Reply :

After consulting relevant stakeholders, we have allocated part of the funding initially budgeted under Programme 4 to the Hong Kong Sports Institute (HKSI) for strengthening support to elite athletes. The decrease in funding under Programme 4 is accordingly offset by an increase in the funding under Programme 6 (Subvention: Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited, Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, Hong Kong Arts Development Council and Major Performing Arts Groups) to the HKSI Limited. The allocation to HKSI was mainly for the following purposes –

- strengthening support for elite athletes including providing support to four "priority target sports", allocating additional funding for the Direct Financial Support Schemes and enhancing junior squad training of the HKSI; and
- (ii) carrying out reinstatement works at Wu Kwai Sha Youth Village after the HKSI moved back to its Fo Tan site.

The estimate for "Youth development activities" for 2009-10 was revised from \$23 million to \$16 million. The revision was mainly due to the cancellation or postponement of approved projects by local community organisations to organise study tours to the Mainland in view of the threat of human swine influenza in the summer months of 2009. Moreover, approved projects under the newly introduced Youth National Education Funding Scheme are to be completed within the period from July 2009 and December 2010. A number of these approved projects will only be concluded, and requisite costs incurred, later in the calendar year of 2010.

What are the progress and the anticipated completion date of the redevelopment project of the Hong Kong Sports Institute? What are the manpower and expenditure involved? Has the Administration assessed the impact of the redevelopment project on our athletes' preparation for the 2010 Asian Games in Guangzhou later this year?

Reply:

The Finance Committee has approved funding of \$1,760.4 million for the Hong Kong Sports Institute (HKSI) Redevelopment Project. The HKSI is implementing the project by way of four contracts, as follows -

- \triangleright Contract 1 – refurbishment of the existing indoor sports complex and construction of a temporary velodrome at Whitehead, Ma On Shan: refurbishment works started in March 2009 and were completed in February 2010. The temporary velodrome at Whitehead will be completed by April 2010;
- \geq Contract 2 – foundation works for the new multi-purpose building, multi-purpose sports hall, rowing boathouse and a 52-metre indoor swimming pool: works started in July 2009 and are due for completion by the end of 2010;

- Contract 3 superstructure works for the new multi-purpose building, multi-purpose sports hall, rowing boathouse and indoor pool, and refurbishment of outdoor venues (except the multi-purpose hard court and the external area around the hostel wing and swimming pool): the HKSI is preparing tender documents for Contract 3 and intends to have it awarded within 2010. Most of the new infrastructure works are tentatively targeted for completion by the end of 2011; and
- Contract 4 alteration and additional works for the existing swimming pool, hostel wing and spectator stand, and refurbishment of the external area around these premises and the multi-purpose hard court: the HKSI plans to invite tenders for Contract 4 in mid-2012. Tentatively, the whole project is targeted for completion by the end of 2013.

The HKSI estimates that the project will create about 1 000 jobs. The HKSI has planned the implementation of the project to ensure that athletes' training and preparation for major games, including the Guangzhou 2010 Asian Games will not be significantly affected.

Of the columbarium facilities managed by the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries (BMCPC), how many niches are available for the public to apply? According to information provided by the BMCPC, all niches in the four existing cemeteries under its management have been allocated. BMCPC anticipated that around 50 000 new niches will be provided under its existing cemeteries in the coming two years. BMCPC would accept and process applications for new niches once they are available for sale. 9 201 applications are currently on a waiting list for reverted niches. The average waiting time for reverted niches depends on various factors which are beyond the control of BMCPC, such as the pace of niches being returned to BMCPC, the number of new applications for reverted niches and withdrawals received. Amongst the successful applicants allocated with reverted niches in the past three years, the average waiting time was 600 days. BMCPC will work with Government departments concerned, for example the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, Lands Department and Planning Department, to explore new sites for columbarium facilities.

The Home Affairs Bureau will continue to oversee the operation of Youth Square in 2010-11. Will the Administration inform this Committee of the occupancy rate of the performance venues, exhibition halls, offices, catering and retail facilities and hostels operated under Youth Square since its opening? What are the rent levels of the above facilities and what are the factors of consideration in determining the rental? Will the Administration set up a mechanism for regular review?

Reply :

Youth Square (Y^2) has been open by phases since August 2009. The occupancy rates of the short lease facilities namely Y-Theatre, Y-Platform and Y-Studio in February 2010 are over 50% on average. The office floors at Y^2 have all been rented out. The catering floor has also been awarded under a revenue contract and the catering facility is open to public in phases since March 2010. The average occupancy rate of Y^2 hostel facility which opened in December 2009 is about 57% in February 2010. Among the 36 retail shop units on the retail floor, six have been leased out and leasing activity is continuing.

The rental levels of Y^2 facilities were set mainly on the basis of the rates provided by Rating and Valuation Department and the market rates of similar facilities. Taking into account the affordability of youth and non-profit making organisations, a number of rental concessions are offered to eligible organisations and individuals. The major concessions include 20% discount for registered non-profit-making organisations in hiring Y-Theatre, Y-Platform, Y-Studio and multi-purpose areas; up to 50% discount for the leasing of retail space; up to 60% discount for the lease of office space by registered non-profit-making organisations; and 20% discount for rental of hostel by registered youth organisations and its members or registered non-profit-making organisations organising youth activities. The Home Affairs Bureau plans to conduct annual reviews on the rental levels of the facilities.

The Arts and Sport Development Fund (ASDF) is a sub-fund under the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation established under the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation Ordinance (Cap. 1128) (the Ordinance). When considering the target annual investment return and the corresponding investment strategy for the ASDF, the Administration will take into account the forecast cash flow requirements of the Fund. We will consult the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation Investment Advisory Committee established under the Ordinance to formulate investment strategies and advise on investment-related matters for the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation and its sub-funds.

We will seek the approval for the proposed injection of \$3 billion into the ASDF from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council within the current session. Meanwhile, we are working out the modus operandi of the future ASDF, including a mechanism to help ensure that worthwhile initiatives can receive funding support despite any fluctuations in investment income from time to time.

Youth development activities

For the Youth development activities, there is an increase of \$10 million in allocation. The increased funding will cater for extra expenditure arising mainly from sponsored study tours postponed from 2009-10 (due to the then threat of human swine influenza) to 2010-11.

Youth Square

Youth Square has been open by phases from August 2009. An increase of about \$20 million in 2010-11 is required for full year operation expenses.

Family Council related programmes

For the Family Council, there is a \$20 million increase in allocation for promoting family core values and a culture of loving, happy and harmonious families, including the launching of the Happy Family Campaign and the Happy Family Info Hub.

The Commission on Youth (COY) operates a "Community Participation Scheme for organising study tours to the Mainland" (CP Scheme) and a "Youth National Education Funding Scheme" (YNE Scheme) to sponsor study tours to the Mainland and large-scale national education activities held in Hong Kong. For the CP Scheme, the applications for 2010-11 are now being vetted by COY. It is estimated that about 200 projects, with some 7 700 participants, may be approved. The estimated allocation for the Scheme in 2010-11 is about \$13 million which is funded by the Administration and charity donations from the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries. For the YNE Scheme, a total of 19 programmes were approved for implementation between July 2009 and December 2010 and it is envisaged that about 17 600 youths will take part in the study tours to the Mainland and/or the related national education activities in Hong Kong. The estimated allocation for YNE Scheme in 2010-11 is \$6 million.

The average waiting time for reverted niches depends on various factors which are beyond the control of BMCPC, such as the pace, type and location of niches being returned to BMCPC, the number of new applications for reverted niches and withdrawals received. Amongst the successful applicants allocated with reverted niches in the past three years, the average waiting time was 600 days. BMCPC will work with Government departments concerned, for example the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, Lands Department and Planning Department, to explore new sites for columbarium facilities. BMCPC will also explore means to develop new columbarium facilities within its four existing cemeteries.

- Contract 2 foundation works for the new multi-purpose building, multi-purpose sports hall, rowing boathouse and a 52-metre indoor swimming pool: works started in July 2009 and are due for completion by the end of 2010;

- Contract 3 superstructure works for the new multi-purpose building, multi-purpose sports hall, rowing boathouse and indoor pool, and refurbishment of outdoor venues (except the multi-purpose hard court and the external area around the hostel wing and swimming pool): the HKSI is preparing tender documents for Contract 3 and intends to have it awarded within 2010. Most of the new infrastructure works are tentatively targeted for completion by the end of 2011; and

In 2010-11, the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) and the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will continue to strengthen exchange and cooperation with the Mainland and other countries.

Under the Greater Pearl River Delta (GPRD) cultural cooperation framework, HAB and LCSD will follow up on the collaboration initiatives agreed at the 10th GPRD Cultural Cooperation Meeting held in February 2009 in the following specific areas:

- (a) development and exchange of performing arts talents and programme collaboration;
- (b) exchange of cultural information;
- (c) development of museum network and excavation, conservation and promotion of heritage;
- (d) library cooperation and exchange;
- (e) promotion of Cantonese Opera; and
- (f) study on the development of cultural and creative industries and related internship programmes.

The next GPRD Cultural Cooperation Meeting will be held in Macao in 2010-11. The

estimated total expenditure of HAB and LCSD on enhancing cultural exchange and cooperation with the Mainland in 2010-11 is around \$44 million, including LCSD's organisation of a series of art exhibitions and coordination of performances by local arts groups in Shanghai during the World Expo period. Separately, the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) has budgeted \$2 million for cultural exchange with the Mainland in 2010-11.

For cultural exchanges with overseas countries, LCSD will continue to organise a series of cultural activities to establish, maintain and expand networks with their overseas counterparts. The estimated total expenditure of HAB and LCSD on enhancing cultural exchange and cooperation with other countries in 2010-11 is around \$38 million.

HAB also administers the Arts Development Fund (ADF) which supports outbound cultural exchanges to the Mainland and other countries. In 2009-10, over 20 projects have been funded with a total grant of about \$2 million. In 2010-11, subject to the number and eligibility of funding applications received, HAB will continue to provide funding support under the ADF to support local arts groups and artists to participate in cultural exchange activities.

The above work will be absorbed by the existing staff within HAB, LCSD and HKADC.

The Government proposes to inject \$69 million into the Cantonese Opera Development Fund (CODF) in 2010-11 to support the development of Cantonese Opera, subject to the approval of the Legislative Council. This will be used to fund various Cantonese Opera development projects, including the "Hong Kong Cantonese Opera Troupe for New Talent" Three-Year Grant Scheme to nurture new Cantonese Opera talents as well as performances, arts education, community promotion, professional training, research and archival projects, etc., subject to further consultation with the Cantonese Opera Advisory Committee (COAC).

On the provision of performance venues for the Cantonese Opera sector, we will seek the Legislative Council's approval for \$730 million for funding the construction of an annex building at Ko Shan Theatre. In conjunction with COAC, we will consult the Cantonese Opera sector in taking forward other projects. These include Yau Ma Tei Xiqu Activity Centre Phase I (expected to be completed by end 2011) and the planning of its Phase II development; Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD)'s Venue Partnership Scheme and priority venue hiring policy for Cantonese Opera troupes.

Apart from the \$3 million donation from the community to support the operation of Sunbeam Theatre from March 2010 to February 2011 through the CODF, the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) will continue to grant performance subsidy to Cantonese Opera troupes for staging performances at Sunbeam Theatre with the government funding provided.

Apart from such funding, HKADC also relies on the arts portion of the Arts and Sport Development Fund (ASDF) to support worthwhile projects that contribute to the further development of the arts in the community. (a) We will allocate additional funding of \$486 million over the next five years to strengthen Hong Kong's cultural software by ways of arts programme development, audience building and enhancement of art education and manpower training. A significant amount of the additional resources will be disbursed to arts groups outside the Government to stage performances and take forward projects of various scales and natures. These include our continuous provision of additional resources to the nine major performing arts groups under Government subvention (namely, Hong Kong Philharmonic Society Limited, Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra Limited, Hong Kong Repertory Theatre Limited, Hong Kong Dance Company Limited, Hong Kong Sinfonietta Limited, The Hong Kong Ballet Limited, City Contemporary Dance Company Limited, Chung Ying Theatre Company (HK) Limited and Zuni Icosahedron Limited) to develop quality programmes, promote outreach activities and advance cultural exchanges. A total of \$202.5 million additional resources over the next five financial years has been earmarked for the purpose, on top of the baseline subvention to the nine groups that amounts to \$219 million in 2009-10.

A total of \$80 million additional resources will also be provided to the Hong Kong Arts Festival (HKAF) in the next five financial years to enrich its programme content to take it to the next level of development for positioning Hong Kong in the world cultural map. The provision to HKAF amounts to \$19.1 million in 2009-10.

(b) It is estimated that the nine major performance arts groups will stage around 527 ticketed performances and HKAF around 128 ticketed performances in 2010-11. A significant amount of the additional resources will be disbursed to different arts groups which will stage their own performances and carry out other arts and cultural projects in order to promote audience building and enhance art education.

(a) The Art Promotion Office (APO) of Leisure and Cultural Services Department organises the "Artists in the Neighbourhood Scheme" and the "Art for All" project from time to time. "Artists in the Neighbourhood Scheme" is a partnership project with the private sector, artists, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and non-profit making bodies. By displaying the works of talented artists in different venues in Hong Kong, the Scheme aims to bring art into the everyday life of the public and to build up a wider base of art supporters. "Art for All", on the other hand, is a community art project in collaboration with NGOs, non-profit making organisations and social welfare enterprises such as rehabilitation sector and minority groups. Through organising art workshops and exhibitions, the project aims to encourage different sectors to participate in artistic creation and appreciation.

The estimated number of art groups/artists involved in organising the two projects in the next five years cannot be provided at this stage given that the "Artists in the Neighbourhood Scheme" would take place in the form of an open competition and selected candidates may be in group(s) or individuals while the number of NGOs participating in future "Art for All" projects is being worked out.

The APO is currently organising a public arts project, namely the Sai Kung District Council Public Art Project, through open competition. Proposals were invited in May 2009. A total of 116 proposals from 58 art units were received. It is planned that the artworks will be installed at three locations in Sai Kung District under LCSD's management, i.e. Po Hong Park, Po Tsui Pak and Man Yee Playground. The estimated expenditure for the project is about \$1.8 million with funding provided by Sai Kung District Council.

In the next five years, we will also launch a pilot scheme of displaying local artworks at selected Government joint-user buildings. Details are set out in (b) of the reply.

The estimated expenditure to strengthen the promotion of public art in the next five years is approximately \$73.4 million.

We will allocate additional funding of \$486 million over the next five years to strengthen Hong Kong's cultural software by ways of arts programme development, audience building and enhancement of art education and manpower training. These include an allocation of \$21.69 million to support student participation in arts education activities in the next five years. In 2010-11, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will further enhance educational programmes in museums and film archive to include learning sessions, guided tours and workshops to dovetail with the New Senior Secondary Curriculum. Teaching kits and learning sheets for special exhibitions will also be produced. About 9 000 senior

secondary school students are expected to benefit from the initiatives.

At present, a total of 12 school-based projects involving artists are being conducted to promote visual arts education among students, including the "MuseTeens Youth Leadership Scheme" which provides students with the opportunities to learn local art, heritage and museum work through a series of visits and lectures, as well as "New Teens On-line" which promotes visual arts to students through sharing sessions and demonstrations. Moreover, the School Culture Day Scheme under which visits to LCSD's performing arts venues, museums and public libraries are arranged for students during school days involves 35 performing arts groups and over 500 schools in the 2009-10 academic year.

In addition, LCSD has implemented other schemes to promote the appreciation of performing arts among students. These include the School Arts Animateur Scheme whereby LCSD joins hands with arts groups to take forward projects comprising introductory performances, workshop series, student finale performances and students' performances at voluntary agencies, featuring 88 participating schools and 13 arts groups in the 2009-10 academic year. The Arts Experience Scheme for Senior Secondary Students also offers a spectrum of tailor-made performing arts programmes with interactive and educational elements for senior secondary students to tie in with their curriculum. A total of 14 arts groups and 72 schools are involved in the 2009-10 academic year. The estimated project cost for the existing arts education and audience building activities above is around \$6.4 million.

Reply :

In the next five financial years, we will provide \$32.28 million for the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) to launch new trainee programmes to nurture a pool of arts administrators and museum curators. The trainees will be engaged by LCSD or by the partners of its performance venues comprising major and small/medium-sized arts groups. Details are set out in the ensuing paragraphs.

Arts Administrator Trainees

LCSD will provide comprehensive training to trainees in venue management, facilities maintenance, planning of programmes, carnivals and arts festivals, as well as event marketing and promotion at performance venues and programme offices. In 2010-11, 13 arts administrator trainees will be engaged on a two-year term basis, totalling 26 trainees for two terms between 2010-11 and 2013-14.

Separately, each of the 20 venue partners under LCSD's Venue Partnership Scheme at 11 performance venues will also be provided with funding to engage an arts administrator trainee during the five-year period from 2010-11 to 2014-15. Each trainee will be engaged on a one-year term basis and be provided with practical experience in the management of performing groups and their programmes. A maximum of 100 trainees will benefit from this programme.

Museum Curator Trainees

LCSD will launch a two-year training programme for its trainees in museum management which covers collection management, exhibition planning, art education, organisation of public art projects and venue management. In 2010-11, 10 trainees will be engaged on a two-year term basis, totalling 20 trainees for two terms between 2010-11 and 2013-14.

Apart from the above new trainee programmes, training and internship opportunities are widely available for those who aspire to a career in the arts and culture. These include the educational programmes offered by the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, the University Grants Committee-funded institutions and the Vocational Training Council. In addition, the Hong Kong Arts Development Council runs a Local Internships Programme to sponsor participants to take up work attachments at local arts groups. Its Cultural Internship Scheme sponsors local arts practitioners to undertake short-term internship and training programmes in arts administration in the Mainland or overseas, and the renowned UK Clore Leadership Programme is among the programmes for this Scheme.

Reply :

In 2010-11, we will continue to work closely with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) to promote civic/national education outside schools through various channels. The estimated total expenditure is about \$20 million (about the same provision in 2009-10). The CPCE will map out the detailed work plan for 2010 in due course.

For the Youth Development Activities, there is a \$10 million increase in allocation. The increased funding will cater for extra expenditure arising mainly from sponsored study tours postponed from 2009-10 (due to the then threat of human swine influenza) to 2010-11.

For the Family Council, there is a \$20 million increase in allocation for promoting family core values and a culture of loving, happy and harmonious families, including the launching of the Happy Family Campaign and the Happy Family Info Hub.

In 2010-11, Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) and Home Affairs Department (HAD) have earmarked around \$9 million to support and promote the development of social enterprises (SEs). Measures include organisation of promotional activities at the district level to enhance public understanding of SEs and encourage members of the public to use the products and services provided by SEs, implementation of the Social Enterprises Partnership Programme to enhance cross-sector collaboration and facilitate partnership, and providing sponsorship for business plan writing competitions. HAD will continue to implement the Enhancing Self-Reliance Through District Partnership Programme to provide seed grants for eligible organisations for the initial operations of SEs. Subject officers of various grades and ranks of the HAB and HAD will be involved in carrying out the aforesaid measures.

We will continue our dialogue with SE operators and relevant stakeholders to gauge the effectiveness of our support measures. We shall review our measures as appropriate with a view to improving our strategies for promoting the development of SE.

Reply :

The Government has budgeted \$18 million per annum from 2010-11 onwards to support the implementation of enhanced feeder programmes by 21 National Sports Associations (NSAs) and two sports associations for athletes with disabilities.

With the additional funding, NSAs will be able to organise more youth training programmes such as School Sports Programmes, Young Athletes Training Scheme, District Sports Teams Training Scheme, regional squad training and junior squad training programmes. Promising young athletes will also be able to take part in more local or overseas international competitions.

Although football is not covered by the enhanced feeder programme at present, the Home Affairs Bureau has just completed the Consultancy Study on Football Development in March 2010 and plans to set up a Football Taskforce comprising representatives of the Government, the Hong Kong Football Association (HKFA) and other stakeholders to oversee the implementation of the proposed recommendations, which include improvements to development pathways for football players in schools, at football clubs and at district level.

To support the implementation of the recommendations, the Government intends to earmark resources from the investment returns from the seed money proposed to be injected into the Arts and Sport Development Fund (sports portion) by the Financial Secretary in the 2010-11 Budget.

In addition, to enhance support for team sports, including football, that have the potential for greater spectator appeal and public participation, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department will consider allocating additional funding to the relevant NSAs including the HKFA to enhance training of the respective squads with a view to raising the standard and professionalism of teams.

It is announced in the 2010-11 Budget that to further promote the development of sports and arts, the Administration proposes to inject \$3 billion into the Arts and Sport Development Fund as seed money and use the annual investment return of the Fund to provide sustainable additional resources for subsidising the long-term development of sports, culture and arts. In this connection, would the Administration inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) What is the mode of operation of the seed money?
- (b) What is the estimated average annual investment return? What are the estimated expenditures involved for arts and sports projects respectively?
- (c) The Administration expects to approve 30 grant applications in 2010-11, which is the same as last year (i.e. 2009-10). What are the reasons? What are the respective numbers of arts and sports projects and the estimated expenditure involved for each project?

Reply :

(a) It is proposed that the seed money be injected into the Arts and Sport Development Fund (the Fund), which is a sub-fund under the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation established under the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation Ordinance (Cap. 1128) (the Ordinance). The Secretary for Home Affairs has the delegated authority to manage the application of the Fund. The Director of Accounting Services is the statutory trustee of the Fund and is responsible for investment and accounting matters. An Investment Advisory Committee comprising members who are non-government officials has been appointed in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Ordinance to formulate investment strategies and advise on investment-related matters for the Sir David Trench Fund for Recreation and its sub-funds. Investment returns from the seed money are used to subsidise the long-term development of sport, culture and the arts.

- (b) The Administration is preparing the estimated cash flow requirements of the Fund for both arts and sports projects, on the basis of which the target annual investment return and the corresponding investment strategy will be determined.
- (c) We intend to seek approval for the proposed injection of the seed money from the Finance Committee of Legislative Council in the current session. In the meantime, having regard to the existing uncommitted balance of the arts portion of the ASDF, we estimate that 30 arts projects involving a total grant of around \$30 million will be supported by the arts portion of the Fund in 2010, which is similar to the level in 2009. The actual number and amount of grants will depend on the number and scale of funding applications from the sector, which vary from year to year. The situation is similar for sports projects.

Based on the recent trend of athletes' performance in international competitions, the HKSIL estimates that the number of athletes in the elite training programme in 2010 will be 525, representing an increase of about 8.5% compared with 2009.

Reply :

The Government is committed to promoting the long-term development of the arts and culture. We will, through arts programme development, audience building and enhancement of arts education and manpower training, strengthen Hong Kong's cultural software.

To promote the appreciation of the performing arts at the school level, in 2010-11, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will continue to strengthen its arts education schemes for primary, secondary and special schools outside the formal curriculum, including the School Culture Day Scheme, the School Arts Animateur Scheme and the Arts Experience Scheme for Senior Secondary Students, as well as other arts educational activities and special projects, in collaboration with the Education Bureau (EDB) and other educational, cultural and district organisations.

On visual arts education, the Hong Kong Museum of Art, Hong Kong Heritage Museum and Art Promotion Office will continue, through collaboration with EDB and other educational institutions, provide a wide range of educational activities/services for primary and secondary students. These include guided tour services, teaching-kits and video shows, etc. A Journey on Learning the Arts for Senior Secondary Students Scheme, MuseTeens Youth Leadership Scheme and New Teens On-line programmes specially designed for students of the New Senior School Curriculum will be taken forward in 2010-11.

We are also stepping up efforts through various schemes and activities to bring the arts and culture to the community so that it will become an integral part of peoples' lives. For instance, the Community Cultural Ambassador Scheme, District Cantonese Opera Parade, Cantonese Opera Day and Dance Day are currently implemented by LCSD at the community level to reach out to the neighbourhood. Additional resources will be allocated to strengthen the Artists in the Neighbourhood Scheme which brings art exhibitions to the audience outside museums with paintings, installation art, sculpture, photography, ceramics, etc. Publications and guide maps will be issued and an e-platform will be launched to promote public artworks to the community.

In addition, the Hong Kong Arts Development Council will continue to, through the Community Arts Activities Enhancement Scheme, encourage the arts and cultural societies in the 18 districts to organise and promote arts activities in the local community.

In addition, the University Grants Committee (UGC)-funded institutions also offer arts-related programmes at degree level. New programmes introduced in the 2009/10 - 2011/12 triennium include digital media broadcasting, and cultural and heritage management. As far as funding is concerned, the UGC provides block grants to the institutions, which have a high degree of freedom and responsibility for determining the best use of the resources vested in them. Hence the UGC does not have a breakdown of funding to be spent on individual art-related programmes.

However, the estimated cost per audience in 2010-11 is nearly 70 times higher than that of 2008-09 and nearly three times higher than the revised estimate for 2009-10. Please inform this Committee of the reasons for the big difference in cost per audience and set out the details of the partnership projects for the three years in question, including the programmes, funding arrangements, audience attendance and cost per audience.

Reply :

Partnership projects are those organised by the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) in collaboration with the private or public sectors. Most of these projects are one-off in nature. The number and nature of partnership projects vary from year to year. Without a common base of projects, such figures between years are not directly comparable.

In 2008-09, the largest-scale project was "Mobile Art Gallery 2008", co-organised by the HKADC, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD), Citybus Limited and New World First Bus Services Limited. It had a high audience outreach of about 1 million on the basis of the daily passenger rate of the bus companies concerned. The whole project was financed by the LCSD and did not involve any project cost on the part of the HKADC. As such, a significantly low cost per audience as borne by the HKADC was recorded in the year.

In 2010-11, the cost per audience is estimated to be higher due to the launch of a large-scale community arts project which involves \$1.7 million and an estimated number of 14 000 beneficiaries. A substantial portion of the expenses relates to the organisation of an arts exhibition and a series of performances, guided tours and workshops etc. The project aims to encourage artists and community organisations to devise community art projects which can showcase the unique characteristics of the respective districts and encourage the participation and involvement of students, local residents and district organisations. The other project is of medium scale and is expected to attract 4 754 audience in the light of past experience.

Both quantitative and qualitative methodologies are used in the study including literature reviews, consultative interviews, focus group discussions and questionnaire surveys. In order to have a wider public engagement, the study included some samples from non-governmental organisations and conducted telephone surveys for public opinions in the course of the study. The expenditure involved in the study is approximately \$2.5 million.

Following the inscription of Cantonese opera onto the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation's (UNESCO) Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity, it stands to reason that more performing arts may make the same list in the future. It is necessary for the Administration to formulate policies for the conservation and promotion of intangible cultural heritage. In this regard, will the Administration consider conducting a study on introducing legislative proposal for the conservation of Hong Kong's intangible cultural heritages with a view to ensuring that they are conserved, promoted and preserved in ways that are in compliance with the requirements of the UNESCO? If yes, what are the work plan and estimated expenditure involved? If not, what are the reasons?

Reply :

Pursuant to the policy of protecting, preserving and promoting Hong Kong's intangible cultural heritage (ICH), the Administration has been providing support to the safeguarding of ICH in different ways. Established in 1992, the Lord Wilson Heritage Trust provides funding support to sponsor researches and educational activities related to local heritage including the preservation and promotion of intangible cultural heritage. The museums of Leisure and Cultural Services Department have been conducting research and recording of local ICH including festivals and rituals such as the jiao-festivals, temple festivals, clan rituals as well as traditional arts and crafts. The museums also organise from time to time thematic exhibitions, public lectures, seminars and conferences on ICH. The Administration has established the Cantonese Opera Advisory Committee to advise on the promotion, preservation, study and development of Cantonese opera and set up the Cantonese Opera.

The Administration is now conducting the first phase of a territory-wide survey in Hong Kong to compile the first inventory of Hong Kong's ICH in accordance with the framework set out in the UNESCO Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage. The survey results will provide a useful basis for the Administration to formulate further measures to support various areas of work relating to the safeguarding of ICH, such as identification, documentation, research, protection, preservation, promotion, and the need for legislation. The funding requirements will be worked out accordingly.

Reply :

(a) In 2010-11, the Administration will continue to promote sports development in line with our established three strategic directions, namely to help our elite athletes to achieve excellence; to develop a strong sporting culture in the community; and to raise our profile as a centre for international sports events. In addition to on-going initiatives to promote sport, we will consider how best to make use of the investment return from the proposed injection of \$3 billion into the Arts and Sport Development Fund, as announced by the Financial Secretary in the 2010-11 Budget, to support new initiatives. The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will continue to organise programmes and activities to raise public awareness of the importance of regular participation in sport and other physical activities. LCSD will increase funding support for NSAs and sports organisations through the Sports Subvention Scheme.

- (b) The amount of funding allocated to each NSA under the Sports Subvention Scheme for the purpose of promoting sports development over the past three years (i.e. 2007-08 to 2009-10) is at the Annex.
- (c) In 2010-11, LCSD will provide subvention to 58 NSAs under the Sports Subvention Scheme to promote sports development. The exact amount of subvention to be provided to individual NSAs is being finalised and will be subject to the details of their development plans. The subventions will cover personnel, office and programme expenses. The programmes to be covered by the subvention include participation in international sports events; organisation of squad training, development schemes; School Sports Programmes, local competitions and community sports clubs projects; and the training of officials and attendance at major sports conferences.
- (d) The Home Affairs Department provides annual subventions totalling \$2 million to 20 district sports associations (DSAs) to promote sports development at the district level. In 2010-11, the LCSD plans to organise 230 programmes with DSAs at an estimated cost of around \$9 million.

For the programmes targeted at youth/students, the number of participants per year ranged from 3 000 to 125 000. The annual expenditure for the above-mentioned programmes ranged from \$0.17 million to \$3.3 million. The Ping Wo Fund has also provided annual funding to two counselling and treatment centres for problem and pathological gamblers since 2003 and another two

centres of a smaller scale since 2007. The annual funding support for the four centres was \$9.6 million.

(b) The Administration will continue to make use of the Ping Wo Fund to support, amongst others, public education programmes which aim at preventing and alleviating gambling-related problems. We will consult the Ping Wo Fund Advisory Committee on the concrete work plan and resource requirements on education programme for the coming years.

They provide a total of 580 bedspaces.
- (b)&(c) The Home Affairs Department's Singleton Hostel Programme was specifically launched to tie in with the introduction of the licensing regime under the Bedspace

Apartments Ordinance (Cap 447). The objective of the Programme is to provide short-term accommodation for those bedspace lodgers affected by the implementation of the Ordinance through services provided by the non-governmental organisations. As the hostels under the Programme are run by non-governmental organisations on a self-financing basis or with subsidy from trust funds, the Government do not need to provide funding for the operation of the Programme.

a rate not lower than the average rate stipulated for the relevant industries/occupations in the latest "Quarterly Report of Wage and Payroll Statistics" published by the Census and Statistics Department.

Based on the progress reports submitted by the social enterprises, about two-third of the approved projects could meet or exceed the projected targets (e.g. sale volume, profit, etc.) stated in their original business proposals. A total of 51 projects have had their two-year funding period expired. Of these 51 projects, three have ceased operations.

As at the end of January 2010, there are around 16 200 buildings with OCs. Around 94.7% of them have procured third party risks insurance. In 2010, we will strengthen our work in this area to ensure that all OCs will be provided with the necessary support.

Reply :

To tackle the management problems of buildings, the Home Affairs Department will continue to visit owners of private buildings in various districts, promote good practice of managing their buildings and attend owners' meetings. We will also provide them with a range of assistance according to their needs, including introducing to owners the various building maintenance schemes offered by the Government, the Hong Kong Housing Society (HKHS) and the Urban Renewal Authority.

Furthermore, the Home Affairs Bureau will, in collaboration with HKHS and professional associations of the property management industry, launch a trial scheme called "Building Management Professional Service Scheme" in April this year. The Scheme will provide owners with free professional advice on property management and follow up services to improve the management of 1 000 units in old private buildings. Through assistance to owners who cannot organise themselves for action or lack professional knowledge, it is hoped that the Scheme will set a good example and raise the awareness of owners of the benefits of continuous management and regular maintenance, thereby enhancing the living environment of private buildings.

The District Building Management Liaison Teams will carry out the above work as part and parcel of their normal duties. At present, about 110 Liaison Officers are undertaking duties relating to building management. The expenditure involved is approximately \$48.3 million.

The Administration will continue to assist residents and owners in the formation and servicing of mutual aid committees (MACs) and owners' corporations (OCs). In view of the extension and expansion of the Operation Building Bright and the collapse of a building on Ma Tau Wai Road, it is expected that more private buildings will need upkeep and setting up of resident organisations such as OCs and MACs. In this connection, please inform this Committee of the following:

- i) time required from application to establishment of an OC or MAC, including the average time, minimum time, maximum time and lower quartile time; and
- ii) detailed explanations for the data above.

Reply :

The Government encourages owners to form owners' corporations (OCs) for effective building management. The normal procedures and time required are as follows:

- 1. Appointing a convenor of the meeting of owners and compiling owners' information: about 30 days
- 2. Giving notice of meeting of owners: 14 days
- 3. Appointing a management committee at the meeting of owners and preparing documents for application for registration: 28 days

4. Processing the application for registration by the Land Registry: one to three months

In addition to the above statutory procedures, there is usually an incubation period during which owners discuss matters about OC formation and ascertain the wish of individual owners. The length of the incubation period varies from one case to another.

The minimum time, maximum time and average time required from application to establishment of an OC is approximately 3.5 months, 5.5 months and 4.5 months respectively.

The Government encourages residents of buildings to form mutual aid committees (MACs) with the objectives of enhancing the spirit of mutual assistance in the neighbourhood and fostering a sense of belonging to the community. District Offices (DOs) will assist residents in the formation of MACs. The general procedures and time required are as follows:

- 1. Liaising with residents to find out if they wish to form an MAC and take up office-bearers posts in the executive committee: about 14 to 21 days.
- 2. Giving notice of meeting of floor representatives to residents and convening the meeting to elect the representatives: seven days (exclusive of the days of notice and meeting).
- 3. Giving notice of meeting of flat representatives to residents and convening the meeting to elect office-bearers of the executive committee and appoint auditors: seven days (exclusive of the days of notice and meeting).
- 4. Following-up and completing the examination of the required documents with the office-bearers of the executive committee and the departments concerned: 21 to 35 days.
- 5. Processing the relevant documents and issuing the certificate of exemption from registration under the Societies Ordinance by DOs: 21 days.

The minimum time, maximum time and average time required from residents' reaching agreement to forming an MAC to receipt of the certificate of exemption from registration is approximately ten weeks, 13 weeks and 11.5 weeks respectively.

The number of OCs successfully formed with the assistance of the Home Affairs Department (HAD) is 219 in 2008 and 315 in 2009, and is expected to be about 250 in 2010-11. We do not have a comprehensive record of the figures on enquiries. When we are aware that owners have the intention of forming an OC, we will promptly provide them with the necessary assistance, including convening meetings of owners and offering advice and detailed information on the procedures to form an OC and matters required attention. For example, in response to the incidents of objects being thrown from height in the Yau Tsim Mong district

since the end of 2008, the District Office immediately took the initiative to approach the property owners in the areas concerned to help them form OCs so as to enhance building management as well as security.

The publicity activities include the publication of pamphlets on estate beneficiaries support services and distribution of such to the public through various outlets such as the Public Enquiry Service Centres (PESCs) of HAD, the Probate Registry of the Judiciary, the Deaths Registries of the Immigration Department, public hospitals, major funeral parlours, etc. We also provide the relevant information in the website of HAD (<u>www.had.gov.hk/estates</u>) and the Hong Kong SAR Government portal (<u>www.gov.hk/en/residents/immigration</u>). In addition, the Estate Beneficiaries Support Unit (the Unit) maintains a hotline to answer public enquiries about the support services. Staff at the PESCs also attend to public enquiries. Members of the public may contact the Unit by telephone, mail or e-mail. The contact details are available on the HAD website and publicity pamphlets. Moreover, we have made available at the office of the Unit a suggestion box to receive suggestions from the public.

Reply :

(a) Starting from January 2008, a series of measures have been fully implemented in 18 districts to enhance the functions of the District Councils (DCs).

The measures include, amongst others, increasing the annual provision to DCs in organising community involvement (CI) programmes and activities to \$300 million and providing an annual provision of \$300 million under the District Minor Works (DMW) Programme for DCs to initiate and implement minor works in districts, particularly those management involves DCs. The actual expenditure for CI programmes and activities and DMW projects was close to \$300 million each in 2008-09.

In addition, all DCs have been involved in the management of some district facilities including community halls, public libraries, leisure grounds and sports venues. District Facilities Management Committees have been set up under DCs to oversee facilities management. Furthermore, the Heads of Departments with direct interface with the public have continued to attend DC meetings regularly to enhance the communication

between senior Government officials and DCs. The associated expenditure is absorbed within the existing resources of the departments concerned.

Since the implementation of the above measures to enhance the functions of DC in 2008, we have strengthened the manpower resources for District Offices (DOs) to support their work in promoting district administration. Each District Office has been provided with one additional Liaison Officer, one Executive Officer and one Assistant Clerical Officer. Another six posts of Liaison Officer were provided to districts with larger population. The guidelines on the use of DC funds have also been revised to allow the use of not more than 10% of the annual allocation of DCs for engaging additional staff to help DCs carry out DC-related duties. As at 31 January 2010, about 175 full-time and 61 part-time contract staff have been employed.

(b) DCs have been actively collaborating with various sectors and government departments to initiate a large number of CI programmes and activities to help build a more caring community and meet the special needs of the respective districts. In parallel, a total of over 1 600 projects were endorsed and implemented since the roll-out of the DMW programme in 2008-09. These projects helped improve local facilities and beautify the environment for the benefit of the local community.

At the same time, DCs have made good progress in participating in the management of district facilities. They have been actively involved in initiating various proposals to relevant government departments on improving facilities management. For example, with the support of DCs, the Leisure and Culture Services Department has, since April 2009, extended the operating hours of 33 major and district libraries by nine to ten hours each week. The facilities of some community halls and sports venues have been upgraded, e.g. replacement of the heating system of swimming pools, to better meet the needs of the public.

As the number of DMW projects that can be implemented within the \$300 million provision will depend on the nature and scale of the projects to be endorsed by the DCs and the progress of individual projects, we cannot provide at this stage an estimate of the number of projects to be implemented.

The provision for the Rural Public Works (RPW) Programme in 2010-11 is \$120 million. We plan to implement about 300 RPW projects which include construction of access roads/van tracks, footpaths/footbridges/country trails, drainage system/stream embankment, and rain shelters/sitting-out areas/pavilions, provision of notice boards and beautification works, etc.

Reply :

(a) The Expo 2010 Shanghai China will be held for six months from 1 May to 31 October this year. The Information Services Department (ISD) is mainly responsible for the planning and implementation of publicity and promotion work before and during the Expo period to highlight Hong Kong's strengths and advantages. The work includes the development of an Online Hong Kong Pavilion for the Expo Shanghai Online project, as well as the design and production of souvenirs and publicity materials. We will publicise promotional messages to visitors to the Hong Kong Pavilion and Hong Kong's Urban Best Practices Area exhibition to arouse their interest in Hong Kong. (b) Funding for the above activities, including the production of souvenirs and publicity work was approved by the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council on 4 July 2008. An amount of \$64 million was earmarked for activities while \$20 million was reserved for the production of souvenirs and publicity work. In addition, ISD committed to use departmental funding of \$5 million in 2009-10 for souvenirs and publicity, and another \$5 million for the same purposes in 2010-11. ISD is taking forward these initiatives by harnessing and redeploying existing resources and manpower. A time-limited Chief Information Officer post and two short-term Non-Civil Service Contract (positions have also been created specially to deal with publicity and promotion work relating to the Expo.

In February 2008, the HKSAR Government and the Hong Kong Institute of Architects joined hands to organise the concept design competition for the Hong Kong Pavilion, which was open to all professionals in the local design and architectural sectors. Publicity work for the competition was carried out by the ISD. Since then, the department has organised promotional activities on key important days during the countdown to Expo. Publicity and promotion work will continue until the end of October this year.

(c) The official website dedicated to Hong Kong's participation in the Expo was launched in May 2009 to keep the public informed of the latest development on Hong Kong's preparations for, and participation in, the Expo. A mobile version of the website will be rolled out shortly, while online interactive games will also be launched later. About \$0.93 million has been provisioned to carry out the website work undertaken by the ISD. We shall keep on enhancing the content of the website and make use of online resources to boost interactive communications between members of the public and the Government in respect of Hong Kong's participation in the Expo.

Where information is required from third parties, the actual processing time would depend on the time taken by third parties to provide the information.

Given the above, the planned performance target for processing legal aid applications in 2010 is considered realistic. Indeed, we have always strived to do better than the performance target. This can be seen from the performance figures for 2008 and 2009, where our actual performance has exceeded our stated targets. In addition to the existing 37 swimming pool complexes, 24 major parks and 25 sports grounds, LCSD will provide six new swimming pool complexes and three major parks from 2011 to 2013. The six new swimming pool complexes, which are under construction, are in Central and Western District, Siu Sai Wan, Lam Tin, Tuen Mun, Tung Chung and Tin Shui Wai. Construction work on three new major parks in Central and Western District, Wong Tai Sin and Tseung Kwan O is either underway or will soon commence. LCSD is also considering the provision of new sports grounds.

In considering the provision of new recreation and sports facilities, LCSD will take into account guidance set out in the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines, the views of District Councils, the public demand for facilities, the utilisation rates of current facilities, the population of individual districts and the availability of resources.

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) is committed to improving public library services on an on-going basis by providing new libraries as well as reprovisioning existing libraries with enhanced facilities and services. In addition to the existing 66 static libraries and ten mobile libraries, a new library in Siu Sai Wan, which is currently under construction, is scheduled to open in 2011. In addition, the two existing libraries in Yat Tung Estate in Tung Chung and Butterfly Estate in Tuen Mun will be reprovisioned to larger premises in 2010 with much improved facilities and services; and another four existing libraries in Lam Tin, Pak Tin, Tin Shui Wai and Yuen Long respectively will be reprovisioned in the coming years. Construction works for these projects are either underway or will soon commence.

Apart from setting up new libraries and reprovisioning existing libraries to larger premises, there are also on-going renovation programmes to improve the facilities and reading environment of some existing libraries. Under the renovation programme, libraries which have been in service for ten years or more will be renovated by phases.

In considering the provision of new libraries and enhancing existing library services, LCSD will take into account factors such as the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines, the views of District Councils, the public demand for and utilisation of library facilities, the population of the respective districts and the availability of resources.

The downward adjustment in the Revised Estimate for Programme (3): Heritage and Museums for 2009-10 by \$15.3 million or 2.5% (from \$601.5 million to \$586.2 million) as compared to the 2009-10 Original Estimate is due to the following reasons:

- (a) the estimate for restoration of **declared monuments** (Subhead 600 Works) has been adjusted downwards by \$5.3 million (from \$14 million to \$8.7 million) due to adjustments to the schedule of some of the restoration projects to take account of the latest progress of the discussion with the owners concerned regarding the proposed declaration of their buildings as monuments under the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance;
- (b) the estimate for restoration of **historic buildings** (Subhead 653) has been adjusted downwards by \$2.7 million (from \$7.2 million to \$4.5 million). The decrease in expenditure takes account of the updated progress of the projects which have received financial assistance under the Financial Assistance for Maintenance Scheme for privately-owned historic buildings. Payments to the private owners are made on a reimbursement basis upon works completion. Such works sometimes take a longer time

to complete as the owners are required to engage specialist consultants and works contractors to prepare the work scope/ specifications and to carry out the maintenance works;

- (c) there is a downward adjustment of about \$4.1 million in Subhead 603: Plant, vehicles and equipment as the payment schedules for two capital account projects have been revised, i.e. replacement of the Planetarium Star Projector and provision of 3D full dome projection system of the Hong Kong Space Museum. The payment will be effected in 2010-11; and
- (d) there is a net decrease of \$3.2 million in recurrent expenditure mainly due to the revised estimates in salary provisions as a few posts under the programme area were left vacant or not yet created as planned.

The respective average usage rates of natural and artificial turf pitches are calculated as a percentage of the total number of sessions available for use by hirers. Due to the need to maintain the grass surface in a playable condition, natural turf pitches can only provide 60 sessions a month for hiring; whereas artificial turf pitches, which require less frequent maintenance, can provide a total of 270 sessions a month, i.e., four times more than that of natural grass pitches. As a result of the larger number of sessions available including those during non-peak hours, the overall average usage rate for artificial turf pitches is generally lower than that of natural turf pitches. However, it should be noted that the usage rate of artificial turf pitches at peak hours is nearly 100% which reflects a strong public demand for such facilities. To make available more sessions for training and public use, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department will continue to provide more artificial turf pitches in the coming years by building new artificial turf pitches and converting existing natural turf pitches into artificial ones.

Under the concessionary arrangement, senior citizens aged 60 or above can enjoy half-rate concession to swimming pools and water sports centres at any time, as well as half-priced use of land-based recreation and sports facilities during non-peak hours. Persons with disabilities and recognised disability service agencies are entitled to half-rate concessions when hiring any recreation and sports facilities at any time. The Department also operates a "Free Use Scheme" whereby it waives hire charges for schools, national sports associations, district sports associations and subvented non-government organisations for the hire of selected sports facilities during non-peak hours (from 7am to 5pm, Monday to Friday except public holidays) from September of each year to June of the following year.

The Scheme is now being implemented in 11 performance venues managed by LCSD. It aims to facilitate and encourage performing arts groups of different sizes to best utilise LCSD's venue resources so as to support their artistic pursuits and develop the artistic characteristics of the individual venues. The Administration welcomes private venue operators to collaborate with arts groups in similar ways that may suit their management and development objectives.

Initially, chamber music concerts, small scale drama production and environmental dance that suit the individual characteristics of these venues will be presented. As regards the Museum of Tea Ware, as the franchised operator of the Tea House currently presents Chinese music concerts inside the Tea House during weekends, LCSD will stage programmes with different themes at the outdoor areas surrounding the museum at different times to complement the existing performances and avoid duplication. The Department does not envisage that the current performances staged by the Tea House will be affected by the programmes.

In 2010-11, nine programmes (providing over 45 performances) with different themes at an estimated budget of \$1.2 million are being planned at these above-mentioned venues.

The Administration will design new exhibits and environmental decoration for the renovation of the exhibition halls of the Hong Kong Space Museum. Please specify what the new exhibits will be mainly made up of. What is the expenditure required? Will any open competition be organised? If not, what are the reasons?

Reply :

Hong Kong Space Museum is planning to renovate its two exhibition halls which have a total area of 1 600 square meters at a cost of about \$32 million. The museum is now working on the story-line and conceptual design of the exhibits. The renovation is expected to be completed by the end of 2011.

The plan is to renovate the exhibition hall on the ground floor of the Museum with new exhibits to illustrate the evolution and development of the universe. To enhance visitors' experience, a dimmed and mysterious environment will be created through the use of lighting, wall murals and elaborated decorations.

The exhibition hall on the first floor will be used to illustrate the themes of space exploration and Sun-Earth relationship. To highlight the high-tech space technology, lighting effects and environmental decorations will be used to create a futuristic and surrealistic environment. For instance, in the proposed "How You Feel in Space" exhibit, visitors will experience disorientation as if they are in a weightless space environment and appreciate the unusual physical properties of matter by entering an upside down virtual space station. As the design of the two exhibition galleries requires specialised knowledge in space science and astronomy, the Department considers it more appropriate for the Museum curators to draw up the conceptual plan in consultation with expert advisers instead of conducting an open competition. A professional exhibit designer and an exhibit fabricator will be engaged through open tender to build and install the exhibits.

The Department is committed to increasing community involvement in the museum work. For instance, the Hong Kong Museum of Art has launched the Open Dialogue series where guest curators are involved in curating thematic art exhibitions. The Department will continue to explore suitable opportunities for involving the relevant stakeholders and the public in the museum work.

If defects are observed, the venue management will request the maintenance agents to take prompt action to repair the damage and will monitor the progress of the works. The maintenance agents are also requested to maintain stocks of essential spare parts to speed up the repair of defective equipment. LCSD will select appropriately durable and vandal-proof equipment when planning the specification for new projects.

The Department also organises territory-wide sports competitions, including the Hong Kong Games, Master Games and Corporate Games to promote a sporting culture in the community. LCSD will enhance its efforts to promote sport in the community in collaboration with different sectors of the community, including District Councils (DCs), non-government organisations, schools and the private sector.

LCSD is now following up on the recommendations set out in the consultancy study: "Sport for All – the Participation Patterns of Hong Kong People in Physical Activities". Since June 2009, the Department has been implementing Phase I of the study recommendations, by introducing the findings of the study and its recommended action plan to the 18 DCs, as well as promoting messages on the importance and benefits of regular participation in sport and other physical activities to schools and district organisations. LCSD will develop a promotional strategy focusing on the enhancement of sports related services in April 2010 when it begins to implement Phase II of the study. LCSD will review the current programme mix of community sports activities and the provision of sports facilities with a view to encouraging wider participation.

Reply :

- (a) The increasing awareness of the importance of oral history in Hong Kong is reflected by the growing number of oral history projects conducted by local tertiary institutions, archives, museums and non-government organisations, the publication of more books and research outputs on oral history and the inclusion of oral history activities in the secondary school curriculum.
- (b) The Administration launched the Hong Kong Oral History Special Collection project at the Hong Kong Central Library in October 2009. It aims to enhance public understanding of the value of oral history in the preservation of local culture and heritage, and to promote the use of oral history methods in Hong Kong studies. With the support of nine local tertiary institutes as founding partners, the project plans to collect and make available to the public oral history materials on Hong Kong for general reference and academic studies.

The Hong Kong Central Library has already made available for public access its collections of publications, research outputs and audio-visual programmes relating to Hong Kong's oral history. The oral history resources held by the tertiary institutions can be accessed through the "Hong Kong Oral History Information" thematic website http://www.hkpl.gov.hk/hkoralhistory.

As the Special Collection will be developed on a continuous basis, it is estimated that about \$0.6 million per annum will be required for the development and maintenance of the Collection. In addition, expenditure will be incurred by the Department in the acquisition of published materials for the Special Collection and in conducting or sponsoring relevant oral history research projects.

DCs can select one or more sports activities for further development in their respective districts having regard to its community characteristics and interest, facilities and demography of the local population. The sports activities that have been selected by DCs for promotion include air-gun shooting, archery, badminton, BMX cycling, canoe polo, dance, fitness, gateball, hiking, hockey, lawn bowl, soccer, sports climbing, swimming, table tennis, wushu and water sports activities.

In 2010-11, the 18 DCs will together organise some 700 programmes, including fun days, publicity campaigns and training schemes, to promote their characteristic sports activities at an estimated cost of \$3.6 million. It is expected that around 57 000 participants will be attracted to the activities.

In providing district recreation and sports facilities, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will take into account factors such as the views of DCs, public demand for the facilities, the usage rate of existing facilities, the population, and demographic profile of the

The internship programme aims at nurturing a pool of curators and visual art administrators to support the development of cultural software in Hong Kong. It is a 2-year programme providing on-the-job training on museum management including collection management, exhibition planning, art education, organisation of public art projects and venue management. Interns will be placed to work in the museums of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department to gain practical knowledge and hands-on experience in museum work under the guidance of experienced museum staff. Holders of relevant degrees who meet the entry requirements of Assistant Curator II of Art and History Streams and are interested in pursuing a career in museum management may apply for the internship. The programme will commence in the third quarter of 2010 with ten trainees recruited for the first intake for 2010 to 2012. The estimated annual expenditure on the internship programme is about \$1.7 million which comprises primarily payment of remuneration to the interns. The total estimated cost for the pilot of the scheme which will intake a total of 20 trainees is about \$6.8 million and will roll over in 2010-11 to 2013-14.

(a) The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) has been actively exploring new performance venues other than purpose-built halls for cultural presentations with the objectives of promoting the further development of arts in the community and unleashing synergy between different forms/themes of art and culture. In 2010-11, LCSD plans to present a series of performing arts programmes at selected historic buildings including Dr Sun Yat-sen Museum, Museum of Tea Ware, Museum of Coastal Defence and the Cattle Depot. Initially, chamber music concerts, small scale drama production and environmental dance that suit the individual characteristics of these venues will be presented.

In 2010-11, nine programmes (featuring over 45 performances) with different themes at an estimated budget of \$1.2 million are being planned at the above-mentioned venues.

(a) The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) co-ordinates a total of 20 cultural events, including 18 performing arts programmes and two visual art exhibitions, for presentation during the Expo 2010 Shanghai China from May to October 2010. The programmes are curated under the themes of "creativity, connectivity and vibrancy" to embrace different art forms including Cantonese opera, Chinese and western music, dance, drama, western opera, music theatre and multi-media performances, as well as art exhibitions.

A summary of the cultural programmes co-ordinated by the LCSD is set out in the <u>Annex</u>.

ПАDIO

The total expenditure for organising the above programmes is \$24.99 million (\$21.68 million for 18 performing arts programmes; and \$3.31 million for two visual art exhibitions).

About 21 000 priced tickets for 13 performing arts programmes co-ordinated by the Department will be put on sale at the venues concerned in Shanghai and via ticketing agents through the internet. There will also be programmes for free admission to be presented at public areas such as major malls in Shanghai, as well as the "Hong Kong Week" cultural programmes featured at the outdoor stages in the Expo Park. The Department is unable to provide an estimated number of visitors to these free programmes at this stage.

(b) The cultural programmes co-ordinated by LCSD serves to demonstrate the creativity and rich diversity of Hong Kong's arts talents from major, small and youth arts groups covering different art forms. The LCSD will work closely with other arts organisations providing programmes during the Expo to create synergy in promoting local artists and arts groups to the Mainland and world audiences.

Under the Venue Partnership Scheme (VPS), the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) provides support to 20 Venue Partners (VPs) of 11 performance venues in the form of : (a) priority use of the venue facilities; (b) provision of funding support; (c) provision of work space; and (d) enhanced publicity support such as publicising the VPs' programmes in the partnering venues' monthly event calendars, advertising their programmes in local newspapers, and the use of exclusive display areas and wall banner sites at the venues for programme promotion.

Insofar as provision of funding support is concerned, for the nine VPs which are major performing groups receiving annual subvention from the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB), the Bureau provides additional funding under the VPS for VPS-related activities, staff cost and rental charges (totalling \$16.5 million in 2009-10). For the other 11 VPs which are medium and small-sized companies, LCSD provides each of them with an annual programme fee (up to \$1 million) to cover production-related, staff and administrative costs, in addition to the free use of the venue facilities, ticketing services, and the administrative and publicity support mentioned in the paragraph above. The total funding support provided by LCSD (including notional charges) for these 11 performing groups amounts to \$19.1 million in 2009-10.

Breakdown of the funding support (actual and notional, as applicable) from HAB and LCSD in 2009-10 under the VPS is set out in the <u>Annex</u>. The funding has not taken into account the costs involved in providing work space and publicity support to the VPs.

Reply:

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) is dedicated to the preservation, promotion and development of Cantonese opera. The promotion efforts centre on the organisation of performances, exhibitions, as well as related audience building and educational activities to enhance the audiences' appreciation of this traditional art form. The LCSD is in full awareness of the importance of nurturing scriptwriting talent. When presenting Cantonese opera programmes, the Department will encourage opera troupes to have more collaborations with promising local and Mainland scriptwriters in order to have a diversified range of scripts and to identify budding scriptwriting talent. Each year, the Department will support the presentation of some 20 performances of new Cantonese opera works and adapted works of traditional *Paichang Xi*, as well as re-run of popular new Cantonese opera works. In 2010-11, the LCSD will set aside around \$3 million for staging new works mentioned above in

order to support the creative works of Cantonese opera and the preservation of the traditional art form.

The LCSD is also in active partnership with organisations in the community. These include collaboration with the Cantonese Opera Academy of Hong Kong in presenting the finale performances by students of the Certificate Course in Training of Cantonese Opera. The focus of the Certificate Course in Training of Cantonese Opera which the Academy offered in 2009 was on the training of Cantonese opera scriptwriters and instrumental accompanists.

In the long run, the promotion of creative works and research on Cantonese opera depends on the joint efforts of and collaboration among academic institutions, cultural organisations and the Cantonese opera sector in order to achieve sustainable development.

The directorate post to be created in the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) is an Analyst/Programmer grade (D1) post, while the 162 non-directorate posts to be created cover ten different grades, viz. Leisure Services Manager, Amenities Assistant, Librarian, Manager (Cultural Services), Curator, Technical Officer (Cultural Services), Executive Officer, Clerical Officer, Clerical Assistant and Artisan. The staff concerned will be responsible for providing leisure and cultural services in such areas as swimming pools, parks, sports centres and preservation of cultural heritage, as well as general and technical support for the Department.

Civil service staff will be deployed to fill the 163 posts upon creation. The number of posts and the estimated salary provision per annum by Programme are listed below:

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) has been supporting small and medium-sized performing arts groups through presenting and sponsoring their productions with the provision of artist fees and/or venue and ticketing services support. In 2010-11, LCSD is planning to present or sponsor about 3 700 performances/activities with an estimated budget of \$94 million to support young and budding artists as well as small and medium-sized performing arts groups through engaging them in regular cultural presentations, festival and entertainment programmes, audience building and arts education projects. In addition to the provision of funding support, LCSD will launch the following initiatives in order to increase the performance opportunities of small and medium-sized arts groups:

(a) <u>Exploring new performance venues</u>

To provide small and medium-sized groups and young artists with more performing opportunities, LCSD has been actively exploring new performance venues/space including those managed by non-government organisations, tertiary institutions and schools such as the Jockey Club Creative Arts Centre and Lee Shau Kee School of Creativity. LCSD will also make available suitable historic sites such as Dr Sun Yat-sen Museum and Museum of Tea Ware for staging performances.

(b) <u>Enhancing performance platforms for local artists</u>

In 2010-11, LCSD plans to organise a series of thematic programmes of various art forms to provide platforms for local artists with potential to further their skills. These include "Our Music Talents", "Dance in Motion Series", "Playwright Scheme", "Young Cantonese Opera Artists Series". To enable local arts groups to build up their own repertoires, a new series called "Re-run Run Shows" is planned to re-stage popular classics by local theatre groups.

(c) <u>Venue Partnership Scheme</u>

Under the Venue Partnership Scheme, a total of 26 small and medium-sized performing arts groups are involved as Venue Partners at LCSD's performance venues. They are provided with free venue and funding support to organise programmes and audience building activities at the respective venues for three years from 2009-10 to 2011-12. A provision of \$10 million has been earmarked for funding their activities annually.

Under Programme (4) – Performing Arts, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) plans to launch a new trainee scheme from 2010-11 to 2014-15, aiming to nurture a pool of arts administrators to support the development of cultural software in Hong Kong. The trainees will be engaged by LCSD and the partners of its performance venues (Venue Partners under the Venue Partnership Scheme) comprising major and medium/small-sized performing companies.

For the LCSD's programme at its performance venues and programme offices, the trainees will gain practical knowledge and hands-on experience in managing arts venues and events. They will be provided with comprehensive training in venue management, facilities maintenance, planning of programmes, carnivals and arts festivals, as well as events marketing and promotion. In 2010-11, 13 trainees on arts administration will be engaged on a 2-year term basis, totalling 26 trainees for two terms between 2010-11 and 2013-14. Degree holders who are interested in pursuing a career in arts management may apply for joining the scheme.

For the 20 Venue Partners comprising major and small/medium-sized groups at LCSD's 11 performance venues, each of them will be provided with funding to engage an arts administrator trainee during the five-year period from 2010-11 to 2014-15. Each trainee will be engaged on a one-year term basis and be provided with practical training in the management of performing companies. A maximum of 100 trainees will be benefited from this programme. The Venue Partners will decide on the entry requirements for their trainees having regard to their specific needs.

The estimated total expenditure for the trainee scheme for five years from 2010-11 to 2014-15 will be \$25.48 million which comprises primarily payment of monthly allowances to the trainees and related administrative costs. The Department will also launch a similar trainee programme for training 20 museum curators under Programme (3) – Heritage and Museums at a total cost of about \$6.8 million.

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) strives to enhance the Urban Ticketing System (URBTIX) continuously so as to better serve the changing needs of event presenters and the audience, including those from overseas and the Mainland. To this end, the following system enhancements will be implemented in 2010-11 or are under active planning:

- (a) to facilitate customers, particularly those outside Hong Kong, to purchase tickets through the Internet without waiting for the delivery of tickets by post, ticket dispensing machines (TDMs) will be installed at all LCSD's performing arts venues. Patrons who purchase tickets through the Internet or telephone with credit card payment can collect their tickets at the venue from the TDMs on or before the event date. New TDMs are being installed at the venues and the installation will be completed within 2010-11;
- (b) to facilitate Mainland visitors to purchase tickets while they are in Hong Kong, arrangements are being made to enable the acceptance of ChinaUnion Pay (CUP) credit cards at URBTIX outlets within 2010-11; and

(c) to facilitate Mainland residents to purchase tickets through the Internet or telephone using credit cards, the Department and the contractor of the URBTIX service are actively exploring with the parties concerned the feasibility of accepting CUP card for payment purpose.

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) has all along been providing support to arts groups of the disadvantaged and persons with disabilities or rehabilitation agencies in their organisation of performing arts programmes, workshops or exhibitions so as to provide opportunities for the disadvantaged and persons with disabilities to develop their artistic potential. In 2010-11, the LCSD will co-operate with the Arts with the Disabled Association Hong Kong in the Community Cultural Ambassador Scheme project *Dancing Keys*. It will also support the Theatre of the Silence in presenting public performances of the drama *Room 101* and giving a visual-physical theatre performance. The relevant direct production cost is about \$160,000. Support in terms of free venue and ticketing services will also be provided by the Department.

In the 2009/2010 school year, 4 070 students from 41 special schools will participate in the School Culture Day Scheme (SCDS) organised by the Department to attend arts activities held at LCSD cultural venues. Apart from that, there will be a total of 860 students from seven special schools participating in the School Arts Animateur Scheme (SAAS), through which artists will visit the schools to conduct a series of training activities including introductory

performances, workshops, finale performances, etc. Most of the SCDS events are free of charge. As for workshops under the SAAS, a 50% discount on workshop fees is offered to students of special schools.

In addition, the LCSD also offers a 50% discount on admission tickets to persons with disabilities and a pre-set quota of Comprehensive Social Security Assistance recipients to encourage them to attend regular performing arts programmes.

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) has set aside \$18 million per annum from 2010-11 onwards for the implementation of enhanced feeder programmes by 21 national sports associations (NSAs) and two sports associations for disabled athletes. The funding will provide resources for young and upcoming athletes to attend more local and overseas international competitions, as well as intensified youth training and squad training programmes.

The 21 sports covered by this initiative are those whose athletes have achieved a relating higher level of performance in international junior competitions, indicating that the feeder programmes implemented by their NSAs have the potential and capability to deliver results. The NSAs concerned will be invited to submit proposals for enhancement of their feeder programmes. The proposals will be assessed having regard to factors such as the viability of the training programmes and the performance goals set by the NSAs.

In the light of the Audit Report, in January 2010, LCSD started a comprehensive review of the Sports Subvention Scheme with a view to streamlining procedures, enhancing accountability and improving overall effectiveness and efficiency. One of the issues under review is to examine ways to link the allocation of annual subvention more effectively to the performance of individual NSAs, including their governance standards and the achievement of targets set under the Subvention Agreement signed with LCSD.

In promoting the further development of sport in Hong Kong, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) accords priority to national sports associations (NSAs) and professional sports teams in the use of LCSD's sports facilities by allowing them to make block booking three to 12 months in advance for organising competitions and training programmes. To strike a balance between meeting the demand for the use of sports facilities by the NSAs and sports teams on the one hand and members of the public on the other, LCSD implements a quota system under which up to one-third of the peak hour sessions may be block-booked by NSAs and sports organisations. The Department will continue to explore the possibility of making available more sessions to the NSAs to better meet their training needs.

In January 2010, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) started a comprehensive review of the Sports Subvention Scheme (the Scheme) with a view to streamlining procedures, enhancing accountability and improving overall effectiveness and efficiency. The review is examining issues relating to the allocation of subvention, LCSD's monitoring work, and national sports associations' (NSAs) reporting requirements, internal control and compliance under the Scheme; as well as the necessary manpower and financial resources required to implement the recommendations of the review. To enhance governance and monitoring under the Scheme, the review will recommend measures to: (a) help NSAs improve internal controls and compliance with guidelines promulgated under the Scheme through, for example, development of best practices and codes of conduct; and (b) strengthen LCSD's monitoring role through, for example, rationalisation of the current reporting requirements and development of a computerised system to improve efficiency.

LCSD is conducting the review through internal deployment of resources. The review is expected to be completed in early 2011.

(a) <u>Number of agency workers, contracts and duties of the agency workers</u>

As at 30 September 2009 $\frac{\text{Note 1}}{\text{Note 1}}$, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) had some 230 service contracts engaging a total of 299 agency workers. The periods of these service contracts ranged from two months to 24 months, with the majority of them (85%) lasting for 12 months or less. The agency workers were mainly engaged to assist in meeting short-term service demands or service needs which entail irregular work pattern, including –

- (i) assisting in the organisation of short-term leisure and cultural programmes / projects, e.g. the Hong Kong International Film Festival, the Silk Road Arts Festival, arts and crafts fairs, exhibitions, Flower Show, etc.;
- (ii) assisting in data collection and processing work, e.g. editing of film materials, data verification, cataloguing and input, etc.;
- (iii) filling short-term manpower gap pending the appointment of civil servants and / or Non-Civil Service Contract (NCSC) staff; and
- (iv) providing stage management and technical support services in the performance venues.

[Note 1 : Information on the use of agency workers is kept by individual venues / offices and there is no single division / section in the Department which keeps complete records of such information centrally. The information provided in this reply was a snapshot of the situation as at 30 September 2009 in response to a special survey conducted by the Civil Service Bureau. The Department had taken a few weeks' time to gather and analyse relevant information from individual venues / offices to provide a snapshot as at 30 September 2009.]

(b) <u>Salary of the agency workers</u>

The contracts LCSD entered into with employment agencies specify the service fee charged by the latter in providing agency workers. The Department normally does not specify the wages of agency workers, except with regard to the wages of

non-skilled workers $\frac{Note 2}{2}$. Hence the Department is unable to provide the information requested.

[Note 2 : As a measure to protect non-skilled workers, the Administration promulgated a mandatory requirement on wage rates for government service contracts in May 2004. Under this requirement, service providers are required to offer monthly wages to non-skilled workers which are no less than the average monthly wages for the relevant industry/occupation as published in the latest Census and Statistics Department's Quarterly Report of Wage and Payroll Statistics at the time when tenders are invited. This requirement applies to service contracts in respect of supply of non-skilled agency workers.]

(c) <u>Proportion of agency workers as compared with the manpower of LCSD</u>

As at 30 September 2009, agency workers accounted for about 3% of the total manpower of LCSD.

(d) Expenditure for procuring the services of employment agencies

As 30 September 2009, the total contract value of the above-mentioned agency service contracts was about \$32 million, representing 0.6% of the approved estimate of LCSD in 2009-10.

(e) <u>Other services</u>

Apart from the above agency workers, LCSD has also engaged agency services to provide supplementary manpower support in respect of information technology (IT) and public library services.

(i) <u>IT service</u>

The Department has secured supplementary IT manpower through technical service providers engaged under a term contract centrally administered by the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer (hereafter referred to as "T-contract staff"). As at 30 September 2009, LCSD engaged some 50 T-contract staff to assist in developing computer systems and programmes or managing specific IT projects. This arrangement allows the Department to tap the latest market expertise in developing IT systems and programmes, and better manage their fluctuating IT manpower requirements. It also enables technology transfer between the Department's IT staff and IT professionals in the private sector.

(ii) <u>Public library service</u>

The engagement of manpower from employment agencies (hereafter referred to as "service bureau staff") to supplement the provision of frontline service in public libraries dated back to the former Urban Council days. Service bureau staff assist the core workforce (comprising civil servants and NCSC staff) in the public libraries to deliver counter and customer services, sort and shelve library materials, perform patrol and other miscellaneous duties. The supplementary support services are provided on a man-hour basis, and are usually required during peak-demand periods, such as lunch hours, after-school hours, weekends and public holidays.

The terms and conditions, including fringe benefits, which are offered to NCSC staff in the Department follow the principles governing the employment of NCSC staff under the NCSC Staff Scheme, i.e. the terms offered are no less favourable than those provided for under the Employment Ordinance (EO), and no more favourable than those applicable to civil servants in comparable civil service ranks or comparable levels of responsibilities. Generally speaking, LCSD offers better employment terms than those under the EO in a number of areas including end-of-contract gratuity, annual leave, full pay maternity leave, supplementary paid sick leave in addition to the sick leave entitlement under the EO.

It is the government's established policy to fill civil service vacancies through an open, fair and competitive recruitment process. In filling civil service openings through open recruitment, the Government welcomes all interested candidates who meet the relevant basic entry requirements to apply for the jobs, and compete on the basis of their overall merits. Generally speaking, NCSC staff who have met the basic entry requirements of the job and possess working experience relevant to the job should enjoy a competitive edge over other candidates in the selection process.

For the various civil service open recruitment exercises conducted by LCSD for departmental grades since June 2006, the Department received a total of 675 qualified applications from the Department's NCSC staff. About 520 of these NCSC staff have been found suitable for appointment, among whom some 440 have been offered appointment as civil servants as at 1 March 2010. Those who are found suitable for appointment but not yet offered civil service appointments will be put on a waiting list and be offered appointment as and when vacancies arise thereafter. - (b) The existing Tung Chung Public Library at Yat Tung Estate has 490 000 items of library materials lent out and 530 000 attendance in 2009. It is served by eight staff, including one Assistant Librarian, one Library Officer and six Library Assistants, with an annual recurrent expenditure of about \$3.3 million.
- (c) The new Tung Chung Public Library will be a full-fledged district library served by 22 staff, including one Librarian, three Assistant Librarians, two Library Officers and 16 Library Assistants. The estimated annual recurrent expenditure involved is about \$12 million. Its staffing requirements will be partially met by redeploying the staff at the temporary library at Yat Tung Estate.

The publicity programmes include the broadcasting of Announcements in the Public Interest on television and radio, distribution of swimmers' handbooks and safety guidelines on water sports activities to the public, display of posters and publicity banners, promotion of water safety through LCSD's webpage and GovHK, and regular announcement at public swimming pools and beaches to raise swimmers' awareness of swimming safety. LCSD launches the Water Safety Campaign each year in collaboration with the Hong Kong Life Saving Society and invites students from primary and secondary schools to take part in the Water Safety Poster Design and Slogan Competitions. Besides, the Water Safety Afloat Educational Seminar jointly organised by the Marine Department, the Hong Kong Police Force and LCSD aims at promoting public education and awareness of safety afloat. In 2010-11, an estimated \$110,000 is earmarked for carrying out publicity programmes to promote public awareness of water sports safety.

Special attention has been given to those who are not aware of social welfare services available or are unmotivated to receive such services. The agreed level of newly reached individuals for the service is 400 in a year.

In 2009-10, the CSNT fulfilled all the service performance requirements as set out in the Funding and Service Agreement. The estimated expenditure for the CSNT in 2010-11 is \$1.5 million.

Reply :

The Social Welfare Department sought funding of \$104.86 million from the Lotteries Fund for modernising 11 CCs to upgrade their physical environment and facilities. The grant will be allocated as a lump sum and the operating non-governmental organisations (NGOs) will be given flexibility to upgrade and modernise their centre premises which include up-to-date fitting out works and facilities, as well as furniture and equipment to attract more service users and meet their changing needs.

The beneficiary CCs include two in Central and Western District, two in Southern District, and one each in Wan Chai District, Kowloon City District, Kwun Tong District, Yau Tsim Mong District, Kwai Tsing District, Tuen Mun District and Yuen Long District.

The modernisation package for CCs is expected to be completed by end of 2010-11. As agreed with the operating NGOs, there will be no additional recurrent financial implications or additional staffing arising from the modernisation works.

For "Construction of an annex building for Ko Shan Theatre", the project is now under detailed design stage and construction works is planned to start in end 2010 and complete in mid 2013, subject to the funding approval of the Finance Committee.

The estimated project cost is approximately \$730 million. Detailed design is still in progress. We plan to submit a funding application for the project to the Public Works Subcommittee in mid 2010.

We estimate that the proposed works will create about 378 jobs (330 for labourers and 48 for professional/technical staff) providing a total employment of 10 886 man-months.

For the "Joint-user complex at Bailey Street, To Kwa Wan Reclamation", the construction works is planned to start in July 2010 and complete in February 2013. The approved project estimate is \$476.4 million. We estimate that the proposed works will create about 288 jobs
