Note: (1) The National People's Congress ("NPC") adopted the Decision on Improving the Electoral System of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region on 11 March 2021. This was followed by amendments to Annexes I and II of the Basic Law by the Standing Committee of NPC ("NPCSC") on 30 March 2021 and the passage of the Improving Electoral System (Consolidated Amendments) Bill 2021 by the Legislative Council ("LegCo") on 27 May 2021. Pursuant to the legislative amendments, the number of Members will be expanded to 90 for each LegCo term, along with changes to the composition of LegCo. See Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (2021).
