1. Infirmary care in non-hospital setting

The Administration consulted the Panel in December 2004 on a proposal to launch a trial scheme to provide infirmary care places for medically stable elders in a non-hospital setting. Various options are being explored, including upgrading some of the places in subvented residential care homes for the elderly to provide infirmary care. The Administration will report the progress in due course.

2. Retirement protection

(a) <u>Study on retirement protection in Hong Kong</u>

At its meeting on 21 May 2013, the Panel agreed that it should discuss the subject matter when the Central Policy Unit ("CPU") provided the Panel with its five reports on retirement protection or when Professor Nelson CHOW Wing-sun was ready to brief members on his study on retirement The Administration's response to the protection. Panel's request for the CPU's reports was circulated to members vide LC Paper No. CB(2)1281/12-13(01). Professor CHOW has indicated that, if the Panel so wishes, he could attend the Panel meeting in around the fourth quarter of 2013 to brief members on the progress of the study.

(b) <u>Universal Retirement Protection</u>

The Panel and its Subcommittee on Retirement Protection had studied the subject of universal retirement protection in the last legislative term. The Subcommittee submitted its report (LC Paper No. CB(2)1942/11-12) to the Panel on 14 May 2012 and made a number of recommendations for the Administration's consideration. The Subcommittee also recommended that the Panel The subject will be followed up by the subcommittee after it is activated

should follow up with the Administration on the matter in the next legislative term.

The Panel accepted the joint proposal of Hon Alice MAK and Hon TANG Ka-piu to form a Subcommittee on Retirement Protection. The Subcommittee is in the first place on the waiting list.

3. Charitable fund-raising activities

The existing framework for the monitoring of charitable fund-raising activities was discussed at the meeting on 11 June 2007. Members agreed to further discuss the matter in the next session, especially the monitoring of the use of income generated from public charitable fund-raising activities.

Following the release of the Consultation Paper on Charities by the Charities Sub-committee of the Law Reform Commission ("LRC"), the Panel held a special meeting on 24 August 2011 to receive public views on the subject. The LRC Charities Sub-committee has proceeded to work on concrete proposals for enhancing the monitoring measures for charitable fund-raising activities in light of the views collected from the public consultation which ended in October 2011.

4. Review of Disability Allowance ("DA") and the system for processing applications thereof

The Panel met the Administration and deputations on the review of the system for processing applications for DA under the Social Security Allowance ("SSA") Scheme at its regular meeting on 10 December 2012.

The Panel held a special meeting on 25 February 2013 to discuss with the Administration its response to the views and concerns expressed by members and deputations, the Panel was also briefed on the work of the Administration's

inter-departmental Working Group to review DA, which would follow up on the subject of allowing people with loss of one limb to apply for DA.

The Panel received the Administration's briefing on the progress of the work of the Working Group at its meeting on 8 July 2013. The Chairman said that the subject matter should be further discussed at the first regular meeting of the next Legislative Council session.

Review of the one-year-continuous-residence requirement under the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance ("CSSA") Scheme and SSA Scheme

At the meeting on 12 July 2010, Mr LEUNG To be decided Yiu-chung expressed concern about the High Court ruling on the judicial review of the one-year-continuous-residence requirement under the CSSA Scheme and proposed to follow up the matter as well as the residence requirement for Old Age Allowance ("OAA") applicants.

anticipation of the appeal proceedings, In members agreed to revisit the need to discuss the matter in due course.

Pursuant to the Court of Appeal's ruling made in February 2012, the one-year-continuous-residence requirement was removed from the CSSA Scheme. Meanwhile, the Court of First Instance dismissed two cases of judicial review of the OAA one-year-continuous-residence requirement on 14 May and 17 September 2012 respectively, and ruled that the requirement was constitutional.

7. Review of rent allowance under the CSSA Scheme

At the joint meeting of the Panel and the Panel on Housing held on 13 April 2012, members expressed concern about the inadequacy of the rent allowance under the CSSA Scheme for street sleepers on CSSA to meet rental expenses of private housing and considered it necessary for the Panel to follow up on the review mechanism for the maximum rate of the rent allowance.

22. Ways to improve situation of refugees, torture claimants and asylum seekers in Hong Kong

The issue was discussed at the special meeting of the Panel on 22 July 2013. The Chairman will explore whether: (a) a joint meeting of the Panel on Welfare services ("WS Panel") and Panel on Security or a special meeting of the WS Panel can be held to further discuss the issue; and (b) a visit to the accommodation of the protection claimants at Ping Che can be arranged.

Dr Hon Fernando CHEUNG made a request (LC Paper No. CB(2) 1774/12-13(01)) on 4 September 2013 that the Panel, when it resumes after the summer break, should hold a meeting as soon as possible to further discuss the issue.

The Administration advised on 25 September 2013 that the International Social Service Hong Kong Branch is ready to arrange the aforesaid visit in October/November 2013.

23. Annual Adjustment of the Standard Payment Rates under the CSSA and the SSA Schemes

The proposed welfare facilities include a Special Child Care Centre cum Early Education and Training Centre, a Day Care Centre for the Elderly ("DE") and a Sub-base for Neighbourhood Elderly Centre. Following the established arrangements, the construction cost of the proposed facilities is to be funded by the As the proposed facilities are Lotteries Fund. anticipated to give rise to an additional recurrent cost exceeding \$10 million per annum, the funding approval will rest with the FC. The Administration intends to seek FC's approval in December 2013.
