LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PANEL ON DEVELOPMENT

Revision of Fees and Charges under the Purview of the Water Supplies Department

PURPOSE

This paper outlines the Administration's proposed revision of 18 government fees and charges for services under the purview of Water Supplies Department which do not directly affect people's livelihood or general business activities.

THE PROPOSAL

- 2. In line with the "user pays" principle, it is Government's policy that fees and charges should in general be set at levels sufficient to recover the full cost of providing the services. The 18 items of fees and charges concerned are prescribed in Schedule 1 to the Waterworks Regulations (Cap. 102A) under the Waterworks Ordinance (Cap. 102) of which 16 items were last revised in 1996 and two items in 2001.
- 3. A review of the cost of providing the relevant services at the 2010-11 price level have been carried out recently. The result shows the present cost recovery levels range from 64% to 116%. In order to achieve full cost recovery gradually and avoid a steep fee increase, we propose to adopt the following lines for fee revision in our proposal:
 - (a) for existing cost recovery rate of between 40% and 70%, adopt an increase of about 15%¹;
 - (b) for existing cost recovery rate of over 70%, adopt an increase of about $10\%^2$ or lower; and
 - (c) adjust downward to full cost recovery for fees that are recovering more than the full cost.
- 4. Details of the fee and charge revision proposal, ranging from a downward adjustment of 82% to an upward adjustment of 16%, are at the **Annex.** We will revise the fees and charges once the legislative amendment procedures are completed.

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¹ The 15% increase is to achieve full-cost recovery within three to seven years.

² The 10% increase is to achieve full-cost recovery within one to three years.

EFFICIENCY IMPROVEMENT MEASURES

5. We have been continuously taking measures to reduce or contain cost of services through implementing efficiency initiatives and streamlining procedures. Such efficiency savings and improvement measures have been factored into the calculation of costs for individual fee and charge items.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATION

6. When the proposed fee and charge adjustments are implemented, there will be a net increase of about \$0.9 million in revenue per annum.

WAY FORWARD

7. Members are invited to note the proposed fee and charge revision as set out in paragraph 3 to 4 above and detailed in the **Annex**. We will proceed with the necessary legislative amendments to implement the adjustments.
