increase service and add new routes. Significant progress was made in the last three years and the results were announced publicly.

(b) "Co-location" of immigration and customs facilities at Hong Kong International Airport

In order to enhance the competitiveness of the Hong Kong International Airport, views had been expressed that the Government should liaise with the Central People's Government and the relevant authorities with a view to implementing "co-location" of immigration and customs facilities at Hong Kong International Airport.

At the Panel meeting on 24 January 2005, the Administration advised that co-location of immigration and customs facilities at cross-boundary control points involved complex legal and jurisdiction issues. There was no plan to provide co-location of immigration and customs facilities at SkyPlaza.

(c) Airspace management within Pearl River Delta

Proposed by Hon Howard YOUNG on 24 April 2006.

The Administration has been working closely with the Mainland and Macao air traffic control authorities to rationalize and optimize the efficient use of the Pearl River Delta airspace. The Panel will be kept informed of progress from time to time.

**3. Operation of Hong Kong Disneyland**

The item was last discussed at the meetings on 28 November 2005 and 27 February 2006. Hon Fred LI proposed in his letter dated 14 September 2006 (LC Paper No CB(1)8/06-07(03)) that the Panel should monitor the theme park's operation and performance with a view to facilitating its future development. Members agreed at the meeting on 12 October 2006 to schedule the item for discussion at the meeting on 21 December 2006.

**4. Redevelopment of Ocean Park**

The Panel has considered the proposed funding arrangement for Ocean Park's redevelopment plans and complementary public works on sewerage upgrading at its meeting on 28 November 2005 and 24 April 2006 respectively. Hon WONG Ting-kwong proposed and members agreed that the Panel should continue to monitor the future development of the theme park.

**5. Development of golf courses and spa facilities**

The Administration was requested to brief the Panel on the development of golf courses and spa facilities in Hong Kong.

The Administration has commissioned a Consultancy Study on the Development of Spa and Resort Facilities including golf facilities to identify the potential of developing world class spa and resort facilities in Hong Kong and identify issues that developers need to focus and resolve in developing such facilities. The study has been completed and major findings of the study have been uploaded to Tourism Commission's website since April 2006 for public's information. The study concludes that market demand will be the driving force for such development and that it is for the private sector to take the lead while the Government should play a facilitating role.

**6. Tackling malpractices by unscrupulous traders**

The Complaints Divisions has referred a complaint from a member of the public on unscrupulous selling practices relating to overseas resorts schemes to the Panel for consideration.

According to the Administration, issues arising from the complaint have been referred to the Consumer Council for appropriate follow-up action.
