A flexible working system is an arrangement made by employers for offering options to employees to adjust their working hours and locations. This may enable employees to meet the needs of their work and personal life so that they can face less work pressure and have higher morale. This Council urges the Government to make laws to implement a flexible working system and provide support for employers, with a view to improving labour welfare in the long run and benefitting both employers and employees.

¹ To simplify the proceedings of the role-play, the passage of motions shall require a majority vote of the Members present. The voting procedure for real Council meetings is as follows:

⁽a) the passage of motions or amendments introduced by the Government requires a majority vote of the Members present;

⁽b) the passage of motions or amendments introduced by individual Members requires a majority vote of each of the two groups of Members present:

⁻ Members returned by the Election Committee; and

⁻ Members returned by functional constituencies and by geographical constituencies through direct elections.
