Comparison of Remuneration Packages Between Directors of Bureau and Permanent Secretaries

The salary and fringe benefits of Directors of Bureau and Permanent Secretaries are tabulated below -

In addition to permanent secretaries, the posts of the Commissioner of Police and the Judiciary Administrator are also pitched at the rank of D8.

Civil servants, including those at the rank of D8, appointed on pensionable terms, and their eligible dependents, will continue to be eligible for medical and dental benefits after retirement until death. Directors of Bureau (unless being retired and pensionable civil servants) will not enjoy medical benefits after leaving office.

- 2. For the serving D8 civil servants, we estimate that for 2008-09, the cost incurred by the Government for the provision of fringe benefits as set out in items 3 to 6 above (referred to as "staff on-cost") amounts to around \$1,102,000 (or \$91,833 per month) per person. Thus, the total cost (i.e. salary plus staff on-cost) to the Government of a D8 civil servant is estimated at \$3,526,000 (or \$293,833 per month) for 2008-09. This estimate would become \$3,562,300 (or \$296,858 per month) if the recommendations in the Eleventh Report of the Standing Committee on Directorate Salaries and Conditions of Service are accepted and implemented.
- 3. For the serving Directors of Bureau, we estimate that for 2008-09, the cost incurred by the Government for the provision of fringe benefits as set out in items 3 and 4 amounts to around \$19,000 (or \$1,583 per month) per person. Thus, the total cost to the Government of a Director of Bureau is estimated at \$3,596,000 (or \$299,667 per month) for 2008-09.

<u>Civil Service Bureau</u> <u>January 2009</u>

Comparison Between the Salary of Ministers and Top Civil Servants in the United States and the United Kingdom

The current salary of cabinet ministers and top civil servants in the United States and the United Kingdom is summarised in the following table -

2. It has not been possible to ascertain the fringe benefits, allowances, severance pay, etc. enjoyed by cabinet ministers and top civil servants respectively in the two jurisdictions.

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The cabinet of the Federal Government of the <u>United Stated</u> consists of the Vice President and the heads of 15 executive departments (who are known as Cabinet Secretaries). The quoted annual salary is for Cabinet Secretaries who are not entitled to any discretionary or performance bonus. The quoted salary of top civil servants refers to the <u>base</u> salary only and does not include discretionary or performance bonus. The total pay (i.e. the base salary plus discretionary or performance bonus) of a top civil servant is capped at the salary of the Vice President, which is US\$227,300 per annum.

Most Cabinet Ministers in the <u>United Kingdom</u> are members of the House of Commons, while a small number are members of the House of Lords. A Cabinet Minister who is a member of the House of Lords is paid at £104,386 per annum. A Cabinet Minister who is a member of the House of Commons is paid at £138,724 (made up of £76,904 as ministerial pay and £61,820 as parliamentary salary) per annum. The quoted annual salary of top civil servants refers to the <u>base</u> salary only for 40 permanent secretaries. It has not included the bonus pot for permanent secretaries, which is equal to 7.6% of their total pay bill.
