The arbitrary use of excessive lighting installations by the public will aggravate air pollution. 	Government has been implementing a voluntary charter scheme to encourage responsible persons for external lighting installations to switch off lights at a certain time at night. To review the effectiveness of the charter scheme, we have commissioned consultancies to conduct an opinion survey, measured the changes of illumination level in different districts, and studied applicable overseas experience. We will consider the next step, including whether legislation should be introduced to control the nuisance caused by external lighting, in the light of the assessment results (Student may come up with more points of his/her own) Thank you, President.
