Action

I Election of Chairman

Ms Miriam LAU, the member who had the highest precedence among members on the membership list, presided at the election of the Chairman of the Subcommittee and invited nominations for the chairmanship.

2. Ms Miriam LAU was nominated by Mr CHEUNG Hok-ming and the nomination was seconded by Ms LI Fung-ying. Ms LAU accepted the nomination. There being no other nominations, Ms Miriam LAU was elected Chairman of the Subcommittee.

II Meeting with the Administration

3. The Subcommittee deliberated (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

4. The Administration briefed members on the Road Traffic (Public Service Vehicles) (Amendment) Regulation 2008 (the Amendment Regulation), which sought to give effect to an adjustment in the fares for the hiring of Lantau and urban taxis, with effect from 30 November 2008.

5. Members noted with concern that a new taxi fare structure (the new structure) would be introduced through the Amendment Regulation, which was "front-loaded and thereafter on a varying descending scale of incremental charges". As a result, taxi fares for long-haul trips would decrease and fares for short-haul trips would increase. Members expressed the following concerns about the new structure –

- (a) Some member doubted whether the new structure could effectively curtail discount gang activities. They considered it necessary to introduce legislative amendments against fare bargaining by passengers. Notwithstanding enforcement difficulties, legislative prohibition against fare bargaining should be introduced, preferably in the context of the Amendment Regulation;
- (b) Some members noted with concern that a consensus had yet to be reached on the level of taxi fare adjustment and the fare structure, as revealed in the recent demonstrations of members of the trade. The Administration should address divergent views of the trade, even from the minority groups; and
- (c) Some member questioned whether the upward fare adjustment for short-haul trips under the new structure would increase the operating revenue of a rentee-driver, having regard to the likely reduction in the number of short-haul passengers and the increase in taxi rentals as a result of the adjustment. In their view, the fare increase might have adverse impact on the operating environment of the taxi trade as a whole, thereby affecting the income and livelihood of taxi drivers. While the new fare structure involving reduction in fare for long-haul trips would have little impact on taxi owners, rentee-drivers might find it unaffordable.

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6. The Administration's responses to members' concerns were as follows –

- (a) On the proposal of legislating against fare bargaining by passengers, it should be noted that taxi passengers should pay according to the meters, similar to other public transport passengers paying the stipulated fares. However, a legislative prohibition against fare bargaining by passengers would be difficult to enforce in particular in terms of collection of evidence. Moreover, public acceptability of penalizing passengers for fare bargaining would have to be taken into consideration. The proposal would therefore require careful examination and public consultation to gauge views from the community at large;
- (b) The new fare structure was initiated, developed and in general agreed upon by the majority of the taxi trade through a lengthy deliberation process. By lowering fares for long-haul trips and hence minimizing the scope for discount offers, the new structure could help restore a level playing field for taxi operators whose business had been affected by discount gangs; and
- (c) A rationalized taxi fare structure was expected to benefit the taxi trade as a whole, as about 80% of taxi trips were short-haul, of which an increased fare would be implemented. The new fare structure might not necessarily result in corresponding increase in taxi rentals as the rentals would be determined by the forces of demand and supply in the taxi rental market. The Administration would maintain liaison with the taxi trade to discuss with them issues of concern relating to their operating condition.

Follow-up

7. To address members' concerns expressed at the meeting, the Administration was requested –

Admin.

- (a) To provide details on enforcement against taxi discount gangs by the Police, including the relevant prosecution figures, how effective such actions were, and prosecution against taxi drivers for dangerous driving when they took orders through their mobile phones while driving;
- (b) To address members' concerns about the possible adverse impacts of the proposed taxi fare adjustment on the

livelihood of taxi drivers by providing further details on the costs of taxi operation, including cost components such as license premium, maintenance cost, fuel cost, insurance cost, etc. The cost components should be presented in monetary terms instead of in percentage; and

- (c) To address members' concern about the effectiveness of the new taxi fare structure in curtailing discount gang activities, by providing a paper on measures to prevent fare bargaining for discussion by the Subcommittee. The Administration should set out in the paper concrete proposals to ensure payment of taxi fares according to the taximeter, such as measures to strengthen enforcement against taxi discount gangs and legislative amendment to forbid fare bargaining by passengers, as well as the timeframe for implementation of the proposals. The subject might be followed up by the Panel on Transport where necessary.

8. In relation to paragraph 7(a) above, the Administration also agreed to coordinate attendance of representative(s) of the Police Force at a future meeting of the Subcommittee.

Legislative timetable

9. To allow sufficient time for the Subcommittee to scrutinize the Amendment Regulation and for the Administration to respond to the views and concerns raised, members agreed that the Subcommittee Chairman should move a motion at the Council meeting on 29 October 2008 to extend the scrutiny period of the Amendment Regulation to 26 November 2008.

III Any other business

Invitation of views

10. To ascertain the views of the taxi trade and the public on the Amendment Regulation, members agreed that a general invitation for submissions should be posted on the website of the Legislative Council. Letters would also be issued to the Lantau and the urban taxi trade associations and the 18 District Councils to invite views on the Amendment Regulation. Members also agreed that a meeting be scheduled for 28 October 2008 at 10:45 am for the Subcommittee to receive oral presentations from deputations.

(Post-meeting note: At the instruction of the Chairman, the starting time of the meeting on 28 October 2008 was subsequently deferred to 2:30 pm.)
