 [Legislative Council Brief, L.N. 111 of 2011, L.N. 112 of 2011, LC Paper Nos. LS86/10-11, CB(2)2374/10-11(02) to (03), CB(2)2493/10-11(01) to (02), CB(2)2500/10-11(01) and CB(2)2507/10-11(01)-(03)]

<u>The Subcommittee</u> deliberated (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

2. <u>The Subcommittee</u> received oral representations from nine deputations on the Residential Care Homes (Persons with Disabilities) Regulation and Residential Care Home (Persons with Disabilities) Ordinance (Commencement) Notice 2011. The major views of the deputations are set out in the **Annex**.

3. <u>Members</u> noted the Administration's responses to the following issues raised at the last meeting held on 22 July 2011 [LC Paper No. CB(2)2493/10-11(01)] -

- (a) details of the Financial Assistance Scheme ("FAS") for private residential care homes for persons with disabilities ("RCHDs"); and
- (b) the viability of including outdoor space for calculating the floor space per resident in a RCHD.

4. <u>Members</u> were concerned about the difficulties and the financial viability of the private RCHD sector in carrying out improvement works in respect of building and fire safety for compliance with the licensing requirements. Specifically, members expressed concern that some private RCHDs would increase fees to cover the additional costs for meeting the licensing requirements on building and fire safety.

5. <u>The Administration</u> advised that it would introduce suitable complementary measures to encourage private RCHDs to upgrade their service standards and help the market develop more service options for persons with disabilities. To this end, it had introduced the pilot Bought Place Scheme for private RCHDs and would implement FAS upon commencement of the Ordinance to provide subsidies for private RCHDs to carry out improvement works in compliance with the licensing requirements in building and fire safety. Moreover, there would be a grace period of 18 months after the commencement of the Ordinance to allow sufficient time for RCHDs to apply for a licence or a Certificate of Exemption. The Social Welfare Department would liaise with the relevant departments and provide appropriate assistance if required.

Admin 6. <u>The Administration</u> agreed to provide an estimation on the operating costs of private RCHDs based on available market information.

7. <u>Members</u> agreed that the next meeting would be held on 26 August 2011 at 8:30 am.
