HEAD 708 – CAPITAL SUBVENTIONS AND MAJOR SYSTEMS AND EQUIPMENT

Medical Subventions

83MM – One-off grant to the Hospital Authority for minor works projects

Members are invited to recommend to Finance Committee the approval of a one-off grant of \$13 billion to the Hospital Authority for minor works projects, subject to a financial ceiling of \$75 million for each individual item.

PROBLEM

The Hospital Authority (HA) needs to implement more intensive programmes to improve the condition and environment of HA's ageing facilities and enhance their service capacity to complement other major new hospital or hospital renovation projects.

PROPOSAL

2. The Secretary for Food and Health proposes to make a one-off grant of \$13 billion to HA for carrying out minor works projects, including improvement works, regular maintenance and preparatory works for major capital works projects, subject to a financial ceiling of \$75 million for each individual item.

PROPOSED SCOPE AND NATURE

3. The proposed one-off grant will fund the following programmes and minor works with individual items costing not more than \$75 million –

/(a)

- (a) an intensive facility rejuvenation programme to modernize the environment of its hospitals and clinics, including the renovation of over 500 wards in 34 hospitals;
- (b) a capacity enhancement programme to provide an additional 800 beds in 11 hospitals, expanded general outpatient clinics, as well as other treatment and diagnostic facilities such as operating theatres, endoscopy units and cardiac catheterization laboratories;
- (c) a safe engineering programme to comprehensively upgrade the major electrical and mechanical engineering installations in hospitals, including upgrading and replacing the existing electrical main distribution switchboards and emergency generators in 16 hospitals, as well as installing appropriate safety devices or replacing existing lifts in 33 hospitals;
- (d) a programme to enhance universal accessibility to its hospitals and clinics by constructing, where required and practicable, lift towers and/or link bridges connecting pedestrian walkways with its facilities. The programme will also cover improvement works in HA hospitals and clinics for compliance with the requirements stipulated in “Design Manual – Barrier Free Access 2008” to address the special needs of persons with disabilities; and
- (e) regular maintenance/minor works and preparatory works for major capital works projects.

4. Subject to the funding approval of the Finance Committee (FC), HA estimates that a total of around 5 000 projects will be carried out using the proposed \$13 billion one-off grant and the estimated investment return. An initial list of project items to be funded by the one-off grant, some of which are subject to site availability or technical feasibility, is provided at Enclosure 1 for reference. The projects have been identified by HA in consultation with its clusters and individual hospitals. The list will continue to be updated throughout the coming years as new items are created or existing items adjusted to meet changing service requirements or actual site situations.

JUSTIFICATION

5. HA is managing 42 public hospitals/institutions, 48 specialist outpatient clinics and 73 general outpatient clinics, with a total floor area of over 2.6 million square metres in around 300 buildings. Over 56% of the buildings were completed more than 30 years ago and some are even aged over 85 years. Due to their constant heavy utilisation, the public hospitals and clinics are prone to accelerated deterioration. As a result, many of HA's ageing facilities are in unsatisfactory conditions. We need to upgrade such facilities to meet the needs of modern quality service delivery. Besides, given their age, many of the major electrical and mechanical engineering installations in HA hospitals are lagging behind the prevailing standards which have evolved over the years through technological advancements and increasingly higher expectations for safety performance. There is therefore a need for HA to embark on a comprehensive programme to upgrade such installations (such as electrical supply systems and lifts) to ensure a safe and reliable round-the-clock operations in hospitals.

6. Further, with a growing and ageing population in Hong Kong, the demand for medical services is projected to increase significantly in the coming years. To meet the projected increase in demand, apart from major hospital expansion and redevelopment projects in the pipeline, there is also a need for HA to supplement the major works projects by carrying out alteration and addition works to its existing hospitals and clinics to enhance their service capacity.

7. At present, apart from major new hospital and hospital redevelopment projects, the Government has been providing funding to HA for implementing minor improvement and planned maintenance projects through the Capital Works Reserve Fund (CWRF) block allocation **Head 708 Subhead 8100MX – Hospital Authority – improvement works, feasibility studies, investigations and pre-contract consultancy services for building projects** on a lump-sum basis annually in order to improve and maintain hospital facilities for effective patient care.

8. The ambit of **Subhead 8100MX** covers improvement and maintenance works, preliminary project feasibility studies, and pre-contract consultancy services including design and preparation of tender documents for building projects. Individual items under **Subhead 8100MX** are subject to a

ceiling of expenditure of \$30 million and the Subhead is subject to an over-commitment limit at 200% of the approved allocation for the year. The approved allocation and actual expenditure in respect of **Subhead 8100MX** in the past ten years are as follows –

In general, HA spends about 45% of the funding on improvement projects, 40% on maintenance projects, and 15% on feasibility studies and preparatory works for building projects.

9. Despite the increase in the approved allocation under **Subhead 8100MX** over the years, the amount remains insufficient to meet the needs of HA for timely maintenance of its facilities which have been heavily utilized to cope with continuous growth in demand for public healthcare services due to demographic effect and ageing population. Further, HA's facilities are generally heavily utilized throughout the year. As such, a relatively long lead time is usually required for operational decanting arrangements before minor works projects can be carried out in order to minimize disruption to public services. The current annual funding arrangement for minor works projects has constrained HA's ability to flexibly plan and implement the necessary minor works projects for improving and maintaining the facilities in longer term.

10. To better address the medical needs of the ageing population, we propose to make a one-off grant of \$13 billion to HA to provide sufficient resources and allow more flexible planning for HA to implement the planned improvement works programmes in an intensive manner over the coming ten years or so, depending on the construction inflation and the investment return on uncommitted fund during the period. The new arrangement will give HA more certainty of the funds available for a reasonably long period of time. This could allow HA and individual hospitals to plan for multi-stage improvement works involving decanting and renovation in phases, so as to accelerate progress of the improvement programmes. The improvement programmes are needed to complement other major new hospital or hospital renovation projects, which will typically take a long time to materialize.

11. Having regard to the scale and complexity of many of the planned improvement works (e.g. the construction of hillside lifts or escalators which may entail associated geotechnical works), we propose that the minor works projects to be funded by the grant should be subject to a financial ceiling of \$75 million for individual items. FC's funding approval will be sought for individual projects each costing more than \$75 million. The proposed \$75 million ceiling is in line with the arrangement for the implementation of the Universal Accessibility Programme funded under the block allocation **Subhead 6101TX**.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

12. The proposed one-off grant will replace the existing block allocation to HA through **Subhead 8100MX** until it is depleted. With the one-off grant of \$13 billion, HA will invest the funds which are not immediately required in low-risk investments to achieve the highest prudent return, while ensuring the provision of adequate liquid funds for meeting the expenditure requirements. HA will manage the grant in accordance with its prevailing investment objectives and guidelines.

13. The approved grant together with the interest generated from investment (estimated to be at \$1.9 billion) will be fully used to meet the costs of the planned programmes set out in paragraph 3 above, broken down as follows –

- (a) Intensive facility rejuvenation programme: \$6.0 billion;
- (b) Capacity enhancement programme: \$3.2 billion;

/(c)

- (c) Safe engineering programme: \$0.8 billion;
- (d) Universal accessibility programme: \$0.5 billion; and
- (e) Regular maintenance/minor works and preparatory works for major capital works projects: \$4.4 billion.

14. Having regard to the important need to maintain public hospital services without disruptions, HA considers that around 500 new projects can be initiated annually and the proposed one-off grant is expected to be able to support the minor works of HA for about 10 years or so, if there is not an unusual hike in construction inflation. In 2014-15, HA estimates that around 1 400 projects with an annual expenditure of about \$680 million will be funded by the proposed one-off grant. Enclosure 2 sets out the key on-going and new items to be implemented in 2014-15.

15. The proposed one-off grant has no recurrent financial implications.

GOVERNANCE

16. To ensure transparency and accountability on the use of the proposed one-off grant, the use of fund under the proposed one-off grant will be monitored by the Legislative Council (LegCo) and the Food and Health Bureau (FHB) like the use of fund under **Subhead 8100MX**. HA will –

- (a) deposit with the LegCo Secretariat annually a full list of all the items proposed to be funded by the one-off grant in the following financial year;
- (b) provide annual reports on the key minor works projects implemented and the actual expenditure in the past financial year, as well as key minor works projects planned to be implemented and the forecast expenditure under the one-off grant in the coming year;
- (c) prepare separate audited financial statements on the use of the one-off grant on an annual basis. The audited financial statement and the report on the key minor works projects mentioned in (b) above will be submitted to LegCo Panel on Health Services and the Public Works Subcommittee (PWSC) annually; and

/(d)

- (d) seek prior approval from FHB of each individual item of expenditure to be funded by the one-off grant.

17. The mechanism for HA to consider and process minor works project items to be funded by the proposed one-off grant will mirror the existing one for the block vote under **Subhead 8100MX**. HA will take into consideration a basket of factors including the following before submission of the items to FHB for approval –

- (a) statutory requirements (e.g. periodic inspection, testing and certification of fixed electrical installation works as stipulated in the Electricity Ordinance);
- (b) corporate initiatives (e.g. “Filmless HA”¹ or preparatory works for major capital works projects);
- (c) ages, conditions and risks of the facilities (e.g. pipeline and drainage leakage, concrete debonding and power failure that might occur in the event that maintenance and repair works were not carried out in a timely manner); and
- (d) service quality improvement or operational requirements (e.g. facility conversion or additional works).

For each individual proposed project item, HA will submit a standard application form with information on the scope, objectives and estimated costs of the proposed item to FHB for approval.

18. Mirroring the existing mechanism for the block vote under **Subhead 8100MX**, FHB will consider and process applications from HA for approval of minor works project items to be funded by the proposed one-off grant by taking into account the relevant factors including the following –

- (a) estimated costs of the projects (only projects at estimated cost not exceeding the financial ceiling of \$75 million will be considered);
- (b)

- (b) availability of funding;
- (c) technical feasibility and site availability for the projects;
- (d) recommendations from HA Head Office as well as the hospital or clinic concerned; and
- (e) objectives of the projects.

HA will be notified of FHB's decision as soon as possible. All the applications including those approved and rejected will be properly documented by both FHB and HA.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

19. We consulted the LegCo Panel on Health Services on the proposal to make a one-off grant of \$13 billion to HA for minor works projects at its meeting on 28 October 2013. Members of the Panel supported the proposal. Some Members raised questions about the governance mechanism within FHB for and the monitoring role of LegCo in the use of fund under the proposed one-off grant. The relevant information about these issues is now set out in paragraphs 16 to 18 above.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

20. Under the present arrangement, HA is granted allocation under **Subhead 8100MX** every year to carry out maintenance and minor improvement works for public hospitals, as well as preparatory works for major capital works projects. In 2013-14, \$661.119 million was approved under the subhead for HA to carry out about 1 300 number of new and on-going minor works projects.

21. We estimate that the proposed one-off grant of \$13 billion to HA for minor works will create about 17 470 jobs (16 420 for labourers and another 1 050 for professional/technical staff) providing a total employment of 209 590 man-months.
