I refer to your email dated 19 February 2014 on the captioned.

At the meeting on 17 February 2014, the Administration undertook to provide the Panel on Home Affairs with information on law enforcement actions taken against criminal activities in Internet cafés in the past three years, subject to the availability of the required information from the Police.

As advised by the Police, they do not keep statistics of all types of law enforcement actions taken against criminal activities in Internet cafés in the past three years. This notwithstanding, it is noted from the breakdown provided by the Police below that there has been a persistent decline in the number of reported crimes in Internet cafés over the past three years.

We also wish to provide the Panel on Home Affairs with background information and updates regarding the vehicular access between Cape Collinson Cemetery (CCC) and Holy Cross Catholic Cemetery (HCCC).

The Vehicular Access between CCC and HCCC, which owned by CDHK, has been under common use by the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries (BMCPC) and the CDHK since late 1968. From 1996 onwards, the Vehicular Access, upon the request of the Police, would be opened during Ching Ming and Chung Yeung Festivals to allow for the implementation of one-way traffic at Cape Collinson Road to alleviate the heavy traffic in the area.

In Chung Yeung Festival 2011, due to the concern about the deteriorating condition and the loading capacity of the Vehicular Access, the Vehicular Access was closed during the festive periods. Road closure arrangements had to be implemented at Lin Shing Road and Cape Collinson Road. Since then, BMCPC has been following up with CDHK on the re-opening of the Vehicular Access and proactively taking up preparation work. BMCPC and CDHK, with professional advice, are following up on the required enhancement works for the Vehicular Access with a view to re-opening the Vehicular Access as soon as possible.
