Question :

According to the reply under Special Finance Committee Meeting Reply Serial No. EDB 058 and Question Serial No. 0280, the Administration states that it will provide additional funding for schools to employ teaching assistants during the piloting period to enhance support services for students with autism spectrum disorders. What are the estimated expenditure and the details of the plan? Will all participating schools be provided with the funding unconditionally?

Reply :

The three-year pilot project on enhancement of support services for students with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) will comprise two parts: (a) structured on-top group training for students with ASD; and (b) development of a comprehensive school support model for early intervention of students with ASD. For part (a), we will commission non-governmental organisations and/or tertiary institutions with the relevant expertise to provide small group training for students with ASD. The training cost will be borne by the Education Bureau. In other words, the participating schools in part (a) will get free professional support for the students, rather than additional funding.

We will provide additional funding only for those schools participating in part (b) of the project to employ teaching assistants during the piloting period, as these pilot schools will need to create room for their teachers to develop and try out the school support model, as well as consolidate their knowledge and experience in an operation manual for dissemination to all primary schools in Hong Kong at the completion of the project.

We expect that some schools will take part in part (a) only while some will take part in both. It is anticipated that around 50 public sector primary schools will participate in part (a) and about 30 primary schools in part (b) of the project. Assuming that each of the schools participating in part (b) is provided with a teaching assistant for the three-year piloting period, the estimated expenditure incurred for such purpose is about \$13 million.

According to the reply provided by the Administration under Special Finance Committee Meeting Reply Serial No. EDB 056 and Question Serial No. 0278, 300 time-limited teaching posts have been provided to public sector primary schools implementing small class teaching in the 2010/11 school year. How many public sector primary schools are involved? What is the time limit? When will the estimated expenditure of \$100 million be used up? Does the Administration have any plan to continue the funding after the time limit for appointment of additional temporary or permanent teaching posts so as to support the full implementation of small class teaching?

Reply :

A total of 303 public sector primary schools implementing small class teaching (SCT) have each been provided with a time-limited teaching post in the 2010/11 school year to build on the pedagogical strategies and resources devised under a small class context for dissemination and compilation for future reference. These 303 time-limited teaching posts with a total estimated cost of about \$100 million will lapse with effect from 1 September 2011.

As revealed in the Study on Small Class Teaching in Primary Schools in Hong Kong, a small class setting alone would not necessarily bring about improvement in learning and teaching. It is crucial for schools and teachers to consider how to better utilise a small class setting and this involves a paradigm shift in pedagogy. To maximise the benefits of SCT, we have set aside a total of \$218 million for six years starting from 2009-10 to support schools and teachers in the form of professional development activities. These include in-service training courses for teachers with provision of supply teachers for schools as appropriate as well as other experience-sharing activities such as learning circles, study tours, workshops, seminars, etc. We have not included any provision for time-limited or additional regular teaching posts in the 2011/12 school year as of now.

Regarding the reply numbered EDB096 to the question numbered 2214 for the special meetings of the Finance Committee, what are the respective percentages of contracted out and non-contracted out janitor services? What are the reasons and justification for contracting out janitor services in government schools? Are schools provided with guidelines specifically designed for contracting out janitor services?

Reply :

About 80% of janitor services in government primary schools have been contracted out and the remaining 20% are currently provided by civil service Workmen II.

Aided schools have all along been provided with an Administrative Grant or Revised Administrative Grant for employing administrative and janitor staff, or contracting out clerical or janitor staff to meet their specific needs. In Education Commission Report No. 7 which was published in September 1997, it was stated that as a matter of principle, government schools should enjoy the same degree of funding and management flexibility as aided schools and should eventually be on a par with aided schools. Adopting this recommendation, janitor services of government schools have gradually been contracted out since the 1997/98 school year taking into account the natural wastage situation.

Janitor services are provided by non-skilled workers. The Education Bureau has issued internal circulars to government schools urging them to follow the measures laid down by the Government on service contracts which involve the employment of mainly non-skilled workers. These include, among others, the provision that the tenderer is required to submit a declaration stating that there has not been any conviction against him under the Employment Ordinance and other relevant ordinances for the five-year period immediately preceding the tender closing date, and that he has not been given three or more demerit points under the Government's demerit point system over a rolling period of three years for breaching contractual obligations in respect of wages.

Reply :

To stabilise the schools and teaching force of primary education, we have adjusted downwards by stages the minimum number of students required for operating Primary 1 classes from 23 in the 2003/04 school year to 16 in the 2009/10 school year. Besides, we have put forward various development options to facilitate schools not allocated Primary 1 class to continue their operation.

As the primary school student population is anticipated to become more stable in the coming years and the under-enrolled situation in schools has been mitigated, it is not considered necessary to introduce new measures to reduce the number of schools which cease operation due to insufficient enrolment.

The Education Bureau has all along been providing support to redundant teachers arising from reduction of classes or cessation of school operation to facilitate their seeking of jobs.

The Administration is requested to provide the following information:
The total financial provision for organising Mainland learning and exchange activities for local tertiary, secondary and primary students as well as student-teachers under existing national education programmes and those to be introduced in the 2011-12 financial year and the respective numbers of places offered.

Reply :

In 2010-11, the total financial provision for organising Mainland learning and exchange activities for secondary and primary students is \$48.4 million. About 38 500 places are offered. No local tertiary students or student-teachers are involved in these programmes.

In 2011-12, the estimated expenditure is \$58 million and 42 700 places will be offered for secondary and primary students. In addition, an estimated amount of \$3.3 million has been set aside to provide 560 places for student-teachers. The 2011-12 Budget also proposes allocating \$100 million to launch a 5-year pilot scheme to subsidise local post-secondary students to participate in short-term internship or learning programmes in the Mainland, including visits, exchanges or voluntary services. The Administration is working out the details of the pilot scheme and will consult institutions concerned and the Legislative Council in due course.

Reply :

The Education Bureau (EDB) invited through open quotation those non-profit making non-governmental organisations (NGOs) with relevant experience in organising educational trips to the Mainland to operate the projects. The quotations were assessed in accordance with the standard store and procurement regulations which are applicable to all government purchases. Funds would be disbursed to the NGOs selected when they had paired up with schools and information on the visit programme indicating adherence to the endorsed proposals had been duly submitted to EDB. For those proposals from NGOs seeking sponsorship from the Government, they were assessed mainly on their relevancy to the school curriculum and cost-effectiveness.

In 2010-11, the total amount of funding paid to the NGOs is \$24 million, including the administrative cost of \$2.57 million.

Question:

The Government will provide an estimated provision of \$14.53 million to the University Grants Committee (UGC) in 2011-12 to cover meeting expenses of UGC, Research Grants Council (RGC) and Quality Assurance Council (QAC). It is mentioned in reply no. EDB355 that the expenses mainly comprise "air passages, hotel accommodation and subsistence allowances for overseas members and out-of-pocket expenses for local members". In 2010-11, the expenses of 41 meetings held by the UGC and its sub-committees alone amounted to \$2.1 million, with an average expense of over \$50,000 per meeting; and the expenses of the two meetings held by the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Selection Panel to select suitable candidates for the Fellowship Scheme were as high as \$1.4 million. In this connection, will the Government:

- (a) define the scope of the "out-of-pocket expenses" and immediately make public the list of expenditure of the meetings, such as the venue, the rent and items covered by the out-of-pocket expenses, so as to account for the huge meeting expenses;
- (b) explain the necessity of making huge expenses on meetings and conduct a review on it; and
- (c) ask the UGC to adopt video conferencing to save huge meeting expenses in light of the increasing shift from conventional to video conferencing by business organizations to cut cost?

Reply:

- (a) The "out-of-pocket expenses" are to cover traveling costs and other miscellaneous expenses for the local non-official University Grants Committee (UGC)/Research Grants Council (RGC)/Quality Assurance Council (QAC) Members and QAC Auditors in relation to performing public service in Hong Kong. The current rate is HK\$200 per meeting/duty day.

A list of expenditure of the meetings in 2010-11 is provided in Annex for reference.

- (b) The UGC/RGC/QAC and their committees, groups and panels conduct regular meetings in Hong Kong to discuss issues in relation to the funding for higher education, research policy, allocation of research grants and quality assurance, *etc.* It is necessary to meet the expenses for overseas members' air passages and hotel accommodation when they visit Hong Kong for UGC/RGC/QAC business. These overseas Members bring with them invaluable advice on global trends and international perspectives, as well as objective and independent advice on the development of the UGC-funded institutions and Hong Kong higher education sector in general. In respect of the RGC in particular, their objectiveness and independence give reassurance to local institutions that the RGC processes are fair.

Where possible and appropriate, we have made use of video-conferencing facilities, including the QAC Meeting in September 2009, Higher Education Group Meeting in December 2009 and UGC Meeting in April 2010. However, our experience demonstrated that video-conferencing was not conducive to Members' active participation in the discussion of highly complicated and intellectual issues. The feasibility of conducting video-conferencing has also been restricted by the availability of such facilities to the overseas Members in their home towns/countries and the difficulty of identifying a time convenient to all since overseas Members come from different parts of the world with different time zones. Simultaneous video-conferencing with as many as 10 overseas participants is also a very expensive proposition.

- (c) To make video-conferencing a possibly viable alternative for certain meetings, we would need to invest in state-of-the-art video-conferencing facilities, and to identify and finance the use of such facilities for overseas Members, both of which imply extra capital and recurrent costs. We will explore the feasibility of investing in such video-conferencing facilities, having regard to their financial implications and cost-effectiveness, as well as the quality of these facilities. However, it should be noted that even with the best video-conferencing facilities, there will be meetings where Members' physical presence will be essential, and occasions when overseas Members would need to travel to Hong Kong for the purpose of visiting and getting to know the UGC-funded institutions and to have face-to-face discussion/consultation with the staff and students of the institutions.

(2) We would like to give more details to explain the quantum of meeting expenses specifically raised in the introductory part of the question: -

(a) Meeting expenses mainly comprise air passages, hotel accommodation and subsistence allowances for non-local members, and out-of-pocket expenses for local members. Therefore, the number of meetings partly explains the quantum of meeting expenses. The amount of the meeting expenses also depends on the number of non-local members (requiring air passages and hotel accommodation) and the duration of each of the meetings covered (requiring subsistence allowances/out-of-pocket expenses). In 2010-11, the expenses of 41 meetings held by the UGC and its Sub-Committees amounted to \$2.11 million, whereas the expenses of the two meetings held by the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Selection Panel to select suitable candidates for the Fellowship Scheme amounted to \$1.33 million. This was because the former mainly comprised expenses for arranging 9 non-local members plus 15 local members to convene UGC (and Sub-Committees) meetings scheduled three times in the year and some other meetings as listed in the above table, and the latter mainly comprised expenses for arranging 21 non-local members to convene the Selection Panel Meetings.

(b) In respect of the Selection Panel Meetings, local academic staff employed by UGC-funded institutions are considered to have conflict of interest in deciding candidates to be selected for award of the fellowship. We therefore need to involve overseas panel members, both in making initial assessments and in making final recommendation on the awardees to be selected. Such overseas academics have valuable and relevant experience in recruiting PhD candidates for top-notch universities around the world. Given that the scheme is not limited to any academic discipline/field nor to a limited number of countries, it is necessary to enlist the help of a representative number of overseas panel members to provide all round perspective in selecting the candidates. Collective deliberation through a meeting is needed to calibrate the standard, to reconcile diverging assessments by different panel members and to deliberate on doubtful cases before formulating final recommendations on candidates to be selected. We will review from time to time on ways to reduce expenses without compromising the objectives of the scheme.
