- (a): As undertaken in the Policy Agenda Booklet published in January 2003, in 2003 we will begin to make suitable preparations for the review of constitutional developments after 2007. We have already embarked on a study within the Bureau for this purpose. The study is being handled within existing resources of the Bureau. As we expect that the public consultation exercise will only begin in 2004 or 2005, no financial provision for that exercise has been allocated in the 2003-04 estimates.
- (b): No financial provision has been allocated for the study on the introduction of a political party law. As we explained to the Legislative Council Panel on Constitutional Affairs in December 2002, we have decided that now is not the time to introduce a political party law to regulate the operation of political parties. We believe that political parties should be allowed sufficient room to develop so as to facilitate effectively the development of political parties in Hong Kong. Instead, we are seeking to introduce the following measures to encourage more candidates to participate in the Legislative Council (LegCo) elections in order to facilitate the development of local political parties and political organizations :
 - (i) financial assistance should be provided to candidates standing in LegCo elections to help offset part of their election expenses; and

 (ii) the Electoral Affairs Commission should be invited to revisit the proposal to allow the printing of the names and emblems of candidates' parties (or organizations) or the candidates' photographs on the ballot paper.

The first suggestion has been included in the Legislative Council (Amendment) Bill 2003 which was introduced into the Legislative Council on 26 February 2003. The second one will be implemented by way of subsidiary legislation to be made by the Electoral Affairs Commission.

<u>Reply</u>: (a) The Registration and Electoral Office (REO) will put in place a new computer system to enhance the production of electoral registers and delineation of Legislative Council geographical constituencies and District Council constituencies. The estimated total non-recurrent cost for the development of the new system is \$66.42 million, comprising non-recurrent expenditure of \$62.50 million and non-recurrent staff cost of \$3.92 million. The cost required has been approved under Head 710 subhead A007ZV by the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council on 11 January 2002. The estimated annual recurrent cost is \$5.86 million for 2003 – 04 and \$10.35 million for subsequent years which has also been approved by the Finance Committee at the meeting on 11 January 2002. The recurrent cost for 2003 - 04 has been included under Head 163 Registration and Electoral Office.

(b) The new system will bring about considerable service and efficiency improvements to the work of the REO. In particular, it will centralize and integrate functions that were previously scattered. It will also expand the capacity to handle future growth in the electorate size, automate the delineation of constituency boundaries, and enable bilingual storage and processing of electors' records.

(c) The system analysis and design stage was completed in September 2002. Site preparation, system development and data conversion are in progress. REO anticipates that the new system will come into operation towards the end of 2003.

(d) A Project Steering Committee (PSC) has been set up to monitor the progress of the project. The PSC is chaired by REO with representatives from relevant sections of REO and the contractor involved in the project.

In 2002-2003, CAB had three working meetings with our counterparts of the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the State Council (HKMAO). Besides, we maintained frequent exchanges with them by correspondence or telephone. Subjects discussed include the following broad areas:

- (a) the mechanism for amending the Basic Law;
- (b) liaison between the HKSAR Government and provincial/municipal authorities; and
- (c) visits to the HKSAR by the CPG and provincial/municipal officials.

2. At the same time, CAB continues to maintain frequent contact with the Office of the Commissioner of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the HKSAR regarding HKSARG's external affairs. Such contacts take the form of written correspondence, telephone discussions and meetings. No detailed statistics have been kept on such contacts. Matters discussed include -

- (a) the negotiation and conclusion of international agreements between the HKSAR Government and foreign governments;
- (b) the implementation of the PRC's international obligations applicable to the HKSAR;
- (c) the HKSAR's participation in international organisations and conferences; and

(d) the establishment of consular missions and other consular matters.



- <u>Reply</u>: The provision of \$204.4 million in 2003-04 includes the personal emoluments and personnel related expenses (\$54.2 million), departmental expenses (\$14.5 million) and election expenses (\$135.7 million).

A total of \$127.1 million and \$8.6 million has been included in the 2003-04 draft Estimates for the conduct of the 2003 District Councils (DCs) election and the preparation of the 2004 Legislative Council (LC) elections respectively. A breakdown of the expenses is as follows –



Reply :

- (a) The voter registration exercise for the 2003 District Councils election will be conducted from June to mid July 2003. The provisional voter register and the final voter register will be published on or before 15 August 2003 and 25 September 2003 respectively. We are working out the details of the voter registration exercise.
- (b) We have set aside an amount of \$9.4 million to meet the staff cost, printing cost, postage and other operational expenses for the conduct of the 2003 voter registration exercise.



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

Reply:

(a) & (b) The creation of four non-directorate posts in 2003-04 is the net result of the creation and deletion of posts in 2003-04.

The establishment of the Registration and Electoral Office as at 31.3.2003 will be 142 civil service posts, which include 18 civil service time-limited posts created in 2002-03 for the preparation of the 2003 District Councils (DCs) election. We will further create 44 civil service time-limited posts in 2003-04, 17 of which will be for the conduct of the 2003 DCs election, and 27 for the preparation of the 2004 Legislative Council (LC) elections. After the DCs election, the 35 civil service time-limited posts created for this purpose (i.e. 18 created in 2002-03 and 17 created in 2003-04) will lapse towards the end of 2003-04. Separately, five permanent posts will be deleted in 2003-04. The establishment as at 31.3.2004 will then be 146 civil service posts, representing a net increase of four posts over the establishment as at 31.3.2003.







contract staff (NCSCS) in 2002-03 for the preparation of the 2003 District
Councils (DCs) election. The total expenditure involved is \$3.8 million.
To assist in the conduct of the 2003 DCs election and the preparation for the
2004 Legislative Council (LC) elections, the REO will recruit additional
NCSCS in 2003-04. The number will vary during the year to tie in with
changing work demand, and will peak at about 340 for two months. A
provision of \$25.8 million has been included in the draft Estimates to cover
the total staff cost on NCSCS in 2003-04.



The increase in the provision for personal emoluments and election expenses is due to the creation of civil service time-limited posts and additional expenses required for the conduct of the 2003 District Councils election and for the preparation of the 2004 Legislative Council elections. The increase in departmental expenses is mainly due to the annual recurrent cost for maintaining a new computer system to enhance production of electoral registers and the delineation of Legislatvie Council geographical constituencies and District Council constituencies, which is expected to come into operation in end 2003.
