Implementation on Digital 21 Strategy and the e-procurement programme	11.12.06	<p>The Administration agreed to :</p> <p>(a) consider members' suggestions that e-invoice be considered for the pilot programme to drive supplier adoption, and assess and apprise the Panel of the increase in percentage, if any, of Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) suppliers having Internet connection as a result of the implementation of e-procurement, and SMEs' response to and their degree of participation in the e-procurement programme; and</p> <p>(b) assess the actual benefits of the e-procurement pilot programme against the benefits listed in paragraph 12 of the Administration's paper (LC Paper No. CB(1)435/06-07(03)) and the extent to which green procurement is adopted.</p>	<p>(a) The Administration considers that the proposed scope for the pilot programme encompassing four e-procurement initiatives with an estimated non-recurrent expenditure of \$49.2 million is a prudent and pragmatic way to proceed. However, the Administration will keep in view opportunities for trying out the e-invoice function when circumstances are conducive.</p> <p>(b) The Administration will assess the actual benefits of the e-procurement pilot programme at the review stage.</p>

Progress in the implementation of digital terrestrial television broadcasting in Hong Kong	11.6.07	The Administration was requested to provide an estimate on the economic benefits arising from the analogue switch-off in due course.	The Administration to provide the information at a later stage when it has conducted further market and technical studies to plan for the analogue switch-off.
5. Capital Works Reserve Fund Head 710 Computerization Subhead A007GX – New administrative computer systems	12.11.07	The Administration agreed to provide information on the present in-house IT manpower resources within the Government, and make an analysis of the present IT manpower situation in the Government in comparison with other governments and advanced countries. Information security	8.12.2008	<p>The Administration was requested to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">(i) provide information on the outcome and findings of the security risk assessment carried out by the Hong Kong Police Force on security provisions for their staff in handling personal or sensitive data, including working outside of the office environment, as well as improvement programmes and follow-up actions undertaken/to be undertaken to mitigate risk factors identified; and(ii) update the Panel on the progress of existing and planned initiatives on a regular basis, the first one in six months' time.	The Administration will provide information on security risk assessment on Hong Kong Police Force as part of the progress update to the Panel at its meeting in July 2009.

Annual report on Cyberport	9.3.2009	<p>The Administration was requested to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) provide examples and quantifiable information/statistics to illustrate the progress in achieving the six public missions of the Cyberport project, in particular, those relating to developing a regional centre of excellence in IT, to nurture and support the development of small and medium IT enterprises and creating a strategic cluster of quality IT and IT related companies for developing Hong Kong into a leading digital city in the region; (b) provide a list of the 64 original intellectual properties developed by the Incu-train alumni and details, as far as practicable; (c) account for the increase in the marketing, promotion and project expenses and the decrease in the operating expenses for the Digital Media Centre, iResource Centre and the Digital Entertainment Incu-cum-training Centre for 2006-2008; and (d) provide the average and the range of rental rate for office premises in Cyberport. 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		<p>(b) whether the Administration would consider allowing user organizations, industry bodies and Internet operators to nominate/elect more representatives to the Board of HKIRC and the Consultative Advisory Panel (CAP) in line with the international practice in other jurisdictions to enhance transparency and increase the industry's representation at both the Board and the CAP level,;</p> <p>(c) whether the HKIRC would consider opening up all meetings to enhance transparency and public accountability for its management function over the administration of Internet domain names which was an important and valuable public asset;</p> <p>(d) whether the HKIRC would consider scrapping the confidentiality undertaking which might prevent the appointed directors from reporting to or consulting the organization/industry they represented;</p> <p>(e) whether the Administration would consider separating the role of the registry from the Registrar, thereby allowing a number of accredited registrars to provide registration service to enhance market competition;</p> <p>(f) the legal status and the enforcement of the Memorandum of Understanding; and</p> <p>(g) the issues and concerns raised by the deputations at the meeting.</p>
