- (b) The financial provision for 2016-17 is further increased by 4.9% compared with the revised provision for 2015-16, or by 9.1% compared with the original estimate for that year. However, as stated under Recurrent expenditure (page 37 of the Estimates), the Chief Executive's Office will delete 1 permanent post in 2016-17. In this case, what are the main uses of the increased provision for 2016-17? What is the permanent post to be deleted? Will it be deleted permanently or temporarily?
- (c) Regarding the item "Remuneration for special appointments", paragraph 4 under Operating Account (page 37 of the Estimates), the estimate for 2016-17 is higher than that for 2015-16 by 10.96%. What are the special appointments? What are the main uses of the increased provision?

Reply:

(a) The revised estimate for the Chief Executive's Office (excluding the Executive Council) for 2015-16 is higher than the original estimate by 4% mainly due to the additional expenditure on personal emoluments, the additional expenditure arising from remuneration adjustments for officers under special appointment and the increase in general departmental expenses for operational needs.

- (b) The estimated expenditure of the Chief Executive's Office (excluding the Executive Council) for 2016-17 is higher than the revised estimate for 2015-16 by 4.9% mainly due to the additional expenditure on personal emoluments, the additional provision for remuneration for special appointments arising from payment of end-of-contract gratuities to 2 officers under special appointment, and the increase in general departmental expenses for operational needs. Moreover, this Office plans to delete 1 permanent post of Housekeeper in 2016-17 to suit operational needs.
- The estimate of "Remuneration for special appointments" for 2016-17 is higher than (c) the revised estimate for 2015-16 mainly because end-of-contract gratuities have to be paid to 2 officers under special appointment in 2016-17. The estimated expenditure on remuneration for officers under special appointment for 2016-17 is tabulated below:

Reply:

As a general rule, all politically appointed officials and civil servants should observe the same principles when providing official entertainment in the form of meals. They are required to exercise prudent judgment and economy in order to avoid any public perception of extravagance, and should act in accordance with the relevant regulations and administrative guidelines. According to the existing guidelines, expenditure on official meals should not exceed \$450 per person for lunch or \$600 per person for dinner, inclusive of all expenses incurred on food and beverages consumed on the occasion, service charges and tips. The Chief Executive's Office follows the same principles and guidelines on official entertainment. In 2014-15 and 2015-16 (as at 29 February 2016), the actual expenditures on official entertainment of the Chief Executive's Office were \$270,000 and \$360,000 respectively. The estimated expenditure for 2016-17 is \$430,000.

In addition, the Chief Executive receives a non-accountable entertainment allowance for meeting expenses on official entertainment at his official residences. The amount of the allowance was \$834,200 in 2014-15 and \$870,900 in 2015-16. For 2016-17, the estimated expenditure on the allowance is \$897,000.

In line with the Government's green policy, public officers should as far as possible refrain from bestowing gifts/souvenirs on others in the conduct of official activities. According to the existing guidelines, where bestowal of gifts/souvenirs is necessary or unavoidable due to operational, protocol or other reasons, the gift/souvenir items should not be lavish or extravagant and the number should be kept to a minimum. Also, the exchange of gifts/souvenirs should only be made from organisation to organisation. This Office did not give any gifts in 2014-15 and 2015-16 (as at 29 February 2016).

The Chief Executive's Office (excluding the Executive Council) will have an establishment of 89 permanent posts in 2016-17 and the estimated salary expenditure involved is \$44.03 million. The estimated expenditure on duty visits made by the Chief Executive is \$3.08 million.

The estimated expenditure of the Chief Executive's Office (excluding the Executive Council) for 2016-17 is higher than the revised estimate for 2015-16 by about \$4.1 million mainly due to the additional expenditure on personal emoluments, the additional provision for remuneration for special appointments arising from payment of end-of-contract gratuities to 2 officers under special appointment, and the increase in general departmental expenses for operational needs.

The estimated expenditure of the Executive Council for 2016-17 is lower than the revised estimate for 2015-16 by about \$300,000 mainly due to the decrease of estimated expenditure on salaries as a result of reduction of 1 Non-official Member of the Executive Council.

A Belt and Road Office will also be established to take forward related studies, and coordinate work between government departments and other organisations, such as the Hong Kong Trade Development Council and the Hong Kong Tourism Board. It will also liaise with the central ministries, provincial and municipal authorities, as well as various sectors, professional bodies and community organisations in Hong Kong. The Government will consider the composition of the steering committee as well as the organisation and functions of the related office carefully. Details will be announced in due course. This Office has not earmarked any additional manpower or financial resources for the above work for 2016-17.
