Supplementary Information on the Review on the Chinese Temples Ordinance Required at the Meeting of the Panel on Home Affairs held on 24 March 2015

I refer to your letter dated 13 April 2015 requesting this Bureau to provide members with supplementary information on a number of issues related to the Review on the Chinese Temples Ordinance (the "Ordinance") at the meeting of the Panel on Home Affairs held on 24 March 2015 (item 7 of LC Paper No. CB(2)1167/14-15(02)).

Over the past three years, the Chinese Temples Committee (the "Committee") received a total of 57 complaint cases pertaining to the 25 temples directly administered by the Committee. These complaints involved mainly the work conducted by the organisations responsible for temple operation or that conducted by temple keepers, such as products or services offered by temple keepers (42 cases in total), as well as the operation, fees charged, opening hours of the temples or the arrangements of altar displays in the temples (15 cases in total). Details are at Annex.

Upon receipt of a complaint, the Committee will conduct investigations in light of the information furnished by the complainant. If the complaint is substantiated, the Committee will suggest improvements, issue warnings to or discipline the temple keeper concerned according to the contract, or require the temple to improve its services. A reply will also be given to the complainant.

The Ordinance was enacted in 1928 based on the social needs Comparing with the societal development at that time, during the period. members of the public are now much more aware of the risks associated with pseudo-religious establishments. Furthermore, there are already various pieces of legislation providing protection and remedies against frauds, malpractices and misuses of funds, as well as possible environmental and safety problems that are associated with organisations. These legal provisions are also applicable to the operation of Chinese temples as well as other religious bodies. If any temple acts in contravention to any other relevant ordinances (such as the issues related to handling of public donations, temple safety), the government departments concerned will follow up the matters or take prosecution In recent years, the Government has been actions as appropriate. focusing its work on how the provisions in the Ordinance should be updated so that the Ordinance could keep pace with the times and better serve prevailing social needs having regard to present circumstances.

At present, other than Chinese temples, other religious facilities in Hong Kong are not subject to similar restraints as imposed by the relevant provisions in the Ordinance. As the situations of other jurisdictions in terms of social background, religion, legal and regulatory regime are different from those in Hong Kong, their modes of regulation on Chinese temples may not be applicable to Hong Kong.
