## I. Meeting with the Administration

[Consultation Report and Proposals on the Method for Selecting the Chief Executive ("CE") by Universal Suffrage, and LC Paper No. CB(2)1454/14-15(01)]

The Subcommittee deliberated (index of proceedings attached at Annex).
2. The Administration was requested to submit a paper on whether the method for selecting CE in 2012 would continue to apply if the proposals to amend the method for selecting CE put forth by the Administration failed to obtain the endorsement by a two-thirds majority of all Members of the Legislative Council and, if so, the legal basis for such a position.
(Post-meeting note: The supplementary information paper provided by the Administration was issued vide LC Paper No. CB(2)1625/14-15(01) on 4 June 2015.)
3. The Subcommittee completed scrutiny of the draft motion concerning the amendment to the method for the selection of CE. Members agreed that the Subcommittee would report its deliberations to the House Committee at its meeting on 5 June 2015. The Administration informed members of its intention to move the motion concerning the amendment to the method for the
selection of CE at the Council meeting of 17 June 2015. No member raised objection.

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| 000527-001211 | Chairman Administration | Opening remarks <br> Examination of the draft motion concerning the amendment to the method for the selection of the Chief Executive ("CE") <br> Articles 4 and 5 of Annex I to the Basic Law ("BL") <br> The Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs ("SCMA") briefed members that under the Administration's proposals for the method for selecting CE by universal suffrage ("the Proposals"), a person who could obtain recommendation jointly by 120 nominating committee ("NC") members in their individual capacities could become a member seeking nomination for the CE election. The proposed threshold was lower than the existing requirement of nominations jointly by 150 Election Committee ("EC") members, so as to encourage more aspiring individuals to seek nomination. Moreover, a cap on the recommendations (i.e. 240) that each person seeking nomination should obtain was proposed. This meant that the system could allow at least five and at most 10 places for persons seeking nomination, so as to enhance the competitiveness of the nominating process. Further, it was proposed that NC should nominate two to three CE candidates through voting by secret ballot, and each NC member could vote for all persons seeking nomination, or vote for only some of such persons (at least two persons). Specific procedures for handling situations where no person, only one person, or more than three persons seeking nomination obtaining endorsement of more than half of all the NC members would be dealt with by local legislation. |  |


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| 001212-001631 | Chairman <br> Mr LEE Cheuk-yan <br> Administration | Mr LEE Cheuk-yan stressed that the Labour Party <br> supported the implementation of universal <br> suffrage for the CE election in 2017, but not <br> Proposals which were based on the restrictive <br> framework imposed by the Decision of the <br> Standing Committee of the National People's <br> Congress ("NPCSC") on 31 August 2014 ("2014 <br> Decision of NPCSC"). She cited the view expressed by Mr LAM Woon-kwong, Convenor of the Executive Council, that under the Proposals, no one from the pan-democratic camp could take part in the 2017 CE election, and they could at most only be "Kingmakers", voting for one of the candidates from the pro-establishment camp. <br> SCMA explained that whether or not a person could secure nomination by NC would entirely depend on his or her political strength as there was no additional eligibility requirement other than those set out in BL 44. He stressed that CE had to strike a balance among the interests of various sectors of the community. Therefore, under the Proposals, a person seeking nomination, irrespective of his/her political affiliation, would have to appeal to NC members for their support of his/her electoral platform, and the candidate must demonstrate that he/she was able to respond to the aspirations of the public and able to meet the needs of various sectors. |  |
| 003312-003739 | Chairman Dr KWOK Ka-ki Administration | Dr KWOK Ka-ki expressed concern that if the Proposals were to be "pocketed first", the Central Authorities and the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Government would consider that the universal suffrage as prescribed in BL 45 had been attained and they would not seek to improve the universal suffrage system beyond 2017. <br> SCMA explained that Article 7 of Annex I to BL and the "Five-step Process" of constitutional development set out in the 2004 Interpretation had provided the legal basis for initiating further amendments to the method for selecting CE in future. |  |
