Proposed timing for discussion

1. Reports issued by the Subcommittee on Guardianship and Custody of the Law Reform Commission ("LRC")

At the meeting on 8 February 2010, the Administration briefed the Panel on its position on the recommendations made by LRC in the Report on Guardianship of Children, the Report on International Parental Child Abduction, as well as the Report on Child Custody and Access. The Administration has since then completed the legislative amendments for implementing the recommendations in the Report on Guardianship of Children and is working on the amendments to the relevant legislation for implementing the recommendations of the Report on International Parental Child Abduction.

First quarter of 2013

As for the Report on Custody and Access ("the Report") released on 7 March 2005, the Administration advised that it is studying the recommendations carefully. The Administration launched a four-month public consultation on 28 December 2011 on whether the "joint parental responsibility model" should be implemented in Hong Kong by legislative means. The Panel was briefed on the consultation paper at its meeting on 9 January 2012. A special meeting was held on 25 February 2012 to receive views from deputations on the consultation paper. According to the Administration, it would map out, in the light of comments received, whether and how to take forward the relevant recommendations of the Report.

The Administration will brief members, in the first quarter of 2013, on the results of the public consultation on Child Custody and Access:

Whether to Implement the "Joint Parental Responsibility Model" by Legislative Means, and on the way forward.

2. Infirmary care in non-hospital setting

The Administration consulted the Panel in December 2004 on a proposal to launch a trial scheme to provide infirmary care places for medically stable elders in a non-hospital setting. Various options are being explored, including upgrading some of the places in subvented residential care homes for the elderly to provide infirmary care. The Administration will report the progress in due course.

3. Retirement protection

The Panel and its Subcommittee on Retirement Protection had studied the subject of universal retirement protection in the last legislative term. The Subcommittee submitted its report (LC Paper No. CB(2)1942/11-12) to the Panel on 14 May 2012 and made a number of recommendations for the Administration's consideration. The Subcommittee also recommended that the Panel should follow up with the Administration on the matter in the next legislative term.

The Panel Chairman has proposed to discuss whether the Panel should form a Subcommittee on Retirement Protection, given that the Subcommittee on Poverty, which monitors and follows up the work of, inter alia, the Commission on Poverty's Task Force on Social Security and Retirement Protection, will examine the subject matter.

4. Charitable fund-raising activities

The existing framework for the monitoring of charitable fund-raising activities was discussed at

the meeting on 11 June 2007. Members agreed to further discuss the matter in the next session, especially the monitoring of the use of income generated from public charitable fund-raising activities.

Following the release of the Consultation Paper on Charities by the Charities Sub-committee of LRC, the Panel held a special meeting on 24 August 2011 to receive public views on the subject. The LRC Charities Sub-committee has proceeded to work on concrete proposals for enhancing the monitoring measures for charitable fund-raising activities in light of the views collected from the public consultation which ended in October 2011.

5. Review of the system for processing applications for Disability Allowance ("DA") under the Social Security Allowance ("SSA") Scheme

Item proposed by Hon WONG Kwok-hing and Hon WONG Kwok-kin in the last legislative term. Members were concerned about the eligibility criteria for DA, the system for processing DA applications and the appeal mechanism.

According to Hon WONG Kwok-hing, the Administration has completed the captioned review but the review report has not yet been released. He hopes that this item could be discussed by the Panel as soon as possible, so as to push for the Administration's release of the review results as soon as possible.

At the meeting of the Panel on Constitutional Affairs ("CA Panel") on 16 October 2012, Hon Paul TSE Wai-chun called for a review of the eligibility criteria for DA which in his view had led to a situation that some disabled persons suffering certain kinds of disabilities (e.g. total loss of sight) were covered by DA, while others suffering different kinds of disabilities (e.g. loss of

leg) were not fully covered.

At the informal meeting on 31 October 2012, the Administration advised that it would address issues regarding the definition of disability for DA in following up Chief Executive's manifesto.

The Panel will meet with the Administration and deputations on the review of the system for processing applications for DA under the SSA Scheme at its regular meeting on 10 December 2012.

6. Review of the one-year-continuous-residence requirement under the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance ("CSSA") Scheme and SSA Scheme

At the meeting on 12 July 2010, Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung expressed concern about the High Court ruling on the judicial review of the one-year-continuous-residence requirement under the CSSA Scheme and proposed to follow up the matter as well as the residence requirement for Old Age Allowance ("OAA") applicants.

In anticipation of the appeal proceedings, members agreed to revisit the need to discuss the matter in due course.

Pursuant to the Court of Appeal's ruling made in February 2012, the one-year-continuous-residence requirement was removed from the CSSA Scheme. Meanwhile, the Court of First Instance dismissed two cases of judicial review of the OAA one-year-continuous-residence requirement on 14 May and 17 September 2012 respectively, and ruled that the requirement was constitutional.

7. Progress on the implementation of the licensing scheme for residential care homes for persons with disabilities ("RCHDs") and related complementary measures

In response to the request of the Subcommittee on Residential Care Homes (Persons with Disabilities) Regulation and Residential Care Homes (Persons with Disabilities) Ordinance (Commencement) Notice 2011, the Administration will report to the Panel on the progress of the implementation of the licensing scheme for RCHDs and the related complementary measures, including the pilot Bought Place Scheme for RCHDs and Financial Assistance Scheme.

8. Visiting Pharmacist Scheme

9. Progress Report on Child Development Fund

Item proposed by the Administration in the 2011-2012 session. The Administration will brief members on the implementation progress and enhancement measures of the Child Development Fund.

First quarter of 2013

10. Review of rent allowance under the CSSA Scheme

At the joint meeting of the Panel and the Panel on Housing held on 13 April 2012, members expressed concern about the inadequacy of the rent allowance under the CSSA Scheme for street sleepers on CSSA to meet rental expenses of private housing and considered it necessary for the Panel to follow up on the review mechanism for the maximum rate of the rent allowance.

11. Guangdong Scheme

At the meeting on 12 March 2012, the Panel was briefed on the Guangdong Scheme for the provision of OAA to Hong Kong elders who chose to move to live in Guangdong. Members were concerned about the implementation timetable and the plan to extend the Scheme to other provinces, e.g. Fujian. Members agreed at the meeting on 12 April 2012 that the Panel should continue to follow up the matter.

Second quarter of 2013

12. Provision of barrier free access and facilities for persons with disabilities

The Panel and its Subcommittee on Improving Barrier Free Access and Facilities for Persons with Disabilities had studied the subject of provision of barrier free access and facilities for persons with disabilities in the last legislative term. The Subcommittee submitted its report (LC Paper No. CB(2)2065/11-12) to the Panel on 29 May 2012 and made a number of recommendations for the Administration's consideration. The Subcommittee also recommended that the Panel should follow up with the Administration on the matter in the next legislative term. The Administration will continue to provide a quarterly report on the progress of the retrofitting programme for upgrading the barrier-free facilities in existing government premises and facilities and the Housing Authority properties to the Panel for information.

13. Injection to the Community Investment and Inclusion Fund ("CIIF")

Item proposed by the Administration. The Financial Secretary has announced in his 2012-2013 Budget to inject an additional \$200 million into CIIF to ensure that the fund can continue to perform its social function in furthering social capital

development at the district level. The Administration will consult members on the injection proposal with a view to seeking approval of the Finance Committee ("FC") in the first quarter of 2013.

The Panel will discuss this item at its regular meeting on 10 December 2012.

14. Social Enterprise Development Fund ("SEDF")

Item proposed by the Administration. On 16 July 2012, the Chief Executive announced the plan to establish SEDF to support the further development of social enterprises by seeking a funding of \$500 million from LF. The Administration has been consulting the relevant stakeholders and devising the details for the Fund.

The Administration will brief members on SEDF and advised that members of the Panel on Home Affairs should be invited to join the discussion of this item.

15. Setting up of two rehabilitation service facilities for persons with disabilities in Shek Kip Mei and Tin Shui Wai

Item proposed by the Administration. Approval of FC is required for any LF projects carrying recurrent implications of over \$10 million. The Administration would seek LF funding in 2012-2013 to meet the fitting-out cost as well as the furniture and equipment cost for setting up a new integrated rehabilitation services centre at Shek Kip Mei Estate, Sham Shui Po and a new day activity centre cum hostel for severely mentally handicapped persons at Tin Ching Estate, Tin Shui Wai. Since the recurrent implications of the two projects will likely exceed \$10 million, the Administration intends to consult the Panel in December 2012 with a view to

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seeking FC's approval in the first quarter of 2013.

The Panel will discuss this item at its regular meeting on 10 December 2012.
