		(b) overseas-trained doctors were required to pass the Licensing Examination administered by the Medical Council of Hong Kong in order to register for practice in Hong Kong. HA also sought to recruit overseas doctors by way of Limited Registration subject to the approval of the Medical Council of Hong Kong.
