## Re: Hong Kong Racehorse Owners Association's submission on Hong Kong Jockey Club's proposals

Dear Sir/Madam,

The Hong Kong Racehorse Owners Association Limited (HKROA) was established in 1978 with the main objective of enhancing the interests of racehorse Owners in Hong Kong on all aspects of horse ownership including the buying, selling, racing and breeding of horse. At present, we have over 650 members, or over 60% of racehorse owners in Hong Kong.

Reviewing the development of horseracing industry over the past decades, HKROA believes that the existing betting duty arrangements should be modernised to cope with the changing business environment. We have expressed similar views in our submission to Legco a few years ago on the *Betting Duty (Amendment) Bill 2006*.

The abovementioned bill was passed eventually by legislators in July 2006 but some crucial changes in the original proposal failed to get approval from Government and Legco. For instance, the proposals back in 2006 to add five extra race meetings per year and a few more simulcasts of overseas races on non race days were put on hold. These proposals were part of an overall plan to arrest the decline in racing turnover and revenue in Hong Kong.

The implementation of an incomplete plan together with the increasingly aggressive competition from legal and illegal gambling in the last three years have eventually brought about the first ever operating loss for the Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC) in its horse racing business.

A recent study also revealed that Hong Kong residents spent HK\$18-25 billion in 2007/08 in Macau casinos, or nearly five times that of a decade ago. Other upcoming casinos in Asian regions include those be built in Taiwan and Singapore.

These developments alone are worrying not to mention the devastating impact brought about by the financial tsunami.

Taking into account all the circumstances, we wish to urge the Government and members of the Legislative Council to take steps to complete the betting duty reform which were proposed back in 2006 to ensure that local racing can continue to be sustainable.

Moreover, we would like to call upon the Government to look into the activities of casino junkets which are becoming extremely widespread and aggressive in Hong Kong. Although some critics suggested that those who engaged in horse race betting would not have much interests to go gaming in Macau, these junkets have in fact aimed at luring away high-value bettors from Hong Kong to bet in Macau, and members of our Association are amongst their main targets. In fact, when Hong Kong racing season is in its summer recess, some horse owners were approached by "representatives" from various casinos in Macau, who would typically provide attractively-priced holiday package to lure us to go over to Macau to gamble. This is clear evidence of the prevalence of the aggressive marketing of casino operations from Macau. Our Association has concerns about the legitimacy of these activities as they amount to explicit marketing of gambling.

As racehorse Owners, we have invested in excess of 1 billion HK dollars for over 1,000 horses in Hong Kong, but the opportunities in starting these horses are very limited to approximately once per month. For each race meeting, at approximate 70% of our horses get the chance to run and the remaining 30% will be balloted out but Owners still have to pay same training fee without getting any prize money. The additional five race meetings would definitely help to ease this traffic jam situation and give Owners a fairer chance of getting their investment return. Without continuous support from Owners, Hong Kong racing industry will decline and hence, tax revenue to government will decline.

We, racehorse Owners, always view racing as a sporting activity. In fact, the vast majority of Owners who attend races are not there just for the sake of betting. Many of us view it as an occasion for social gathering and business networking with our business partners, friends or families. We therefore do not agree with the view that the five additional racedays will result in the promotion of gambling, or will have adverse impact on our younger generation. We would also like to let you know that all advanced racing jurisdictions around the world such as UK, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, US, Canada and France don't have summer breaks or winter breaks in racing.

Our Association would humbly request the Home Affairs Panel to take into account our views in your deliberation of the Jockey Club's proposals.
