Follow-up actions

- Admin 2. The Administration was requested to provide the following information --
  - (a) a list, with relevant information about the land uses, of (i) former country park enclaves which had been covered by Outline Zoning Plans ("OZPs"); and (ii) present country park enclaves which were being planned for inclusion to OZPs; and
  - (b) the assessment criteria for covering a country park enclave by an OZP instead of incorporating it to a country park, with particular reference to the case of So Lo Pun, which was only sparsely populated but was covered by a draft OZP.

(*Post-meeting note*: The Administration's supplementary information was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)353/13-14(02) on 19 November 2013.)

Examination of the provisions of the Country Parks (Designation) (Consolidation) (Amendment) Order 2013

3. <u>The Subcommittee</u> agreed that the resolution proposed by Dr LAU Wong-fat (LC Paper No. CB(1)276/13-14(03)) to repeal section 3(2) of the Country Parks (Designation) (Consolidation) (Amendment) Order 2013 ("Amendment Order") should be adopted as the proposed resolution of the Subcommittee. As the Chairman was not in favour of the resolution, <u>the</u> <u>Subcommittee</u> agreed that Dr LAU should move the resolution on behalf of the Subcommittee.

4. <u>The Administration</u> advised that its position on the question of whether the Legislative Council ("LegCo") had the power to amend/repeal the Amendment Order was the same as that stated in 2010.

5. <u>The Chairman</u> said that, as discussed at the meeting on 29 October 2013, LegCo had the power to amend/repeal the Amendment Order. She concluded that the Subcommittee had completed the scrutiny of the Amendment Order. Legislative timetable

6. <u>The Subcommittee</u> noted that the Chairman would move a motion at the Council meeting of 13 November 2013 to extend the scrutiny period of the Amendment Order to the Council meeting of 4 December 2013. <u>The Chairman</u> reminded members that after the scrutiny period had been extended, the deadline for giving notice of amendment to the Amendment Order would be 27 November 2013.

		enclaves. In 2011, the Country and Marine Parks Board had endorsed the revised principles and criteria for designation of new country parks or extending country parks. Under the revised principles and criteria, the mere existence of private land would not be taken as a determining factor for exclusion of land from the boundary of a country park. In fact there were already about 460 hectares of private land in the existing country parks.	
		(b) In determining whether to include an enclave into a country park or to apply statutory planning, the Administration would consider relevant factors such as conservation values, landscape and aesthetic values, geographical locations, the scale of existing human settlements and development pressures. For the case of the Sai Wan Enclave, it had a high landscape and aesthetic value and was an integral part of the overall naturalness and the landscape of the surrounding Sai Kung East Country Park ("SKECP"). The enclave met the criteria for incorporation into a country park.	
		(c) On the preparation of a draft OZP for Hoi Ha, the Administration had taken into consideration, among others, the scale of existing human settlements and the status of the land in the area.	
		At the request of Mr Albert CHAN, the Administration would provide written information about former country park enclaves which had been covered by OZPs and present country park enclaves which were being planned for inclusion to OZPs.	Administration to take action as in para. 2(a)

		The Chairman said that in light of the complaints made by some deputations at the meeting on 5 November 2013 about the inadequate infrastructure facilities in some remote villages, the Administration should address the problems and improve the living environment in these villages.

		(b) The Administration had all along neglected the needs of villagers living in enclaves or remote rural areas for better public facilities. That was why they had no confidence in the Administration's pledge to improve the habitat and amenities, allow erection of small houses, and facilitate the operation of small businesses in their villages after they had been incorporated to country parks.	
		(c) Affected villagers might be more willing to accept the incorporation of enclaves into country parks if the Administration would propose compensation packages.	
		(d) While she supported protection of land of high conservation value, she found it unacceptable that the Administration had not addressed the concerns of the affected villagers about the consequence of the incorporation of their land into county parks.	
		The Administration replied that	
		(a) Relevant Government departments were obliged to take enforcement actions under the law against illegal land uses and pollution problems.	
		(b) Whether an enclave was to be included to a country park was assessed on a case-by-case basis.	
		(c) The Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department ("AFCD") would actively improve the environment of a country park enclave after it was incorporated into a country park.
