Motion to adjourn further proceedings

The Committee continued to deal with the motion to adjourn further proceedings of the Committee moved by Mr Albert CHAN pursuant to paragraph 39 of the Finance Committee Procedure ("FC Procedure").

2. <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> expressed support for the motion to adjourn further proceedings. <u>Mr CHAN</u> pointed out that in the light of the Administration's failure to fully respond to various queries raised by members in relation to the work of the Research and Development ("R&D") centres, the Committee should not continue with the deliberation on the item.

Action - 5 -

- 3. In response to the motion proposed by Mr Albert CHAN, Commissioner for Innovation and Technology ("CIT") said that the data provided in the meeting paper was certainly correct. The data published in the website probably had not included on-going projects and collaborative projects with industry partners, and was therefore different from the figure shown in the meeting paper.
- 4. <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> gave concluding remarks. <u>The Chairman</u> then put Mr CHAN's motion to vote. As members claimed a division, <u>the Chairman</u> ordered a division and the division bell was rung for five minutes. <u>The Chairman</u> announced that 6 members voted in favour of the motion and 37 members voted against the motion. - 5. The Chairman declared that the motion was negatived.
- 6. The Committee resumed deliberation on the item FCR(2015-16)33.

The development direction of the R&D centres

- 7. Mr WU Chi-wai noted that there was a trend in recent years for the textiles and apparel industry to relocate to South East Asia instead of establishing a presence in Hong Kong. He asked whether it was the goal of the Administration to promote Hong Kong as the R&D centre for the textiles and apparel industry and what its relevant strategy was.
- 8. <u>CIT</u> replied that the relevant plan of the Government was to attract the development of smart production of high value-added industries in Hong Kong, with a view to achieving the goal of re-industrialization. It was also the wish of the Government to attract the relevant R&D talents to come to Hong Kong and develop their career in the territory.

Biodiesel

- 9. <u>Dr LAM Tai-fai</u> and <u>Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung</u> enquired about the details of the development of biodiesel in Hong Kong, including the progress of negotiation with the trade. <u>Chief Executive Officer, The Nano and Advanced Materials Institute</u> ("NAMI") replied that the R&D Centre had already signed a contract with a company located in the EcoPark to commercialize the relevant technology locally. Besides, the R&D Centre had also been communicating with the trade on a regular basis.
- 10. <u>Mr WU Chi-wai</u> requested the Administration to cite electric vehicles ("EVs") as an example and describe in details how the Administration maneuvered its policy to promote the industrialization of R&D results of local innovative technologies.
- 11. Secretary for Innovation and Technology ("SIT") responded that the Government had been committed to promoting the technology of EVs in Hong Kong. Its objective was to strengthen charging facilities in housing estates so that the use of EVs would become more popular. Combined with Internet of Things technologies, the technology of EVs would also initiate a new development direction for innovative technologies. General Manager, The Automotive Parts and Accessory Systems ("APAS") R&D Centre added that the development direction of the R&D Centre was to provide the trade with technology support for quick chargers and medium speed charging technology.

Innovative technologies related to social welfare

- 12. <u>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</u> expressed his dissatisfaction that the Administration was using market-driven as an excuse for not promoting strongly the development of innovative technologies related to social welfare and neglecting the needs of the underprivileged (such as persons with disabilities).
- 13. <u>SIT</u> remarked that while the Government was ready to play a leading role, it still needed the cooperation of the industry to develop appropriate technologies in the light of market demands and to facilitate commercialization. He pointed out that the ageing population would bring about more opportunities. For instance, a research project had been conducted by the Polytechnic University on a muscle activated robotic hand named "Hand of Hope", which was used as a kind of physiotherapy equipment. It was expected that there would be more room for its development in the future. <u>CIT</u> added that the Government proactively encouraged social welfare organizations to conduct trials on suitable local R&D results, such as guide tiles, to cater for the needs of persons with disabilities. At present, the Government had not required that the resources invested by R&D centres in projects related to social welfare must account for a certain proportion of its total amount of R&D investments.

Policy on innovation and technology

- 14. <u>Mr WU Chi-wai</u> asked whether the innovation and technology development in Hong Kong had been hampered by the failure of the Administration to offer policy facilitation such as concessions in terms of land grant and taxation.
- 15. <u>SIT</u> replied that while Hong Kong was well-positioned to develop innovative technologies, the role of the Government was to provide assistance to facilitate these developments, such as sharing the risks of R&D.

Other comments

16. The Chairman and Mr Albert CHAN requested the Administration to provide a reply in writing to explain the reason for the significant difference between the latest data published in the website and the data provided in the meeting paper. Mr CHAN clarified that he had no intention of accusing the Administration of deliberately exaggerating the figure. CIT undertook to deal with the relevant issue and give a reply as soon as possible.

- 17. <u>Ms Claudia MO</u> queried that the Chinese term of "Parts and Accessory Systems" in the name of The APAS R&D Centre was a term used on the Mainland. She asked the Administration to consider changing the name. <u>SIT</u> replied that since the name of the R&D Centre had been used for a long time and never become a hindrance in communication, the Administration would not consider making any changes. <u>Mr WONG Ting-kwong</u> commented that the term "Parts and Accessory Systems" had also been adopted in the names of some related organizations in Hong Kong.
- 18. While Mr WONG Ting- kwong was speaking, Ms Claudia MO spoke in response to his comment without the Chairman's permission. The Chairman urged members not to have dialogues with other members when expressing their views.
- 19. Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung criticized that the Government had lowered the target level of industry sponsorship many times in order to cover up the fact that the R&D centres had failed to meet the requirements. In doing so, the Government was suspected of "moving the goalposts" or engaging in glossing over mistakes. Such an act was undesirable.
- 20. <u>Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung</u> criticized the Government's lack of vigorous efforts in promoting the development of "big data" and "Smart City".

Motions proposed by members pursuant to paragraph 37A of the FC Procedure

21. There being no further question from members, the Chairman declared that the Committee would proceed to deal with motions proposed by members pursuant to paragraph 37A of the FC Procedure.

Motion proposed by Mr CHAN Chi-chuen

The Chairman put to vote the question that the motion proposed by Mr CHAN Chi-chuen numbered 0001 be proceeded forthwith. As requested by members, the Chairman ordered a division and the division bell was rung for five minutes. With the agreement of the Chairman, Mr CHAN Chi-chuen read out his proposed motion during the ringing of the division bell. The question was negatived.

Motion moved by Mr IP Kwok-him pursuant to paragraph 47 of the FC Procedure

23. Mr IP Kwok-him moved without notice a motion under paragraph 47 of the FC Procedure that in the event of further divisions being claimed in

respect of any motions or questions under the same agenda item, the Committee should proceed to each of such divisions immediately after the division bell had been rung for one minute. The Chairman proposed the question on Mr IP Kwok-him's motion.

- 24. Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung, Mr CHAN Chi-chuen and Mr Albert CHAN spoke against Mr IP Kwok-him's motion. These members argued that if the division bell was shortened to one minute, some members might not be able to return to the Conference Room in time to cast their votes. Besides, members should be allowed sufficient time to consider the relevant motion, and one minute was not adequate.
- 25. <u>Dr CHIANG Lai-wan</u> indicated her support for Mr IP Kwok-him's motion.
- 26. In response to Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung's enquiry, the Chairman advised that members were not allowed to amend the arrangement under paragraph 47 of the FC Procedure that the Committee had to proceed to each of such divisions immediately after the division bell had been rung for one minute, including the duration of the division bell.
- 27. There being no further comments from members, the Chairman put the question to vote. As requested by members, the Chairman ordered a division and the division bell was rung for five minutes. The Chairman announced that 24 members voted in favour of and 8 members voted against the question. The voting results of individual members were as follows –

29. The Chairman put to vote, one by one, the questions that the motions proposed by Mr Albert CHAN numbered 0002 to 0004 be proceeded forthwith. As requested by members, the Chairman ordered a division for each of the proposed motions, and the division bell was rung for one minute for each division. With the agreement of the Chairman, Mr Albert CHAN read out each of his proposed motions during the ringing of the division bell. All the questions were negatived.

31. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the item was approved.

CAPITAL WORKS RESERVE
HEAD 710 – COMPUTERISATION
Hong Kong Police Force
Replacement of the Infrastructure Platform for the Police Operational Nominal Index Computer System and the Criminal Intelligence Computer System

- 32. <u>The Chairman</u> advised that this item invited members to approve a new commitment of \$81,672,000 for the replacement of an obsolete infrastructure platform that supported Hong Kong Police's computer systems.
- 33. Mr IP Kwok-him, Chairman of the Panel on Security, reported that the Panel on Security had discussed the proposal for replacement of the infrastructure platform for the Police Operational Nominal Index Computer System ("PONICS") and the Criminal Intelligence Computer System ("CICS") at its meeting held on 10 April 2015. Some members expressed concern about whether the Administration would consider adding new functions to PONICS and CICS as well as the maintenance support of the infrastructure platform for the two systems. The Administration remarked that while the proposed replacement of the infrastructure platform would not involve new functions, the processing speed would be increased. As regards the maintenance of the existing systems, the Administration would ask the maintenance contractor to extend their maintenance service until the new infrastructure platform came into Moreover, some members also expressed concern about the volume of personal information stored inside PONICS and requested the Administration to provide such information in its paper for the Finance Committee ("FC"). Members had no objection in principle to the Administration's submission of its proposal to FC.

Updating the infrastructure system

- 34. In response to the concern expressed by Mr Charles Peter MOK about the updating of the software and hardware of the infrastructure systems, Under Secretary for Security ("US for S") remarked that as the supply of major hardware components (e.g. hard disks, storage area network switches) had already discontinued and the software was outdated, support from the manufacturers after May 2017 would be minimal. Currently the platform had shown signs of ageing. There was a high risk of system failure which could not be recovered easily, and this might lead to security loopholes.
- 35. <u>Mr Charles Peter MOK</u> asked whether the updated infrastructure system would have linkages with other non-local systems on the front of counter-terrorism intelligence.
- 36. <u>US for S</u> replied that while the updated infrastructure system would be used in handling counter-terrorism intelligence, the system would not have linkages with other non-local systems.
- 37. <u>Ms Cyd HO</u> enquired whether the infrastructure system of the Police and the automated passenger clearance system of the Immigration Department would have shared access to data. <u>US for S</u> advised in reply that the two systems did not have linkages with each other.
- 38. <u>Mr SIN Chung-kai</u> asked why new functions were not added in the updating of the infrastructure platform this time around.
- 39. <u>US for S</u> remarked that since the existing functions were adequate to meet the needs, new functions were not added to the system. However, with the enhancement of processing speed and the improvement in efficiency in system analysis of data, the updated system would be safer and more reliable.
- 40. In response to Mr WU Chi-wai's enquiry on the updating of the infrastructure platform, Assistant Commissioner of Police (Information Systems Wing) said that upon the securing of funding, officers from the Hong Kong Police Force would work with officers from the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer to manage the various stages of the project, including tendering, evaluation and award of contract, design of the infrastructure platform, delivery and installation of hardware and software, testing of the infrastructure platform, and commissioning of the infrastructure platform for system migration. The Administration would also recruit information

technology personnel outside the Government to take up the dedicated task of programme design and development.

Mechanism to safeguard against abuse of personal information stored in the system

- 41. In the light of past cases, <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> expressed his concern about possible abuse of personal information stored in the system by police officers. He questioned whether the Administration had put in place any mechanism to safeguard against abuse.
- 42. <u>US for S</u> replied that the Administration attached a lot of importance to mechanisms that safeguarded against abuse. First of all, only authorized personnel of the Police were allowed to operate the system. The function of audit trail was also installed in the system to allow the management to monitor the record of access to the system. Review of the audit trail would be conducted by the person-in-charge on a regular basis, the process of which included selecting certain access characteristics for review purposes, with a view to ensuring that the personal information stored in the system would not be abused.

Fingerprint and Palmprint Livescan System

- 43. Mr Charles Peter MOK, Ms Cyd HO, Mr CHAN Chi-chuen and Ms Claudia MO noted that the Fingerprint and Palmprint Livescan System was not be used by front-line police stations to process the information of arrested persons during large-scale arrests. Instead, manual fingerprint data input of arrested persons was adopted. They expressed concern about the frequency of system failure and the reliability of the system. These members also expressed their worry that if front-line police officers were inadequate trained, that might result in the electronic system not being fully utilized.
- 44. <u>US for S</u> explained that 103 workstations of the Fingerprint and Palmprint Livescan System had been installed to replace the process of fingerprints taking by ink. The overall performance of the workstations was satisfactory. However, occasional system failure could not be ruled out. Eight incidents of system failure of the workstations had been recorded since they commenced operation in 2014. The Police had in place contingency measures to cater for system failure of the workstations. The Administration would also conduct a study into the need for updating the system in due course. As for the infrastructure platform involved in the application, 23 incidents of system failure were recorded over the past 12 months.

- 45. On the training of front-line police officers, <u>US for S</u> advised that front-line police officers would receive appropriate system operation training. <u>Chief Superintendent (Crime Support) (Crime Wing)</u> ("CS(CS)") added that the relevant system came into service in 2014, and police officers responsible for operating the system had all received relevant training prior to using the system.
- 46. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen and Ms Claudia MO enquired about the proportion of using the Fingerprint and Palmprint Livescan System in the course of processing information of arrested persons and the time needed for the procedure. CS(CS) advised that the Fingerprint and Palmprint Livescan System was used in taking fingerprints in about 75% of arrest cases. The entire procedure of collecting personal information of an arrested person took about 30 minutes.

Application for criminal conviction records

- 47. Mr WU Chi-wai pointed out that whenever a member of the public applied for a Certificate of No Criminal Conviction or other criminal conviction records, the Police required the person to verify his identity by taking his fingerprints, which caused inconvenience to residents who needed to repeatedly apply for the relevant information. He enquired whether the Administration would consider using other identity documents (such as identity card) for identity verification.
- 48. <u>US for S</u> and <u>CS(CS)</u> stressed that as the Certificate of No Criminal Conviction was an important document, it was necessary for the Administration to handle the verification process carefully. Relying solely on verification by identity card might lead to certain loopholes. It was only through taking fingerprints could a risk-free process be ensured. Moreover, the Police would exercise more flexibility in handling procedures in relation to some criminal conviction records (such as sexual offender records). Applicants were required to have their fingerprints taken once only at the time of initial application.

Other issues

49. Mr SIN Chung-kai said that at a meeting of the Bills Committee on Interception of Communications and Surveillance (Amendment) Bill 2015, members of the Bills Committee asked the Administration to provide the number of applications made by the Police to the court for search warrants, but the Administration responded by saying that it did not maintain the relevant

statistics. <u>Mr SIN</u> queried whether the Administration had refused to disclose the relevant information due to political reasons.

- 50. <u>US for S</u> responded that the information pertaining to the Police's applications for search warrants would not be kept in the infrastructure platform under this item, and therefore was unrelated to this item under discussion. The Administration had already confirmed at the meeting of the Panel on Security that new functions would not be added to the updated system.
- 51. At 7:10 pm, the Chairman announced that the meeting be adjourned.
- 52. The meeting was adjourned at 7:10 pm.
