004359-004938	Chairman Dr Helena WONG WKCDA	<ul> <li>(a) how WKCDA would enhance collaborations with and support for arts teachers and educators in local schools and universities with a view to maximizing efforts in promoting arts education and developing students' ability in appreciating arts; and</li> <li>(b) whether WKCDA had launched summer programmes for students to let them have an advanced understanding of the West Kowloon Cultural District ("WKCD") in preparation for the commissioning of its arts and cultural facilities.</li> <li>WKCDA indicated that:</li> <li>(a) arts education, including the important elements of training the trainers, audience building and community engagement were among the key on-going initiatives of WKCDA. For example, M+ had organized a school and community outreach programme M+ Rover each year since 2016. Other initiatives included the monthly Freespace Happening programme held in the Nursery Park, the 101 Lecture/Workshop Series offering free learning and participatory courses in major performing arts forms, and exhibitions at M+ Pavilion, etc.; and</li> <li>(b) M+ held M+ Summer Camp in the past three summers. The camps had attracted over 300 students from different schools and backgrounds so far.</li> <li>Dr WONG acknowledged the above efforts of WKCDA</li> </ul>		
		Dr WONG acknowledged the above efforts of WKCDA and hoped to see the continuation and expansion of those		

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		programmes that had reaped positive results and to reach more audience.	
004939- 005619	Chairman Deputy Chairman WKCDA	The Deputy Chairman was concerned if the diverse views of some local xiqu performers on the appointment of a non-Chinese Artistic Director, Performing Arts would have any impact on WKCDA's plans relating to the Xiqu Centre soon to be opened. She further asked about:	
		(a) whether WKCDA would consider further extending the duration of the M+ internship programme to over six months, and initiating some forms of interface between the M+ internship programme and the Arts Administrator Trainee Programme under the Leisure and Cultural Services Department ("LCSD");	
		(b) how WKCDA would support longer running productions in the light of its "Performing Arts Venue Hiring Policy"; and details of the charging mechanism for venue hiring, including how the box office income would be shared between WKCDA and the hirers for ticketed events, as well as the setting of the ticket prices such as for the Tea House Theatre programmes.	
		WKCDA indicated that the Authority maintained close contacts with the xiqu community, in particular The Chinese Artists Association of Hong Kong (香港八和會館), on the development of the Xiqu Centre. The Head of Xiqu had been appointed recently to take up the task of, among others, enhancing the collaboration between WKCDA and the xiqu community. Besides, the Xiqu Centre Advisory Panel would advise the Performing Arts Committee on the management and operation of the Xiqu Centre and other matters relating to the development of the xiqu art form. WKCDA further responded that:	
		(a) it would continue to review the arrangements including the duration of the M+ internship programme. Apart from this programme, the Venice Biennale Internship Programme was another ongoing initiative of M+ offering the chance for interns to gain unique insight into the working of the international art exhibitions; and	
		(b) under the artistically-driven approach for according priority in venue booking, the Performing Arts Department of WKCDA would determine the priority for staging artistic events with due consideration to the duration of the performance period of the productions and the art forms. Generally speaking,	

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		longer run productions would be given higher priority in booking. A two-tier venue charging approach comprising a base hiring fee and a percentage share of box office income would be adopted for ticketed events. Under this approach, WKCDA could recover the basic event-generated costs and out-of-pocket expenses. In addition, through financial risk-sharing, small and medium-sized performing companies might be able to stage productions of longer duration. At the moment, the price-setting would be subject to the approval of the Board of WKCDA. There would be an announcement in the coming months.

010239	WKCDA	<ul> <li>(a) in pursuit of its vision to become a world-class arts and cultural hub, whether it would be adequate focusing on local performances, or there should be plans on and budget for inviting also renowned arts groups from the Mainland and the overseas to stage performances at WKCD; if the latter, the proportion of groups to be invited; and</li> <li>(b) the expected number of full-time and part-time docent volunteers when WKCD facilities were in operation; and whether WKCDA would collaborate with local travel agents and provide training to local tourist guides on the provision of docent services in WKCD.</li> </ul>	
		WKCDA explained that:	
		(a) with priority given to the grooming of local arts groups and performers, the Authority had also forged partnerships with overseas organizations in support of the long-term development of Hong Kong's performing arts ecology. For example, WKCDA had signed memoranda of understanding with institutions in the Mainland, Australia, the United Kingdom, Finland, etc. It would bring artists from other parts of the world to Hong Kong to present their works, thereby providing a platform for artistic inspiration and exchanges. Meanwhile, WKCDA had also joined the Silk Road International League of Theatres initiated by the China Arts and Entertainment Group, and had been working closely with associations and troupes in the region with a view to promoting traditional Chinese performing arts to a wider audience;	
		(b) WKCDA would update members on the latest	

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		financial situation of the WKCD project including the uses of its budget at the meeting of the Joint Subcommittee in February 2018; and	
		(c) M+ team had launched a docent volunteer programme with about 105 docent volunteers engaged so far to give regular tours of its exhibitions. The number of docent volunteer was expected to grow significantly. WKCDA also maintained close contacts with the Hong Kong Tourism Board ("HKTB") on promoting WKCD.

		WKCDA responded that:	
		(a) it had made use of various internet and multi-media channels to engage the community and young people were a particular target. It also used the traditional media channels. WKCDA had appointed a company to deal with international media and communication matters. Also, WKCDA attended Legislative Council meetings on a regular basis to keep members abreast of the latest developments at WKCD;	
		(b) it had organized a range of professional development and audience building programmes since 2012, and the professionals nurtured would be well-prepared for the opening of the arts and cultural venues in WKCD. The Xiqu Centre would open in late 2018, to be followed by Freespace in 2019 where special programmes produced by WKCDA would be staged throughout the opening year.; and	
		(c) WKCDA would strive to achieve financial	

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		sustainability for its venues while theatres and museums generally would not generate much profit. It was expected that the hiring income should cover most of the operating costs, such as electricity and cleaning fees, etc., of the performing arts venues.

Generally speaking, WKCDA expected that the operating deficit would increase further in the coming years;</li> <li>(b) WKCDA had initiated a number of cultural exchange and collaboration programmes to broaden and deepen exchanges between art communities and artists of all levels, diverse cultures and origins; and</li> <li>(c) M+ had organized Rethinking Pei: A Centenary Symposium with the Graduate School of Design at Harvard University and the Department of Architecture at The University of Hong Kong. The symposium was well received by attendees in Boston and Hong Kong. 		(a) WKCDA should maximize utilization of the performing arts venues, and support small and medium-sized arts groups by introducing a concessionary charging rate; and	
		(b) WKCDA should consider providing concession tickets for senior citizens, retirees and students.	
		WKCDA explained that:	
		(a) under the proposed charging mechanism for ticketed events, the nature of the programme and other factors would be taken into account, while the sharing of financial risks between the hirer and WKCDA would better support the small and medium-sized performing companies; and	
		(b) WKCDA provided concessionary tickets for its programmes, e.g. Rising Stars of Cantonese Opera. For individual programmes, different ticketing arrangements might be adopted.

In determining the priority of productions to be staged at the venues, one of the key factors would be their artistic considerations. Only a small proportion (i.e. about 10%) of the programmes was expected to be produced by WKCDA.

The proportion of visitors from different locations would depend on the nature of each programme, WKCDA did not set a target proportion as a whole; and</li> <li>(b) WKCDA had regular contacts, and maintained close liaison with the Tourism Commission and HKTB to launch joint marketing activities. 		with HKTB on the arrangement to provide relevant training for tour guides.

		(a) it would not prescribe what the street performers would perform. The guidelines under the Street Performance Scheme mainly meant for safety and to ensure cooperation and mutual respect in the sharing of public space by street performers. On this premise, street performances should take place at specific locations and without obstructing emergency vehicular access. The Authority did not censor the content of performances and had no intention to rank or regulate the performances; and	
		(b) applicants should apply in person for SP Permits, which were valid for one-year, at a cost of HK\$100. There was no upper limit on the number of permit to be issued. As at December 2017, 398 SP Permits had been issued by WKCDA since the establishment of the Street Performance Scheme.

		(a) benches would be provided along the promenade. In addition, to promote a vibrant, green, "walkable" environment for visitors, a new form of autonomous and zero-emissions vehicle was being operated on a trial basis. There would also be retail and dining facilities at the Double Edged Design in the southern edge of the Art Park, as well as café in Freespace; and	
		(b) there were two existing public landing steps within WKCD. WKCDA had proposed to take up the management responsibility of these public landing steps to facilitate the provision of water transport connection to be operated by third party providers. The proposal was subject to the approval of relevant government departments. An agreement could be reached and if all the permits were in place on time, the facilities could be in place by the opening of M+.
