Independent Auditor's Report To the Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region

Opinion

I certify that I have audited the financial statements of the Anti-epidemic Fund set out on pages 4 to 14, which comprise the statement of assets and liabilities as at 31 March 2021, and the statement of receipts and payments for the period from 21 February 2020 (date of establishment) to 31 March 2021, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the financial statements of the Anti-epidemic Fund are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with Clause 14.1 of the Declaration of Trust made by The Financial Secretary Incorporated on 21 February 2020 and the cash basis of accounting as described in note 2 to the financial statements.

Basis for opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with section 15(1) of the Audit Ordinance (Cap. 122) and the Audit Commission auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements* section of my report. I am independent of the Anti-epidemic Fund in accordance with those standards, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with those standards. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Director of Accounting Services' responsibilities for the financial statements

The Director of Accounting Services is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with Clause 14.1 of the Declaration of Trust, and for such internal control as the Director of Accounting Services determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Director of Accounting Services is responsible for assessing the Anti-epidemic Fund's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Audit Commission auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Audit Commission auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control;
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Anti-epidemic Fund's internal control;

- evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used by the Director of Accounting Services; and
- conclude on the appropriateness of the Director of Accounting Services' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Anti-epidemic Fund's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Anti-epidemic Fund to cease to continue as a going concern.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Expressed in Hong Kong dollars, unless otherwise stated)

1. GENERAL

The Anti-epidemic Fund (the Fund) was established on 21 February 2020 by a Declaration of Trust made by The Financial Secretary Incorporated (the Trustee). The objective of the Fund is to enhance the capability of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region as well as other relevant parties in combating the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) and to provide assistance or relief to enterprises and members of the public hard hit by the epidemic or affected by the anti-epidemic measures.

The Anti-epidemic Fund Steering Committee (the Steering Committee) has been established to assist the Trustee on all policies and procedures governing the operation of the Fund and on all matters relating to the administration of the Fund. For this purpose, the Trustee has delegated to the Steering Committee all of the trusts, powers and discretions vested in it as Trustee.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICY

The financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Transactions are recorded when moneys are received or paid.

3. DEPOSITS WITH BANKS

These are Hong Kong dollar deposits placed with licensed banks in Hong Kong.
