<u>The Subcommittee</u> deliberated (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

- 2. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> took over as the Chair in the absence of the Chairman.
- 3. With the aid of the powerpoint presentation, <u>BMT Asia Pacific Limited</u> ("the Consultant") briefed members on the key findings of the consultancy study on ways to improve the operating environment of public markets ("the consultancy study").

(*Post-meeting note*: The softcopy of the powerpoint presentation materials was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(2)686/14-15(01) on 20 January 2015.)

4. <u>The Secretary for Food and Health</u> ("SFH") briefed members on the Administration's preliminary thinking on the Consultant's proposals to improve the operating environment of public markets.

(*Post-meeting note*: The speaking note of SFH was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(2)693/14-15(01) on 21 January 2015.)

## Timetable for taking forward the improvement measures

- 5. In response to members' enquiries on the Administration's timetable for taking forward measures to improve the operating environment of public markets, <u>SFH</u> made the following points -
  - (a) the Administration would liaise with the Consultant to respond to the main concerns raised by members at the meeting regarding the content and scope of the consultancy study, including (i) the final report of the consultancy study should provide a more detailed account of the positioning and functions of public markets, and of how the six "prototype" public markets would provide reference to other public markets; and (ii) the consultancy study should address such issues as retrofitting air-conditioning systems for public markets and the Administration should address the provision of new public markets in newly developed

- districts. The Administration expected that the Consultant would need another two or three months to finalize the report;
- (b) upon its completion, the final report of the consultancy would be released on the Government website; and
- (c) the Administration would revert to the Subcommittee before June 2015 with the preliminary proposals to implement the improvement plans, and at the same time, the proposals for rental adjustment mechanism.

### **Inviting deputations' views**

6. At the suggestion of Hon WONG Kwok-hing, <u>members</u> agreed to invite deputations to give views on the proposed improvement measures when the Administration released the final report of the consultancy study.

# **II.** Extension of period of work of the Subcommittee (LC Paper No. CB(2)643/14-15(03))

- 7. <u>Members</u> agreed that in the light of the work ahead, the Subcommittee should seek approval for the extension of the period of its work in the 2014-2015 session (i.e. until 30 September 2015).
- 8. <u>Members</u> noted that under the existing arrangements of appointment and operation of subcommittees, where a subcommittee considered it necessary to extend the period of its work but there were subcommittees on the waiting list awaiting activation, the House Committee might, if considered appropriate, give permission for the subcommittee to continue to operate for three more months after the expiry of the 12-month period to allow time for it to wrap up its current stage of work, after which, subject to the endorsement of the relevant Panel(s), the subcommittee would be placed on the waiting list for re-activation of work with the same membership (the subcommittee should re-open its membership if it reactivated in the next session) when a vacant slot arose to accommodate its re-activation.

(*Post-meeting note*: The proposed extension of the period of work of the Subcommittee (i.e. until 30 September 2015) was approved by the House Committee at its meeting on 20 March 2015.)
