Given the current shortage of bicycle parking spaces, if cycling becomes a major mode of transport and hence an increase in the number of cyclists, the problem of illegal bicycle parking may be worsened, which not only affects streetscape, but also causes road obstruction. Due to a lack of parking facilities, cyclists will have no choice but to travel with their bicycles on public

transport for connection to major transport nodes, which may intensify the friction between them and other passengers over issues such as boarding and alighting, seats and space. President, I oppose Member A's motion. As the speeds of pedestrians, bicycles and motor vehicles differ, it is neither safe nor proper for them to share roads. Moreover, the traffic in urban areas of Hong Kong is very heavy, with narrow and crowded roads. Bus and minibus routes are numerous and onstreet loading and unloading activities of goods and passengers are frequent. Statistics show that over 60% of fatal or serious traffic accidents involving bicycles occur on carriageways, while such accidents on cycle tracks account for less than 30% on average over the past three years. Therefore, to ensure road safety, we should not encourage the public to use bicycles as a mode of transport on busy roads ... #### MEMBER A (GEOGRAPHICAL CONSTITUENCY)

: (Stands up)

Thank you, President. Cycling is an ideal mode of "green commuting". It can effectively reduce the need of the public to take motor transport and achieve reduction in carbon emissions from transportation and thus less pollution. However, the cycling policy in Hong Kong is lagging behind. Members of the public have not been able to use bicycles as a mode of transport in an environment in which motor vehicles and bicycles can safely share space. The Government should expeditiously draw reference from successful overseas experiences and development directions in promoting bicycles as a mode of transport and actively consider incorporating cycle

tracks into the public transport network in mapping out the urban development blueprint. In addition, the Government must make corresponding rules and regulations and instil in the public the proper cycling attitude so that bicycles can truly become a safe and convenient mode of transport ...
