Manpower supply of clinical psychologists and educational psychologists

Regarding the manpower supply of clinical psychologists and educational psychologists, the Government and the University Grants Committee ("UGC") conduct academic planning for UGC-funded institutions on a triennial basis. The Labour and Welfare Bureau and Education Bureau will, with due regard to the prevailing manpower situation of clinical psychologists and educational psychologists, continue to liaise with the UGC in order to set manpower requirement targets for each academic planning cycle according to actual demand and availability of resources.

The framework, standards, requirements and accreditation process of the Accredited Registers Scheme

2. The Department of Health commissioned the Jockey Club School of Public Health and Primary Care, The Chinese University of Hong Kong ("CUHK") to conduct a feasibility study on launching an accredited registers scheme ("the Scheme") for non-statutorily regulated healthcare professions in Hong Kong and propose a set of framework and standards for the Scheme. The preliminary framework, standards and requirements of the Scheme proposed by CUHK is at <u>Annex</u>.

3. CUHK has been maintaining close liaison with the healthcare professions about the proposed framework, standards, requirements and accreditation process of the Scheme. CUHK organised a half-day symposium for healthcare professionals in September 2014 to share experience of the Accredited Voluntary Registers Model in the United Kingdom. In addition, CUHK held three consultation forums in October 2015 and conducted eight training sessions during May to September 2016 on the details of the Scheme.

Accredited Registers Scheme Preliminary Proposals on Framework, Standards and Requirements

Background

Accredited Registers (AR) Scheme is a self-assessment and external peer review process conducted by an independent team of Surveyors to assess organisations that register practitioners of a healthcare profession which is not already regulated by statute, in order to provide assurance that the accredited registers are well maintained and the organisations can enable the achievement of high professional standards among its registrants.

The AR Scheme is a process that emphasizes governance, standards, evaluation, and continuous improvement.

The accreditation process is developmental and starts with a Pilot Project. The AR Scheme encourages and helps professions to assess their current standards and identify areas for improvement.

The accreditation process is not mandatory and is by application.

Approval for holding and maintaining a register is not automatic, and only professional organisations that maintain registers which have met the prescribed standards and requirements will have their application considered and approved.

Objectives

By accrediting organisations as holders of registers which demonstrate the ability of the profession to meet acceptable standards of quality, the AR Scheme aims

- 1. To protect the public through quality assurance; and
- 2. To uphold standards of the professions registered.

Target

At the pilot stage, the AR Scheme targets at the 15 non-statutorily regulated healthcare practitioners¹ under the health services functional constituency. If other professionals have a genuine interest in joining the pilot scheme as one of the pioneers, their requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

The professional body should have a broad representative of the corresponding profession and with an established operation for a substantive period (including those newly formed professional body which is set up from re-structuring or merging of other established associations / societies). Register function, education and training and professional standards are key elements of a professional body.
