The Administration is exploring various options, including upgrading some of the places in subvented residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs) to provide infirmary care. The Administration will report progress in due course.
2. Implementation of the Integrated Family Service Centre Model and closure of time-limited Single Parent Centres	9 May 2005	The Administration was requested to revert to members on whether to re-open the Single Parent Centres after the completion of its review on the implementation of the Integrated Family Service Centre (IFSC) upon receiving the review report from the Consultant Team in the first quarter of 2010.	The transformation of IFSCs was completed in 2004-2005. In October 2008, the Administration commissioned a review on the implementation of the IFSC service mode. It is expected to be completed in the first quarter of 2010. The Administration reported progress to the Panel in March 2009 and further discussed the matter at the May meeting. The Administration will report the result of the review to the Panel tentatively in the second quarter of 2010.

Assistance to elderly not receiving Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA)</p>	<p>8 June 2006</p>	<p>The Administration was requested to –</p> <p>(a) provide a paper setting out the relevant figures to substantiate its saying that a pay-as-you-go retirement protection scheme was not feasible; and</p> <p>(b) consult employees in Hong Kong on whether they were willing to allocate part of their MPF contributions, say 50%, to a pool for distribution to the current cohort of elders, on the understanding they too would receive a monthly sum of some \$2,500 in their old age.</p>	<p>The Administration is collating the requisite information and will provide a paper once ready.</p>
