Notes: (1) According to the Judgment of the Court of First Instance of the High Court on 15 November 2016, Sixtus LEUNG Chung-hang and YAU Wai-ching have been disqualified from assuming the office of a Member of the Legislative Council ("LegCo"), and have vacated the same since 12 October 2016, and are not entitled to act as a Member of LegCo.

(2) According to the Judgment of the Court of First Instance of the High Court on 14 July 2017, LEUNG Kwok-hung, Nathan LAW Kwun-chung, YIU Chung-yim and LAU Siu-lai have been disqualified from assuming the office of a Member of LegCo, and have vacated the same since 12 October 2016, and are not entitled to act as a Member of LegCo.

(3) Gary FAN Kwok-wai, AU Nok-hin, Vincent CHENG Wing-shun and Tony TSE Wai-chuen were declared to be returned as Members of LegCo at the LegCo by-election held on 11 March 2018, and took the oath to assume office at the Council meeting of 21 March 2018.

(4) CHAN Hoi-yan was declared to be returned as a Member of LegCo at the LegCo by-election held on 25 November 2018, and took the oath to assume office at the Council meeting of 28 November 2018.
