The share of Gross Domestic Product for vocational education has dropped from 0.14% in 2004-05 to 0.11%. What are the reasons for the decrease?

Reply :

The expenditure on vocational education (rounded to the nearest \$5 million) and its share of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) from 2004-05 to 2008-09 are as follows:

The decrease in expenditure on vocational education during 2004-05 to 2006-07 was mainly due to the implementation of productivity enhancement measures by the Vocational Training Council (VTC). The expenditure started to increase in 2007-08 and 2008-09 mainly because of the impact of the 2007 and 2008 civil service pay rise as well as the implementation of new initiatives, such as implementing free full-time vocational education programmes for secondary 3 school leavers with effect from the 2008/09 academic year and the whole person development programmes for VTC's full-time students.

While the expenditure on vocational education has been increasing in the last two years, the GDP has been on a sharp rise as a result of the strong economic growth during the same period. This has led to the reduction in its share of GDP.

Question : Under the contracting out of janitor services, whether the Administration would require service providers to set minimum wage for their staff? If 'yes', what is the level of the minimum wage? If no, what is the reason?

Reply :

All government schools have to comply with the Government's requirements on service contracts which involve the employment of non-skilled workers. Specifically, there is a provision in the tendering conditions stipulating that a tender offer shall not be considered if the monthly wages offered to non-skilled workers by the tenderer are less than the average monthly wages for the relevant industry/occupation as indicated in the latest Quarterly Report on Wages and Payroll Statistics issued by the Census and Statistics Department.

Is there a plan to increase the percentage of part-time programmes recognized under QF? If yes, what are the details?

Reply :

Part-time Higher Diploma, Diploma, and Certificate courses offered by VTC are recognized under QF and placed in the Qualifications Register. As part of its ongoing course rationalization exercise to align with the new senior secondary academic structure and QF, VTC aims to have as many courses recognized under QF as possible. At present, VTC is planning for the accreditation of its part-time Professional Diploma and Professional Certificate courses by the Hong Kong Council for Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications in 2010.

Reply :

The Government is currently operating the Kindergarten and Child Care Centre Fee Remission Scheme (KCFRS) which aims at providing fee remission to needy children attending kindergarten (KG) classes at three assistance levels, namely 50%, 75% and 100% fee remission. The number of KG children who benefitted from KCFRS, the fee remission amount involved and the total number of Private Independent (PI) KGs and Non-profit-making (NPM) KGs, including all KGs and kindergarten-cum-child care centres, in the 2007/08 and 2008/09 school years are as follows:

Note 1: Since the fee subsidy from the Pre-primary Education Voucher Scheme (PEVS), which offset the fee remission from KCFRS, increased from \$10,000 per student per annum (pspa) in the 2007/08 school year to \$11,000 pspa in the 2008/09 school year, it is estimated that there will be a drop in the amount of subsidy disbursed under 50% and 75% fee remission in the 2008/09 school year.

Note 2: The substantial increase in the number of children eligible for full fee remission under KCFRS in the 2008/09 school year over the 2007/08 school year is mainly due to the extension of the scheme to children under the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance Scheme (whereby they have to apply under KCFRS for the top-up fee remission amount over fee subsidy under PEVS) on a trial basis.
