I. Confirmation of minutes

[LC Paper No. CB(2)366/02-03]

The minutes of the meeting held on 22 October 2002 were confirmed.

II. Meeting with deputations

[LC Paper Nos. CB(2)149/02-03(04) to (05), CB(2)115/02-03(04) to (05), CB(2)346/02-03(01) to (16), and CB(2)382/02-03(01) to (07)]

Meeting with deputations

2. The Bills Committee received views from 6 deputations and 12 individuals on the Bill (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

3. <u>Members</u> noted the following comments from the majority of the deputations -

- (a) the Village Representative (VR) election system proposed in the Bill might lead to a lot of problems and conflicts in the villages. The Bill should be withdrawn by the Government;
- (b) the judgment delivered by the Court of Final Appeal (CFA) on 22 December 2000 should only apply to the two villages involved in the court cases. Moreover, the judgment had not advocated the implementation of a dual representation system as proposed in the Bill. The Government should respect the traditional rights of the indigenous inhabitants and maintain the existing system of VR elections which were clansmen's elections in the New Territories (NT) and part of the traditions of the indigenous inhabitants;
- (c) Indigenous Inhabitant Representative should represent not only the indigenous inhabitants but also all other residents of the village and reflect their views on the affairs of the village; and
- (d) public officers should be allowed to run for and hold VR offices.

4. <u>Members</u> also noted that some deputations had suggested that the Heung Yee Kuk Ordinance (Cap. 1097) should be amended so that Heung Yee Kuk would represent indigenous inhabitants of NT only, and elections for representatives of indigenous inhabitants would remain as clansmen's elections, and be separated from those for representatives of all residents of NT which would adopt the "one person, one vote" model.

5. <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> was of the view that different electoral arrangements to be governed by different pieces of legislation should be made to elect representatives for handling village affairs, the lawful traditional rights and interests of indigenous inhabitants, and district administration in the representative government respectively. Representatives of deputations who were Councillors of Heung Yee Kuk had divided views on Mr CHAN's proposal which might result in the deletion of the seats of members of Rural Committees in the District Councils as well as the seat of Heung Yee Kuk as a functional constituency in the Legislative Council (LegCo). Some indicated support of his proposal while others considered that the status quo should be maintained.

6. At the suggestion of Mr Albert CHAN, <u>the Chairman</u> invited Heung Yee Kuk and the Association of New Territories Indigenous Residents to provide written response to Mr CHAN's proposal that VR elections should not be conducted for indigenous villages which did not exist on the ground.

Meeting with the Administration

7. The Bills Committee deliberated on the views and concerns of the deputations, as well as the Administration's response to the concerns raised by members and the deputations at the meeting (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

8. Both Dr TANG Siu-tong and Mr Albert CHAN agreed with the majority of the deputations that public officers should be allowed to run for and hold VR offices. They pointed out that clauses 9(1)(a)(ii) and 23(1)(a)(ii) of the Bill, which disqualified a prescribed public officer from holding office as a VR and from being nominated as a candidate and elected as a VR, were not consistent with the Bill of Rights. Dr David CHU, however, expressed support for the provisions. In response to members' concerns, <u>Deputy Secretary for Home Affairs (2)</u> (DS(HA)2) explained that the provisions were consistent with other laws in Hong Kong which prohibited civil servants from running for or holding an elected public office. He said that the purpose of this restriction was to ensure that a person holding the office of VR was not subject or deemed to be subject to role conflict, divided loyalties or conflict of interests. He added that this was also the normal practice in other jurisdictions. Acting Director of Home Affairs informed members that the Administration was collecting information on civil servants serving as VRs and would liaise with the Civil Service Bureau and Constitutional Affairs Bureau to examine the provisions. She undertook to provide relevant information to the Bills Committee in due course.

9. <u>Mr Andrew WONG</u> suggested that in case no candidate was validly nominated for a VR election in a village, or the number of candidates validly nominated for the VR election for the village was less than the number of VRs to be returned for the village at the election, the VR office should be left vacant and there was no need to hold village by-election. <u>DS(HA)2</u> clarified that under the proposed electoral arrangements, there was a mechanism to review the necessity for a VR office which was unable to be filled despite repeated village by-elections. Consideration might be given to delete the village from the respective lists of villages. <u>Mr Andrew WONG</u>, however, remained of the view that a VR office that was unable to be filled in a VR election should be left vacant until the next election and that it should not be deleted from the respective list. <u>The</u> <u>Administration</u> undertook to consider Mr WONG's suggestion.

10. <u>Members</u> noted that under clause 22(4), a person was not eligible to be nominated as a candidate at an election for a village if the person was currently nominated as a candidate at an election for another village. <u>Mr Andrew WONG</u> asked why it was necessary to differentiate three different kinds of villages, namely Indigenous Village, Composite Indigenous Village and Existing Village in

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the Bill. He pointed out that in reality, they might refer to the same village and therefore should not be interpreted as separate villages. <u>Mr WONG</u> considered that many problems and conflicts could be resolved if an existing village settlement would not be interpreted as an Indigenous Village or Composite Indigenous Village and an Existing Village so that a person would be eligible to run for offices of both Indigenous Inhabitant Representative and Resident Representative in the same village.

11. In reply, $\underline{DS(HA)2}$ explained that for the effective operation of the Ordinance to be enacted, it was necessary to define the three different kinds of villages without any grey areas so that different VR elections would be held for these different kinds of villages.

Adm 12. The Administration was requested to provide written response to the following issues -

Eligibility of civil servants to run for and hold VR offices

- (a) information on civil servants serving as VRs;
- (b) amending the Bill to the effect that civil servants would be eligible to be nominated as candidates for VR elections and hold the offices when elected;

Vacancies in VR offices

(c) amending the Bill to the effect that a VR office that was unable to be filled in a VR election should be left vacant until the next election and that it should not be deleted from the respective list(s) of villages; and

Boundary delineation

(d) reviewing the boundary delineation of Ha Wan Village

III. Any other business

13. <u>Members</u> agreed that in addition to the one scheduled for Friday, 22 November 2002 at 8:30 am, the Bills Committee would hold another meeting on Wednesday, 4 December 2002 at 8:30 am to discuss the Administration's response to the outstanding issues in respect of the Bill.

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14. There being no other business, the meeting ended at 12:30 pm.
