



Subject: National Security (Legislative Provisions) Bill

On behalf of the Working Group on Basic Law 23 of the Divisional Committee of the Information Technology Division (ITD) of the Hong Kong Institution of Engineers, we would like to submit our views on the subject.

At the ITD Committee meeting in March, we agreed to form a working group to comment on the National Security (Legislative Provisions) Bill, and submit our view to the Bills Committee of the Legco. We opined that as a group of professionals involved in the collection and dissemination of information, the ITD Committee should show our interest and concern on this subject.

The views of the Working Group are:





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- (1) We support the definition of 'Treason' in the Bill, which is substantially narrowed.
- (2) We support the abolishment of the offence of 'Misprision of Treason' to ease public concerns.
- (3) We support that the relevant offences of 'Subversion' or 'Secession' are committed only when the 'force' or 'serious criminal means' used is so serious that it would scriously endanger the stability or territorial integrity of the State.
- (4) We support the abolishment of the offense of 'Possession of seditious publication'.
- (5) We are concerned that companies or individuals involved in the processing of information through electronic media especially the internet may unintentionally commit an offence of 'Handling seditious publication', as in the case of an internet service provider who helps users to store and disseminate information and if any piece of the information processed turns out to be a seditious publication, for example. We would also like to point out that it is not practical to require these companies or individuals to assume the responsibility of information screening.
- (6) We have concerns similar to (5) in the case of 'information resulting from unauthorized disclosures or illegal assess or information entrusted in confidence'
