The canopy in question and the Extension Project portion are independent structures separately connected to the main structure of the Legislative Council ("LegCo") Complex. The canopy is located underneath the Extension Project portion. The Architectural Services Department ("ArchSD") has completed the structural works for reinstalling the I-beams which support the canopy while the reinstallation works of the canopy cladding, glazing panels and building services are expected to be completed in March 2016. As the LegCo Complex is a government property, expenditure on works for the building structure and related facilities of the Complex, including the above works, is borne by ArchSD.

Each Legislative Council ("LegCo") Member is provided with an office in the LegCo Complex. Mr Ronny TONG's office was a combined office shared with 5 Members belonging to the Civic Party.

- 2. To ensure that the new Member returned at the 2016 by-election, irrespective of political affiliation, would have an office for use once he/she was elected, it was necessary to reinstate the office vacated by Mr Ronny TONG to an individual Member's office no later than the date of by-election, i.e. 28 February 2016. The Secretariat therefore requested the Architectural Services Department ("ArchSD") to reinstate the office vacated by Mr Ronny TONG once his resignation took effect on 1 October 2015. The reinstatement works were completed by ArchSD on 20 February 2016.

The existing contract for the provision of cleansing service in the Legislative Council ("LegCo") Complex covers a period of 36 months from 15 September 2013 to 14 September 2016. The contract does not require the cleansing contractor to provide information on the turnover rate of its cleaners employed for the cleaning work for the LegCo Complex. The cleansing contractor has also advised that it has not compiled such information.

- 2. According to the service contract, the cleansing contractor is required to pay each cleaner/worker, during the service period, monthly wage in an amount not less than:
 - (a) the Average Monthly Salary for Cleaner (general) as promulgated in the latest Quarterly Report of Wage and Payroll Statistics published by the Census and Statistics Department; or
 - (b) statutory minimum wage plus paid rest days,

whichever is the higher. The contractor is also required to report to the LegCo Secretariat the result of each wage level review and make available documents and information for inspection by the LegCo Secretariat at any time.

- 3. Currently, the wage for cleaners is \$33 per hour and they normally work 8 hours per day. The cleaners are entitled to 1 paid rest day for every period of 7 days, 12 paid statutory holidays, and 7 days of annual leave increasing progressively to a maximum of 14 days according to their length of service.
- 4. The cleansing contractor is required to provide on a quarterly basis and upon request of the LegCo Secretariat details of the working hours, working days, payment of wages and record of contribution to the statutory provident fund schemes in respect of the cleaners employed for providing cleansing service for the LegCo Complex for inspection by the LegCo Secretariat. According to the information provided by the contractor and verified by the LegCo Secretariat, the wages for cleaners had been increased in each of the first 3 quarters of 2015 in accordance with the results of the wage level reviews mentioned in paragraph 2 above.

2. Under the existing arrangements, SI service in English and Cantonese is undertaken by interpreters from the Government's Simultaneous Interpretation Section, while SI services in Putonghua and sign language are outsourced to service contractors. Details of manpower and estimated costs for the provision of SI services in 2016-17 are set out below:

The Legislative Council ("LegCo") passed a resolution on 19 March 2014 to amend the Rules of Procedure to set out the Council's policy on access to the Legislature's documents and records ("the Policy") and to establish the Committee on Access to the Legislature's Documents and Records ("CoA") to oversee the implementation of the policy. The Policy provides, among other things, that all closed documents and records will be available for public access 50 years after they have been in existence as long as the disclosure is not against the law. CoA may grant access to a document or record earlier than the 50-year closure period subject to certain exemptions from disclosure after a review of the document or record.

- 2. To streamline the processing of access requests and facilitate the work of Members, CoA has recently approved a new arrangement for handling access requests made by Members and government bureaux/departments to closed documents and records of dissolved or defunct committees to which they had access subject to certain conditions. Details of the new arrangement will be uploaded onto the website of the Legislative Council.
- 3. Additional workload generated from the Policy, including conducting review on access requests and servicing of CoA, is absorbed by the LegCo Secretariat through the redeployment of resources. No additional expense is required for the implementation of the Policy.

Persons with disabilities and their accompanying persons may use the new Footbridge Entrance on 1/F of the LegCo Complex, which is a barrier-free access, to enter the LegCo Complex. In addition, the following enhancements to the barrier-free facilities inside the LegCo Complex are in progress and targeted for completion in 2016-17:

- (a) extension of the tactile guide path from Public Entrance 2 to the Video Corner on G/F; and
- (b) addition of audio signal for turnstiles at various locations in the LegCo Complex.
- 2. As the LegCo Complex is a government property, expenditure on works for the building structure and related facilities of the Complex, including the above items, is borne by the Architectural Services Department and not by The Legislative Council Commission.

3. Barrier-free facilities in the vicinity of the LegCo Complex are provided by the Government. In 2015-16, the Highways Department constructed a tactile guide path leading from Tim Mei Avenue outside Members' Entrance 2 of the Complex to the Harcourt Road Footbridge. Admission passes previously issued to visitors of Members and the Secretariat were chip cards which carried access rights to different floors.

- 2. The admission passes were changed to paper form in October 2014 to enhance the security of the LegCo Complex. Such passes contain information, including the date of issue and the floor the visitor is allowed to access, for easy identification. Visitors are expected to be escorted by Members, Members' assistants or Secretariat staff at all times. As such, they are not issued chip cards that would have given them access through secured doors inside the Complex.
- 3. Admission passes are made of woodfree paper and the used passes are collected for recycling. They are not reusable as admission passes are only valid on the date of issue. The number of admission passes issued to visitors since October 2014 is as follows:

Since the commissioning of the Legislative Council ("LegCo") Complex, the LegCo Secretariat has received about 40 reports on unwanted fire alarms and also a report on the malfunctioning of some fire exit doors during the fire drill in December 2014. Upon receipt of such reports, the LegCo Secretariat reported them to the Electrical and Mechanical Services Department ("EMSD"), which is responsible for the operation and maintenance services of the electrical, mechanical, air-conditioning and building services systems and equipment in the LegCo Complex, and required that on-site inspections and urgent repair be conducted immediately. EMSD were also requested to investigate and report on the causes of the incidents. According to EMSD after inspections, the unwanted fire alarms were caused by accidental triggering or system faults. The malfunctioning of some fire exit doors during the fire drill in December 2014 was caused by a defective electronic power converter which was replaced subsequently.

- 2. To ensure that the new Member returned at the 2016 by-election, irrespective of political affiliation, would have an office for use once he/she was elected, it was necessary to reinstate the office vacated by Mr Ronny TONG back to an individual Member's office no later than the date of by-election, i.e. 28 February 2016. The Secretariat therefore requested the Architectural Services Department ("ArchSD") to reinstate the office vacated by Mr Ronny TONG once his resignation took effect on 1 October 2015. The reinstatement works were completed by ArchSD on 20 February 2016.
- 3. As the LegCo Complex is a government property, expenditure on works for the building structure and related facilities of the Complex, including the above works, is borne by ArchSD. The expenditure incurred by the LegCo Secretariat for the new Member's office is about \$900, which is the cost for the provision of telephone lines, name plates, etc.

- 3. In the 2014-15 legislative session, the total number of overtime hours worked by the Secretariat staff directly or indirectly involved in servicing meetings of the Council and its committees, was about 16 299 hours.
