001716 – 010454	Chairman Administration	<p><u>Study of the English mark-up version of the United Nations Sanctions (Somalia) Regulation (Paper No. CB(1)1576/08-09(02))</u></p> <p>The Administration took members through the amendments.</p> <p>Members noted that while the phrase "directly or indirectly" was deleted under section 5(2) in relation to prohibition against making available funds or other financial assets or economic resources, the said phrase was retained under sections 2(2)(c) and 8(1)(a)(iii) in respect of prohibition against the supply, delivery or carriage of certain goods. Members enquired about the rationale and the legal implications of the deletion or otherwise of the phrase "directly or indirectly", if any, and whether clarifications had been sought with the UN and/or the Central People's Government (CPG).</p> <p>The Administration explained that the Regulation was made pursuant to the instruction of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to implement sanctions decided by the Security Council of the United Nations (UNSC). As such, the amendments would mainly follow the wording of the UNSC resolutions and were intended to reflect the requirements of the UNSC resolutions. It was considered that the deletion or otherwise of the phrase "directly or indirectly" in respect of funds or</p>

		<p>other financial assets or economic resources in the present context would not make any material differences from the legal perspective. The Administration would seek clarification from the CPG as and when necessary. Clarification on some technical terms had been sought from the CPG in the past.</p> <p><u>Model law approach</u></p> <p>Members noted that while sanction measures, targets and subjects of the sanctions might differ in respect of different countries or places, the drafting approach adopted in most of the regulations made under the United Nations Sanctions Ordinance (Cap 537) was broadly similar. Members were of the view that the use of a model law approach or developing different models for different scenarios was conducive to improving efficiency in the Administration's preparation and the Subcommittee's scrutiny of the regulations as well as easily understood by the public.</p> <p>The Administration responded that while a model law approach could serve as a useful reference, the specific details of the sanction measures might vary from one UNSC resolution to another and there were often variations in the detailed wording of the resolutions.
