HON. SIR HENRY POLLOCK.—I notice the price is much bigger than before. Is it a better machine?

THE COLONIAL TREASURER.—It is a more up-to-date model with other little gadgets on it.

Item 33:—Miscellaneous Service:—5, Geological Survey of Colony \$1,500.

HON. SIR HENRY POLLOCK.—What is being done with regard to the geological survey of the Colony?

THE CHAIRMAN.—The survey is, I believe, finished and we are now waiting for Dr. Brock to write up his report and send it to us.

HON. SIR HENRY POLLOCK.—Will the report be published?

THE CHAIRMAN.—Yes, I hope so.
