Further Information on Development of Public Library Services

In response to Members' request for information on the planning and provision of public library services at the meeting of the LegCo Panel on Home Affairs on 22 March 2013, the Administration provides the following supplementary information for Members' reference:

- a) **Whether and how the Administration would, in the course of planning the provision of public libraries and strengthening the facilities/collections/services of public libraries (including both the existing and new libraries), take into consideration the demographic change in Hong Kong and the demographic profiles of various districts;**

In planning the provision of public libraries in Hong Kong, the Administration makes reference to a host of factors including the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines (HKPSG). The HKPSG states that "one district library should be provided for every 200,000 population, and at least one district library should be provided in each district". Where appropriate, the Government may consider providing a major library in lieu of two district libraries for every 400,000 population. Apart from major and district libraries, the existing network of the Hong Kong Public Libraries (HKPL) under the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) consists of small libraries and mobile libraries. These two types of libraries supplement the major and district libraries, and aim to serve remote areas or densely-populated communities that are distant from the existing or planned static libraries. For locations where the provision of static libraries is not feasible, arrangement may be made for mobile library vans to visit designated service points in the locality to provide convenient lending services.

Indeed, apart from the population factors set by the HKPSG for district libraries, the Government takes into account other relevant factors in considering the provision or enhancement of library services, including the geographic location, accessibility and demographic characteristics of the district/community concerned, the utilization of the existing libraries, the infrastructural development of the district, the changing needs (including demographic changes) of the community, the cost-effectiveness of the services, etc.

Demographic changes are one of the factors for considering the provision of public libraries. For instance, the size of new major libraries (e.g. The Ping Shan Tin Shui Wai Public Library) and district libraries (e.g.

The new Lam Tin Public Library) has been increased from 3,310 m² to 6,200 m² and from 2,200 m² to 2,900 m² respectively. The expanded floor area, which enables the provision of more spacious and comfortable reading environment as well as a larger seating capacity, is particularly welcomed by the elderly patrons who spend much time in libraries reading newspapers and periodicals.

Moreover, the community needs for convenient and accessible library services are also addressed through the community libraries in collaboration between LCSD and non-government organisations and local community groups. At present, a total of 212 community libraries have been set up throughout the territory. They serve to supplement the HKPL and provide convenient and accessible library services to the residents, in particular the elderly population, in the neighbourhood.

As for the library materials, the HKPL regularly reviews its collection development strategies to ensure that the appropriate mix of provision can accommodate the diverse needs of the community. In addition to the territory-wide collection development plan, individual stock development programmes for libraries at the district level are also under regular review to address district demands.

At present, about 110 titles of newspapers and periodicals in the languages of the ethnic minorities are available in the Hong Kong Central Library, City Hall Public Library, Lockhart Road Public Library and Yau Ma Tei Public Library and Yuen Long Public Library. There is also an increase of reading materials (e.g. large print books, newspapers, periodicals) suitable for the elderly in accordance with the proportion of the elderly population in a district. Currently, over 17,000 items of Chinese and English fiction in large print, 800,000 items of audio-visual materials and 30,000 items of audio books are provided in public libraries. Moreover, portable magnifying glasses are available in all libraries, and 33 of them are equipped with desktop video amplifier to assist readers with special needs.

Notwithstanding the above, HKPL will continue to enhance the library services and facilities, taking into account the changing needs of the community and other relevant factors.

- b) Whether the Administration would consider reviewing the existing standards suggested by the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines for the provision of public libraries;**

LCSD conducted the last review on the planning standards for public libraries in conjunction with the Planning Department in 2010. We

considered that the current population factor and broad guidelines set out in the HKPSG provided an optimal basis for the planning and provision of major and district libraries. These libraries, together with the network of small and mobile libraries, generally offered accessible and convenient services in the 18 districts. Given that the opening of a new district library has substantial capital and recurrent resource implications, and bearing in mind that the existing arrangement already allows LCSD to take into account other relevant factors in deciding whether the public library services for a particular district should be enhanced (e.g. through the provision of small/mobile libraries, expansion/reprovisioning of existing libraries), we consider that the guidelines set out in the HKPSG for the provision of major/district libraries remain valid and relevant. LCSD will continue to monitor the needs of individual communities closely and devise strategies and plans for the betterment of the public library facilities and services.

- c) **In respect of library users, whether the Administration had analyzed the number and ratio of active users, and studied their profile, reading habits and demand for library services, with a view to enhancing the facilities and services of public libraries in order to broaden patron base;**

The HKPL regularly analyses the usage of the library materials to gauge the reading pattern of library users. In recent years, the number of registered borrowers has been on the general increase. As at 1 March 2013, the library system has a stock of about 12.98 million (11.25 million items of library books and 1.73 million of multi-media materials). The profile of registered borrowers and loan statistics of the public libraries from 2008 to 2012 are given in Appendix A.

The statistics show that the borrowing of English books for children has increased which include language books, picture books and items on science and social sciences etc. On the other hand, the borrowing of Chinese books for adults has declined while the borrowing of Chinese books for children has dropped slightly. The Chinese library materials with declined borrowing trend include fiction, translated fiction and language & literature etc. Moreover, the loan of fiction items for adults has also dropped which is partly due to a gradual shift to online reading in recent years. In view of these trends, LCSD has accordingly adjusted its provision of library collections, including providing more online and self-learning materials (e.g. electronic books and online databases), as well as non-fiction materials to meet the needs of library users.

- d) **The usage of mobile libraries, the location of existing mobile library stops and target groups served by the 10 mobile libraries, and the number of patrons to mobile libraries over the past three years, with a breakdown by user groups and by districts (if any);**

Mobile libraries play a valuable role in reaching out to members of the public residing in the less populated and remote areas, thereby supplementing the network of static libraries. At present, LCSD operates 10 mobile library vans which serve a total of 96 service points across the 18 districts. Details of the mobile library stops are at Appendix B. Basic lending services of adult and children's reading and audio materials are offered in mobile library vans. The target groups served by the mobile libraries are mainly the seniors, children and housewives. In 2010, 2011 and 2012, mobile libraries recorded a loan of some 0.98, 0.91 and 0.78 million items of library materials respectively, constituting about 1.64%, 1.55% and 1.39% of the total number of library materials borrowed from the system in the years, while the number of patrons visiting the mobile libraries was about 0.61, 0.58 and 0.46 million respectively.

The HKPL regularly conducts review of the mobile library services provided, including the usage of individual stops and the variety of stock offered. For better utilization of resources, the LCSD will arrange relocation of nearby mobile library stops in consultation with the District Councils concerned upon the establishment of new/reprovisioned libraries to meet the needs for mobile library service in other areas.

- e) **In respect of the development of information technology infrastructure, whether the Administration had a clear target and timetable for the implementation of automated library service; if so, the details.**

The library automated system of HKPL was replaced and upgraded in December 2011, providing new features and enhanced library services to the public. Some enhancements with more new service functions will complete in 2013. In parallel, the Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) Pilot Scheme has also been introduced since end of 2011 in six selected libraries. It covers the application of RFID technology for conducting daily library operations, such as circulation, self-service operations, book sorting and inventory management. LCSD has also initiated a feasibility study to ascertain whether it will be technically feasible and cost-effective to adopt the RFID technology across HKPL. The study is targeted for completion in 2013, and the Department will formulate a long-term plan on the application of RFID technology in HKPL having regard to the results of the study.

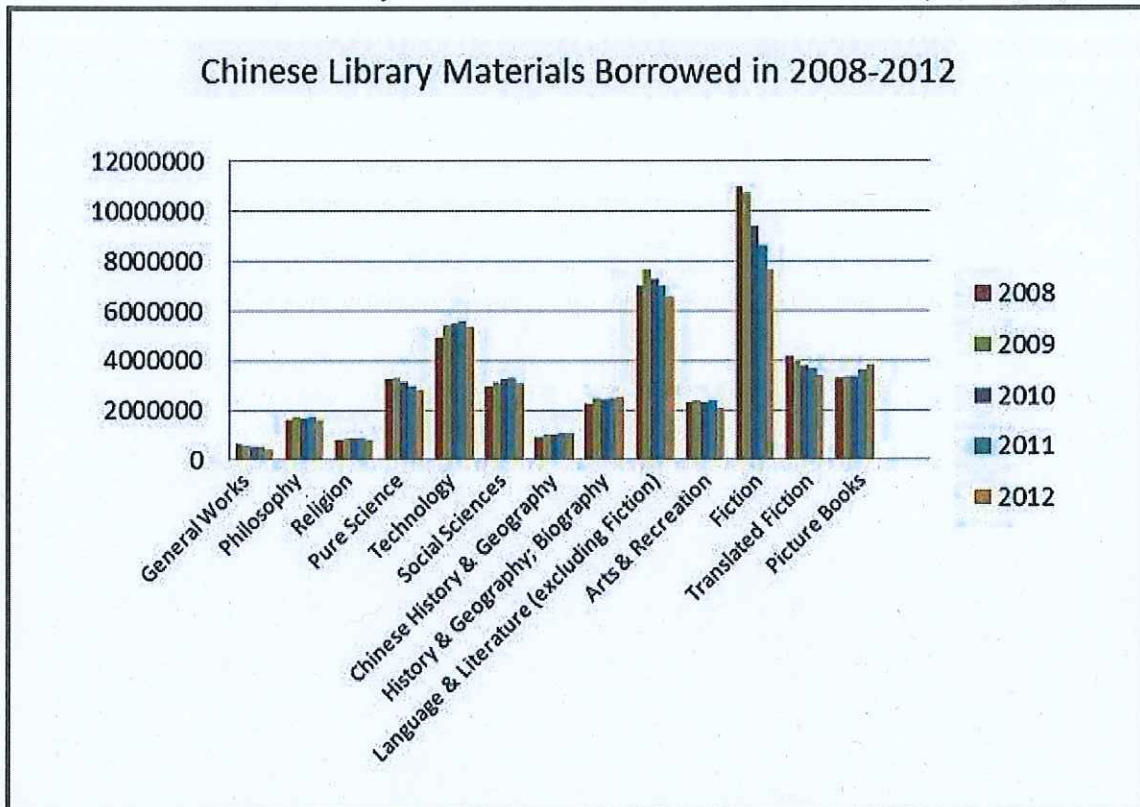

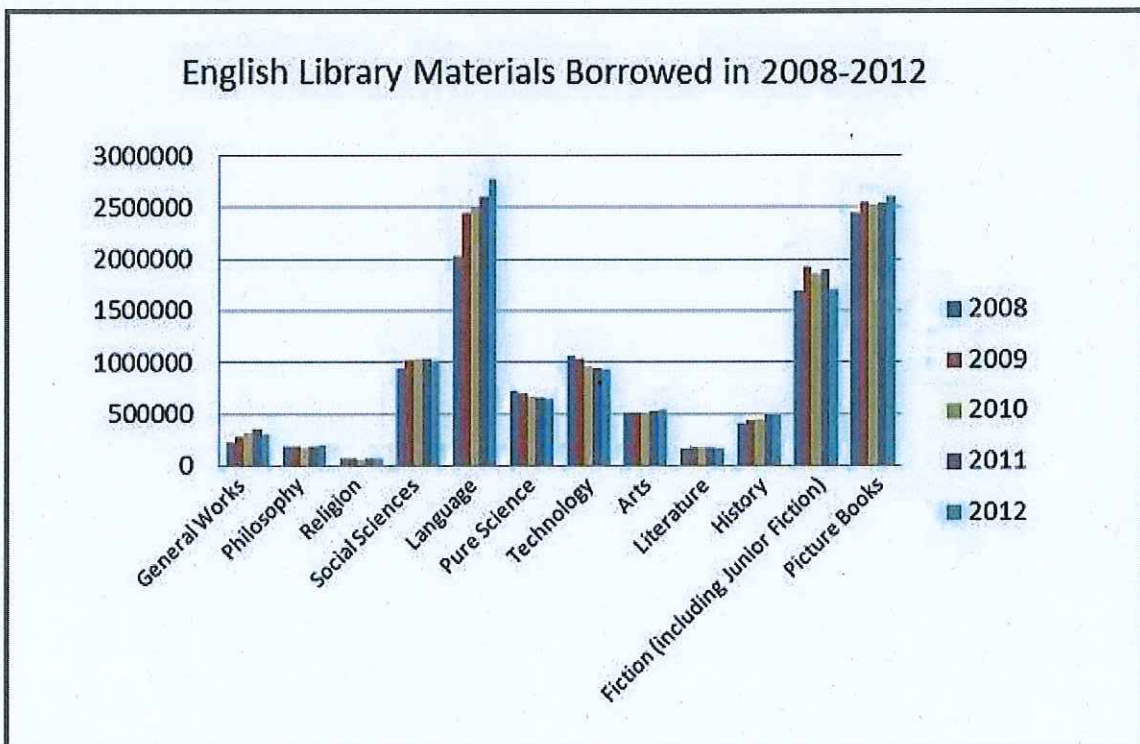
