Question:

- (a) Please state the current number of posts responsible for counter-terrorism duties and the details of their responsibilities.
- (b) Will the newly created 66 posts responsible for counter-terrorism duties replace the current posts responsible for such duties?

Reply:

- (a) The counter-terrorism duties of the Force involve a number of areas including:

Strategy

- (i) Co-ordinating the liaison and co-operation with international law enforcement agencies regarding counter-terrorism;
- (ii) Analysing and assessing counter-terrorism intelligence;
- (iii) Heightening counter-terrorism awareness and vigilance for members of the public as well as private and public sectors.

Training

- (i) Intensifying exercises for various major incidents (including counter-terrorism);
- (ii) Enhancing the capabilities in response to incidents or threats of explosive devices, and carrying out research and training duties;
- (iii) Conducting regular multi-agency joint exercises to practise and enhance counter-terrorism contingency plans.

Preventive Measures

- (i) Continuously enhancing the counter-terrorism capabilities of specialised operation units, such as the Special Duties Unit, the Airport Security Unit, the Explosive Ordnance



Disposal Bureau, the Counter Terrorism Response Unit (CTRU) and the Police Negotiation Cadre etc;

- (ii) Strengthening the liaison with counter-terrorism units of international enforcement agencies.

#### Front-line Officers

- (i) Heightening counter-terrorism awareness and vigilance for front-line officers (such as training days, briefings, command training and information);
- (ii) Reinforcing the co-ordination and co-operation of front-line officers with specialised units through regular exercises.

#### Protection

Extending the scope of protection and enhancing the overall counter-terrorism capability of the Force. This covers the consular and sensitive premises, key points, critical infrastructure and port facilities under the International Ship and Port Facility Security Code.

As police officers in various formations of the Force are involved, to various degrees, in counter-terrorism duties, we do not have any specific statistics on the number of posts responsible for counter-terrorism duties.

- (b) The 66 newly created posts responsible for counter-terrorism duties do not replace the existing posts responsible for such duties. The newly created posts are mainly responsible for extending the scope of protection, enhancing the overall counter-terrorism capability of the Force and implementing its counter-terrorism strategy in a more effective manner. Given the complexity of the existing counter-terrorism situation, as an international metropolis, Hong Kong needs to follow the overseas arrangement by setting up the CTRU. Such a dedicated and specially trained operation unit will perform its duties effectively and thus enhancing the Force's overall counter-terrorism vigilance and preventive capability.

[Note: The question below concerns matters under the policy purview of the Transport and Housing Bureau (THB). The reply was prepared by the Hong Kong Police Force and vetted by the THB.]

Question:

It was mentioned in the reply SB073 that there were 5 accidents involving drug drivers last year and that the Force will study which method of testing drug drivers is more appropriate. Will the Administration:

- (a) provide the details of the study?
- (b) state the methods expected to be considered?
- (c) provide the earliest practicable time that such methods are expected to be implemented?
- (d) explain how to tackle the problem of drug driving before the implementation and provide the expenditure involved?

Asked by: Hon. WONG Kwok-hing

Reply:

- (a) and (c) The Administration is very concerned about recent traffic accidents caused by motorists who drive under the influence of drugs, particularly narcotics. It is planned that priority will be given to cope with dangerous drugs. Having the means to differentiate a motorist who drives under the influence of drugs is a prerequisite for combating drug driving effectively. The Administration has been following overseas studies and legislation on drug driving closely. In recent years, some countries have introduced different ways to ascertain whether a driver is driving under the influence of drugs. For example, in the United Kingdom, field impairment tests were introduced to test the driver's sensory and motor reactions or check his pupils in assessing whether he is under the influence of drugs; some Australian State Governments have introduced rapid testing devices for testing oral fluid to ascertain initially whether a driver has taken certain drugs. For the time being, the rapid test devices used in Australia is only for testing the drugs commonly abused there. The Administration is looking for rapid test devices which can identify drugs commonly abused in Hong Kong (such as ketamine), and their reliability.

The Administration will draw reference from overseas experience and consider the feasibility of various methods of identifying drug drivers as mentioned above and which method is more suitable under Hong Kong's circumstances. We will also

study how the legislation should be amended to better facilitate enforcement actions and evidence collection, including the need for heavier penalties to deter drug driving. The Administration hopes to formulate initial proposals for public consultation in around mid-2010. If the measures to tackle drug driving involve amendment of legislation, they cannot be implemented until the legislation amendment is completed. When studying the initial proposals, the Force will continue to ensure road safety by reminding drivers not to overlook the effects of drugs and to refrain from driving under the influence of drugs through a multi-faceted approach which covers law enforcement, publicity and education.

- (d) The Government has always followed a five-pronged strategy to combat the drug problem by launching more vigorous anti-drug initiatives on education and publicity, treatment and rehabilitation, legislation and enforcement, external cooperation, and evidence-based research.

The Force will continue to monitor incidents involving drug driving, and has given instructions to front-line officers to remind them of the relevant procedures. In fact, if drug driving is involved in an accident or an accident with casualties, the driver may be charged with offences such as dangerous driving or dangerous driving causing death.

On the other hand, the Administration will step up publicity reminding drivers to watch out for drug label warnings such as “This drug may cause drowsiness” or “Do not drive after taking this drug” before taking any drugs. A person must not drive if he has to take drugs which may affect driving, and should use other transport instead.

Tackling drug driving falls under the Programme of “Road Safety”. No specific breakdown of the estimated expenditure in this respect is available.

Question :

Regarding Reply SB122, the success rate of non-conviction and free from drugs in one year after discharge from the Drug Addiction Treatment Centre (DATC) was only some 60%. The Administration states that discharged DATC inmates are already subject to one year's statutory supervision and counselling and support are given to them. However, among those inmates discharged from DATC, almost four out of 10 become drug abusers or offenders again. Does it mean that the care and support given to them are still inadequate? Will the Administration provide additional resources in the coming year to address the problem of re-offending so as to help them start afresh? Moreover, for the indicator "non-conviction and free from drugs in one year after discharge", will the Administration set a higher and more specific target in the coming year?

Reply :

The Correctional Services Department (CSD) provides inmates of Drug Addiction Treatment Centres (DATCs) with welfare and counselling services. Besides, the inmates' re-offending risks and their rehabilitative needs in the areas of employment, family, social functioning and community adjustment are assessed with a view to providing them with appropriate rehabilitative programme matching, hence helping them start afresh. During the supervision period after release, supervising officers of CSD will follow up the supervisees' situation and ensure that they are engaged in gainful employment, law-abiding and staying away from drugs. CSD will provide an additional funding of \$4.69 million on addiction treatment services in 2010-11.

The success rate of the DATC programme is contingent upon a number of factors. Whether inmates can start afresh not only depend upon the DATC programme and the related rehabilitative services provided by CSD, but also their own determination as well as the acceptance and support of the community. Given that "non-conviction and free from drugs in one year after discharge" is an objective indicator that reflects generally the effectiveness of the DATC programme as influenced by various factors, CSD will continue to adopt this indicator as a reference in the coming year.

Question :

- (a) Reply SB123 states that the Correctional Services Department (CSD) does not have information and data on the employment of rehabilitated persons by government departments and private enterprises. Do other government departments have the relevant data?
- (b) If no, how does the Administration assess whether the support services provided for the rehabilitated persons are sufficient; whether the support provided for them is effective; and areas for improvement?
- (c) The Reply also states that CSD will organise a new round of publicity activities appealing for community acceptance of and support for rehabilitated persons in 2010-11 and the estimated expenditure is \$1.65 million. Apart from these publicity activities, will the Administration organise any workplace attachment programmes in collaboration with private enterprises, such as job-matching schemes, to actually provide employment opportunity to rehabilitated persons?

Reply :

- (a) The Government does not collect information and data on the employment of rehabilitated persons by government departments and private enterprises.
- (b) Although the Government does not centrally collect information and data on the employment of rehabilitated persons by government departments and private enterprises, the Correctional Services Department (CSD) does gather information on specific areas for reference. For example, CSD has all along been collecting the employment information of rehabilitated persons subject to supervision. The Department has also, through the Society of Rehabilitation and Crime Prevention, Hong Kong (SRACP), collected employment figures of discharged adult inmates who have completed pre-release vocational training. In addition, CSD and the related training organisations will collect through questionnaire the comments of prisoners on the vocational training courses they have attended.
- (c) Apart from organising educational and publicity activities to promote public support for rehabilitated persons, CSD has all along been implementing different

programmes to facilitate their re-integration into society. Local prisoners are arranged to attend the “Pre-release Re-integration Orientation Course” before discharge to help them acquire general information which is useful for their rehabilitation. Special measures are also in place to help them find jobs. For example, in 2008, CSD facilitated the co-operation of a commercial enterprise and SRACP to establish a social enterprise which provided employment opportunities for rehabilitated persons. CSD will continue to promote such kind of cooperation with a view to providing more job opportunities for rehabilitated persons. In addition, SRACP offers post-release employment counselling and follow-up services for adult inmates who have completed placement-tied courses provided by CSD. CSD has also developed a “Caring Employers” network, mainly consisted of local enterprises, to provide a platform for rehabilitated persons to find jobs. In 2009, a total of 554 rehabilitated persons secured jobs through the network.

Question :

In Reply SB124, it is mentioned that for those prisoners who pursue further studies, they would be provided with advice and guidance and given assistance to apply for relevant subsidies. However, for these prisoners with relatively higher academic qualifications, will the Administration consider providing them with special employment schemes to enable them to find jobs matching their specific knowledge upon release, so that they will not end up engaging in elementary-level jobs only because of their past identity?

Asked by : Hon. IP Wai-ming

Reply :

The Correctional Services Department (CSD) will arrange all local prisoners to take part in the "Pre-release Re-integration Orientation Course" before discharge. The course covers general information on social services and organisations which are of particular relevance to rehabilitated persons. It includes a brief introduction on social welfare services and community service facilities, information on government and voluntary agencies which offer assistance to rehabilitated persons in finding jobs, as well as job interview skills and labour legislation. Employment counselling and information on the labour market are also provided to prepare them for employment after release. For those prisoners who need assistance in finding jobs, CSD will refer them to participate in relevant employment schemes operated by government departments or non-government organisations (NGOs). CSD will also arrange NGOs to provide voluntary employment counselling and follow-up services for those prisoners who have received vocational training in correctional institutions. For individual rehabilitated persons under CSD's statutory supervision, employment counselling will be provided by their supervising officers. The above support is not confined to finding elementary-level jobs. Rehabilitated persons with relatively higher academic qualifications will also receive similar support and assistance in finding suitable jobs which match with their specific ability and knowledge upon release.
