- <u>Question</u>: The Government stated that the increased expenditure of \$41.1 m for the coming year will mainly be used in implementing the Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme and the Helping Business and Services Promotion Programmes. However, these three programmes are not new items and the basic staff and resources requirements already exist in principle. Will the Government provide details of the areas or items of the three programmes that require additional provision, and the respective expenditure on the three programmes over the past year?
- Asked by : Hon. CHAN Kam-lam
- <u>Reply</u>: No provision for increase in manpower or operating cost has been made in the 2003-04 estimates. The expenditure in question belongs to other non-recurrent expenditure. The increase of the 2003-04 provision over the revised estimate for 2002-03 is due to increased cash flow requirements. Details are provided below.

The Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme was launched in February 2002 to provide financial support to the professional service sectors to carry out projects which aim at enhancing their competitiveness in external market (including the Mainland market) and their standard of professional services. The Legislative Council has approved a commitment of \$100 m for the scheme, which is to be disbursed under S/H700 by phases. In 2002-03, a total grant of \$15,500,000 was approved to finance 37 projects. Since some of these approved projects have only commenced lately or have not commenced, payment of these projects will be deferred to 2003-04. Provision of \$33,000,000 is estimated for the scheme in 2003-04 to finance new projects in the year as well as approved projects which have deferred. We are inviting the first tranche of applications for 2003-04. The second tranche is tentatively scheduled for August and September.

The consultancy studies conducted to take forward the Helping Business Programme and the Services Promotion Programme are funded under Subhead 838 Minor consultancy studies (block vote). In 2002-03, seven studies with total expenditure of \$8,223,000 have been conducted under Subhead 838. Completion of three of these studies will be deferred to 2003-04. Payment for part of the expenditure will therefore be deferred to that financial year. Besides the seven studies, the tender price for one other consultancy study exceeded the upper ceiling of \$3 m for items funded under Subhead 838. The item was therefore transferred from Subhead 838 to Subhead 700 in 2002-03. This study has now been completed.

The Estimates provision for Subhead 838 in 2003-04 is maintained at the previous years' level of \$15.6 m for funding new items and the abovementioned three studies, which commenced in 2002-03 and will be completed in 2003-04. We are currently working closely with bureaux and departments concerned regarding new areas for study and expect to finalize the list later.

We shall also organise seminars and symposiums on new areas of interest, such as promoting co-operation of the services sectors of the Mainland and Hong Kong, marketing Hong Kong's advantages as an investment destination to new Mainland audiences, introducing the new trade and investment-related policies in the Mainland to the Hong Kong business community etc. In addition, the Joint Commission will also enhance co-operation in the area of e-commerce through a new working group set up to take the matter forward. This is mainly due to (a) payment for the salaries and allowances of the Secretary for Commerce, Industry and Technology (SCIT) and staff in his Office; (b) the additional cashflow requirements for the Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme and minor studies related to the Helping Business and Services Promotion Programmes; and (c) the internal redeployment of resources among Commerce and Industry Branch and its departments to enable the Secretary for Commerce, Industry and Technology to pursue new initiatives and activities within his policy area, notably those that are related to the further industrial development of Hong Kong. This provision is partly offset by the deletion of two posts in 2003-04 and reduced operating expenses to achieve efficiency savings.

For the successful implementation of the Helping Business Programme, it is essential to engender a helping business culture and mindset in the civil service. We have organised the Helping Business Awards Scheme since 1999 on a biennial basis with the aim of encouraging government departments and individual civil servants to propose practical measures to make government operations more business-friendly. We also organise from time to time seminars, talks and distribute promotional materials and guidebooks to increase civil servants' awareness of the obstacles to business operation resulting from government over-regulation, red tape or outdated and complicated procedures. We will continue to carry out these activities in 2003-04 with anticipated expenditure of around \$750,000 (excluding staff costs). Regarding staffing, there are eight full time staff of this Bureau responsible for the above activities, which form part of their duties. The above activities cover all government departments and civil servants with focus on the middle to senior ranking civil servants who are responsible for formulation of policy on regulatory regimes and related procedures. We will continue to assess the effectiveness of our activities through feedback from Members of the Business Advisory Group and representatives of business chambers and various trades.

Since the inception of the Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme (PSDAS) in February 2002, two tranches of grants have been made. Of the 109 applications received from 79 organisations in these two tranches, 37 projects have been approved, involving grants totalling \$15.5 million. The approved projects include seminars, training courses, visits/exchanges and other promotional activities. The closing date for the third tranche of applications is at end March 2003.

Since most of the approved projects of the first tranche only commenced in end 2002 and those of the second tranche have just commenced or will commence later, it is too early to evaluate the effectiveness of the PSDAS at this stage. An evaluation in this regard will be conducted when there are more completed projects. However, to improve the operation of the Scheme, we are reviewing its scope, eligibility for application, application procedures, disbursement and monitoring arrangements, etc. The review is expected to complete in mid-2003.



Reply:

The minor consultancy studies funded under Subhead 838 are conducted to take forward the Helping Business Programme and the Services Promotion Programme. Since this Subhead was created, the provision for this subhead in the annual Estimates have been maintained at the level of \$15.6m. In 2002-03, we conducted seven studies under the Subhead with a Revised Estimates of \$8,223,000. The reduction in expenditure is partly due to the deferment of completion of the following three studies from 2002-03 as originally planned to 2003-04, and the total payment deferred to 2003-04 will amount to \$1.7m –

- (1) Departmental business study for the Transport Department;
- (2) Study on licensing and other regulatory requirements of the construction industry; and
- (3) Provision of on-screen fillable government forms on the Internet.

Also, in 2002-03, one funded item costing \$3.4 m was transferred from this Subhead to Subhead 700 General other non-recurrent (the original budget for this item was below \$3m, within the expenditure ceiling for individual items funded under Subhead 838). Furthermore, the actual expenditure of some projects was lower than the original estimates.

We are currently working closely with bureaux and departments concerned regarding new areas for study in 2003-04. Projects which may be included are departmental business studies for Fire Services Department and Labour Department, reviews of the liquor and elderly homes licensing processes, review of environmental requirements for works contracts, follow-on studies to streamline the licensing requirements in the construction industry etc. Final decision has not been made and we expect to finalize the list later.

Before a decision is made to commission a consultancy study, we would first consider whether there are suitable staff within the Government who possess the requisite expertise and experience, and have in-depth understanding of overseas leading practices in relevant fields. Also, we would take into consideration the capacity and priorities of staffing resources in departments to carry out the study. The above are the criteria for commissioning consultancy studies.

The provision for Programme (2) in 2003-04 is \$41.1 million (34.9%) higher than the revised estimate for 2002-03. This is mainly due to the additional cashflow requirements for the Professional Services Development Assistance Scheme and minor studies related to the Helping Business and Services Promotion Programmes and the internal redeployment of resources among Commerce and Industry Branch and its departments to enable the Secretary for Commerce, Industry and Technology to pursue new initiatives and activities within his policy area, notably those that are related to the further industrial development of Hong Kong. This provision is partly offset by the deletion of two posts in 2003-04 and reduced operating expenses to achieve efficiency savings.

2. Depending on the nature of job requirements, we have outsourced and will continue to outsource our work where appropriate. For instance, the minor studies related to the Helping Business and Services Promotion Programmes are mostly conducted by consultants.

In 2003-04, the Commerce, Industry and Technology Bureau (CITB) will continue to strengthen cooperation with the Ministry of Commerce (formerly the Ministry of Foreign Trade and Economic Cooperation) and the authorities concerned on the exchange of information. We have already established a hyperlink between the CITB's website and that of the Ministry. Recently, we are in touch with the Ministry on establishing a hyperlink with its newly-launched "Invest in China" website. The hyperlink, which is expected to be in place in the near future, will provide Hong Kong businessmen with another avenue for quick access to information on the Mainland's investment policies and measures.

At the same time, we shall strengthen our information exchange mechanism with the Mainland under the framework of the Mainland and HKSAR Joint Commission on Commerce and Trade (Joint Commission), and continue to collect information through the Office of the HKSAR Government in Beijing, the Economic and Trade Office of the HKSAR in Guangdong (GDETO) and the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (TDC). Such information will be disseminated to the Hong Kong business sector via the various publications by the respective agencies, including the GDETO Newsletter, TID's Commercial Information Circular and TDC's China Business Alert. The above initiatives do not involve additional resources.

<u>Reply</u>:

In 2003-04, the Commerce, Industry and Technology Bureau (CITB), together with the government as well as subvented agencies concerned will continue to enhance support to the Hong Kong businessmen operating in the Mainland. The initiatives are as follows -

(1) **Providing timely trade and market-related information** - CITB, the Office of the HKSAR Government in Beijing, the Trade and Industry Department (TID) and the relevant agencies concerned will continue to enhance the exchange of information on commerce and trade policies and regulations through the mechanism of the Mainland and HKSAR Joint Commission on Commerce and Trade (Joint Commission) and other channels. The information collected is released via the Commercial Information Circulars of TID. Market information is disseminated through the Hong Kong Trade Development Council's (TDC) internet portal and its China Business Alert.

In addition, the Economic and Trade Office of the HKSAR in Guangdong (GDETO) also regularly collects information on Guangdong's trade and commerce policies, regulations, economic development and business-related activities (such as exhibitions and seminars). Such information is disseminated through the weekly GDETO Newsletter, issued by e-mail to about 60 business associations in Hong Kong. The Newsletter has been uploaded to the GDETO website (http://www.gdeto.gov.hk) from 31 January onwards. GDETO also plans to establish an electronic platform hyperlinking its website with that of the 21 municipalities in Guangdong. This will further facilitate businessmen from both places in obtaining up-to-date commerce and trade information.

- (2) Promoting Hong Kong businesses' understanding of the Mainland's policies in commerce, trade and investment, and strengthen their links with Mainland authorities and enterprises -We will hold seminars and symposiums under the framework of the Joint Commission to enhance communication between the Hong Kong businessmen and Mainland officials. In 2003-04, our focus will be on promoting cooperation with the Mainland on services industry and e-commerce, thereby facilitating Hong Kong businessmen in seizing the business opportunities in these sectors of the Mainland. Besides, GDETO and TDC will organise trade missions and visits for Hong Kong businessmen to different provinces in the Mainland, with a view to promoting their understanding of the Mainland's investment environment.
- (3) **Enhancing the productivity of Hong Kong enterprises** The Hong Kong Productivity Council (HKPC) plans to establish four Mainland offices, namely in Guangzhou, Dongguan, Shenzhen and Zhuhai, within this year to provide Hong Kong companies there with services on production technology, system management, IT and environmental technology. The purpose is to help enhance the productivity of Hong Kong companies operating in the Mainland, especially those in Guangdong.
- (4) **Reflecting Hong Kong businessmen's common concerns and seeking to improve the** <u>investment environment of the Mainland</u> - We shall continue to reflect Hong Kong businessmen's views on issues of common concern and explore solutions through the Joint Commission. One of the major functions of the GDETO is to reflect the concerns of Hong Kong businessmen in Guangdong to the authorities there. The GDETO will monitor the promulgation and implementation of major commerce and trade policies in Guangdong and take follow up actions as appropriate. These include reflecting the views of Hong Kong businessmen to the departments concerned.

2. The above tasks involved the participation of numerous government and semi-government agencies, and the officers concerned are also responsible for duties other than supporting Hong Kong companies based in the Mainland. As such, it is impossible to single out the resources devoted to this task alone.

The new Ports and Maritime Command (PMC), which was revamped from the merging of the former Ship Search and Cargo Command (SSCC) and the former Marine Enforcement Division of the Marine and Land Enforcement Command (MLEC), comprises two main Groups – the Marine Enforcement Group and the Ports Control Group. The Marine Enforcement Group consists of the Marine Enforcement Division, the Marine Strike and Support Division and the Joint Police/Customs Anti-Smuggling Task Force (ASTF) while the Ports Control Group consists of the Harbour and River Trade Division, the Container Terminals Division, the Cargo Research Division and the Office Management and Support Unit.

The PMC is now fully responsible for -

- (a) patrolling Hong Kong waters for the detection, interception and suppression of smuggling activities in and out of the territory by vessels;
- (b) searching and rummaging vessels berthed in Hong Kong waters;
- (c) Customs clearance and examination of sea-borne cargoes and surface postal parcels;
- (d) Customs clearance of vessel crews and passengers; and
- (e) combating smuggling activities on sea in co-operation with the Police through the ASTF.

The setting up of the PMC was effected through internal redeployment of 406 posts from SSCC and 333 posts from MLEC to achieve a full functional alignment of those formations in the department for combating smuggling activities at sea. The reorganisation is basically a cost-neutral exercise. There are no changes to the rank structure of staff concerned as a result of the redeployment.

At the same time, the department will delete 117 posts, including 73 posts for delivery of efficiency savings and 44 posts in the Anti-Illicit Cigarette Task Force (AICTF), resulting in a net deletion of 74 posts. The 44 posts of AICTF are time-limited posts created for three years from 2000-01 to 2002-03 for the department to combat illicit cigarette peddling activities at street level. Excluding the 44 posts of AICTF, only 18 posts to be deleted are related to frontline enforcement work.
- (2) Despite the deletion of the 44 time-limited posts of AICTF, the department will continue to conduct territory-wide large scale operations against illicit cigarettes frequently through flexible deployment and pooling of manpower resources from various formations. Moreover, the department will strengthen intelligence collection and analysis on illicit cigarette activities so that it can deploy resources on focused targets to increase the effectiveness of enforcement actions. Reply :

(1) The estimated number of intellectual property rights (IPR) investigations in 2002 was 14 092, but we actually conducted 14 220 investigations. Our enforcement actions have successfully contained the piracy and counterfeiting activities at the manufacturing and retailing levels. In early 2003, the number of shops selling pirated discs has reduced as compared with 2002. For this reason, we have slightly adjusted the estimated number of IPR investigations in 2003 to 14 000.

The estimate of spot checks on optical disc factories is a target set for planning our work in 2003, taking into account a number of factors including the staff resources available for the job, the number of optical disc factories and the risk assessment of possible engagement of licensed factories in replicating pirated optical discs. In 2001 and 2002, the actual number of spot checks conducted was higher than the estimated number (i.e. the target for each of the two years) because of the change in the risk assessment during the period, and we considered that there was a need to conduct more spot checks than the set target. For 2003, although we continue to set the target at 300, we will increase the number of spot checks if such a need arises.

- (2) Apart from investigation, other measures taken by the Customs to fight copyright piracy include
 - strengthening intelligence collection and analysis to enable the Customs to formulate effective enforcement strategies;
 - strengthening liaison with the IPR industry and related enforcement agencies, both local and overseas, to cooperate in the fight against piracy activities, particularly cross-boundary activities;

- participating in public awareness and education programmes for the protection of IPR to reduce demands for pirated goods.

Reply :

- (a) The estimate of spot checks on optical disc factories is a target set for planning our work in 2003, taking into account a number of factors including the staff resources available for the job, the number of optical disc factories and the risk assessment of possible engagement of licensed factories in replicating pirated optical discs. In 2001 and 2002, the actual number of spot checks conducted was higher than the estimated number (i.e. the target for each of the two years) because of the change in the risk assessment during the period, and we considered that there was a need to conduct more spot checks than the set target. For 2003, although we continue to set the target at 300, we will increase the number of spot checks if such a need arises.
- (b) Of the various kinds of computer crime, Customs handle only internet piracy cases. We established a 7-member Anti-Internet-Piracy Team in December 1999 dedicated to this enforcement work. The department provides the following supporting services to frontline officers engaged in combating internet piracy -
 - (i) Technical Support

The department has established the Computer Analysis and Response Team (CART) to render technical support to front-line officers on the handling of computer evidence. There is no separate establishment for CART. The team is basically formed by recruiting officers serving on other duties to do the job on a part-time basis according to operational needs. The department will deploy existing training resources to improve the knowledge and technical skills of members of the CART through further training.

(ii) Computer Forensic Examination

The department has set up a Computer Forensic Laboratory to assist front-line officers in forensic computing, and the retrieval of computer evidence. An amount of \$4 m was allocated in 2001-02 for the setting up of the Computer Forensic Laboratory. The Laboratory is managed by one Senior Inspector and two Chief Customs Officers and the related staff cost is about \$1.28 m per annum.

The sum of \$169,000 for JRA in the 2002-03 revised estimate was mainly to cover the extraneous duties allowance (responsibility) (EDA(R)) given to the staff who perform extra duties other than those normally undertaken by their rank and grade. Since EDA(R) is re-categorised as acting allowance, this type of allowance is no longer reflected in JRA in the draft 2003-04 estimates.

The typhoon allowance and rainstorm black warning allowance, which used to be included in Allowances, are now categorised as JRA. The total provision for these two types of JRA in the draft 2003-04 estimates is \$6,000.

The increase of \$62,000 in the estimated expenditure on Allowances under Personal Emoluments in the 2003-04 estimates is mainly due to an estimated increase in expenditure on overtime and acting allowances. However, the total amount for PE-related allowances drops from \$500,000 in 2002-03 revised estimate to \$399,000 in the draft 2003-04 estimates, representing a reduction of 20%.

Given the fact that private sector experience is essential for effective communication with and assisting commercial enterprises, we will continue to employ the new IP staff on non-civil service contract terms. The additional staff cost will be met from within the extra funding of \$200 m. Supporting services generated by the increase in size of the department will be absorbed by the existing resources.

Reply:

The major reason for the drop in 2003-04 draft estimates against the 2002-03 revised estimate is the completion of two capital projects in 2002-03, i.e. the Forbes Global CEO Conference and InvestHK Brand Building Programme. This accounts for around 80% of the drop. The rest is mainly due to reduced operating expenditure to achieve efficiency savings.

The Government has announced in the Budget that an additional \$200 m spread over the next five years will be allocated to Invest Hong Kong to strengthen investment promotion effort. We plan to put a detailed proposal on the use of the additional allocation to the LegCo Panel on Commerce and Industry in April, and to seek Finance Committee's approval for the additional allocation thereafter.

Of the \$67.4 m included in the draft estimates, \$10 m is allocated to investment promotion units based overseas. In addition, staff based in head office in Hong Kong will continue to explore and identify investment promotion opportunities overseas.

Invest Hong Kong employed 34 non-civil service contract staff in 2002-03 at a total cost of about \$22 m.

To meet the objective of attracting more overseas companies to invest in the Greater PRD through setting up an operation in Hong Kong, we intend to recruit around 20 additional investment promotion (IP) staff in the head office in 2003 to strengthen our capability to handle more projects arising from the increased investment promotion activities and our efforts both overseas and in the Mainland. Given the fact that private sector experience is essential for effective communication with and assisting commercial enterprises, we will continue to employ the new IP staff on non-civil service contract terms. Taking into account the lead time for recruitment, it is estimated that the cost for additional staff for six months in 2003-04 is about \$6 m.

Reply:

(a) Factory registration (FR) is only required of those manufacturers who wish to apply for Certificates of Hong Kong Origin or Production Notification (for cut-and-sewn garments); those who participate in the Outward Processing Arrangement (OPA) or Local Subcontracting Arrangement (LSA); or those who are exporting restrained textiles and clothing to the EU, USA or Canada market.

The general economic downturn in 2001-2002 has resulted in the shrinkage of overseas buying orders, which led to the decline in FR. Since FR is a prerequisite for manufacturers to participate in the OPA and LSA, similar downward trend has also been reflected in the 2002 figures of OPA and LSA.

On the outlook for 2003, it is expected that the US economy, as the leading economy in the world, should benefit from the US Federal Reserve's loose monetary stance and the Bush Administration's economic stimulus package now underway. A better US economy will help lift the European and East Asian economies, including the Hong Kong economy. On the other hand, given the pressure of war on Iraq which might have ramifications on global economic recovery, we have adopted a prudent approach in our 2003 estimates on the FR, OPA and LSA based on the 2002 actual figures.

(b) The global economic downturn since the terrorist attack in September 2001 has resulted in a falling demand for antiques in the overseas market in 2002, which led to a drop of 39% in the statutory declarations of antique.

The positive outlook of the world economy in 2003 would be beneficial to the resumption of demand in the global antique market. Yet, given the geo-political uncertainty in the Middle East, we have placed a modest estimate for 2003 based on the 2002 actual figure of statutory declarations of antique.

Reply:

Under the WTO Agreement on Textiles and Clothing, all quota restrictions will be eliminated by 1 January 2005. However, due to the possibility that China-specific safeguard measures might be imposed by some WTO members in 2005 and beyond, it is not clear at this stage whether 2005 will see a completely liberalised regime for the global textiles and clothing trade. To assess the implications on Hong Kong in case any safeguard action is invoked, the Department had examined the pertinent issues with regard to control, trade facilitation, and bilateral/multilateral commercial relations aspects in 2001-02. In 2002-03, we continued to monitor the developments of Hong Kong's major importing markets and commenced work in a number of areas including considering the possible future textiles export control system, identifying the need for any necessary legislative amendments, and planning for computer system modifications. In 2003-04, work on all these fronts will continue. We envisage that bilateral consultations with our trading partners may also be necessary to ascertain their post-2004 specific import requirements.

The Department has employed, on a 2-year contract term, a Trade Consultant in June 2002 to advise on and assist in the formulation of Hong Kong's future textiles export control system. The cost incurred in 2002-03 amounted to about \$697,000, and the estimated cost for 2003-04 would be about \$997,000. Other than that, all workload involved in the development of the possible future control system has been and will continue to be undertaken by existing staff of the Department, in addition to their existing duties.

Given that the textiles and clothing industry remains an important manufacturing sector and export earner for Hong Kong, our work in this area will ensure that Hong Kong-origin textiles and clothing exports can enjoy unrestricted access to the world market after 2004.

<u>Reply</u>: The Government is committed to helping Hong Kong industries move up the value chain and enhance competitiveness. In 2003-04, the Department will support the development of Hong Kong industries, in particular the development of SMEs which account for the majority of the establishments in almost all sectors, through the following means:

- (a) we will make further use of the \$7.5 b SME funding schemes to help SMEs in the manufacturing sectors enhance competitiveness. In particular, the SME Loan Guarantee Scheme, the SME Export Marketing Fund, and the SME Training Fund will help individual SMEs enhance productivity, resolve financing needs, expand markets, and upgrade human capital. The SME Development Fund will help industries as a whole or individual sectors enhance overall competitiveness through a wide range of projects. As at to-date, about \$1.4 b has been granted under these schemes, and about \$1 b has been devoted to the manufacturing sectors. In 2003-04, we estimate that more applications will be received under the schemes after the improvement measures to increase the amount of loan guarantees and grants are launched;
- (b) a Steering Committee on the Development of Fashion Industry, chaired by the Secretary for Commerce, Industry and Technology and comprising unofficial members from the fashion-related sectors as well as official members, has been established to address the challenges faced by the industry. The Steering Committee is studying in detail the areas of manpower, industry capabilities, marketing and branding, and infrastructure support, with a view to mapping out an overall development strategy in the direction of developing Hong Kong into a fashion hub in the Asia-Pacific region;
- (c) the Support and Consultation Centre for SMEs will continue to provide support to SMEs in the manufacturing sectors, through the provision of information and advisory services;
- (d) we will continue to run the Mentorship Programme for SMEs to provide SME entrepreneurs with one-on-one free mentorship from accomplished entrepreneurs; and
- (e) we will continue to promote industrial excellence among local manufacturing industries through the Hong Kong Awards for Industry, and help promote the outstanding achievements of Hong Kong industries through various means. For example, we have approved funding under the SME Development Fund to a trade and industrial organisation for producing a TV programme to showcase the achievements of Hong Kong's manufacturing industries. The project will be completed in late 2003.

Given that support for industries is an integrated part of the work of the Department and our SME support programmes, it is not possible for us to work out the exact amount of resources dedicated to industrial support per se in 2003-04.

Apart from the Department, the Commerce, Industry and Technology Bureau, the Innovation and Technology Commission, and various industry support organisations, such as the Hong Kong Productivity Council, the Trade Development Council, the Hong Kong Science and Technology Parks Corporation, the Applied Science and Technology Research Institute, and the Cyberport, are also providing industries with a full range of support.

The Trade and Industry Department is committed to strengthening Hong Kong's ties with the Mainland's central and local authorities responsible for trade and commercial affairs. Our aim is to enhance communication and cooperation with the relevant Mainland authorities with a view to facilitating the development of the most favourable environment for trade and investment between the two places. The contacts and exchanges are mainly achieved through the Mainland and Hong Kong SAR Joint Commission on Commerce and Trade (JC), visits to the Mainland, organization of seminars on Mainland trade issues, etc.

In 2003-04, the Department will continue to support the work of the JC. The Director-General of Trade and Industry is the co-convenor of the Working Group on Trade (WG) established under the JC. Matters for discussion under the WG include trade and trade-related subjects of common interest or concern to the Mainland authorities as well as Hong Kong. Views of Hong Kong businessmen on the Mainland's commerce and trade policies are reflected to the Mainland through the WG channel and meetings. The WG also organizes seminars to facilitate direct dialogue between Hong Kong businessmen and Mainland's trade officials so as to enhance communication. A seminar on outward processing trade is scheduled for the first half of 2003.

The Department also pays visits to the Guangdong Province from time to time to establish and renew working contacts with Guangdong officials responsible for trade and industry matters. Views of Hong Kong businessmen on Guangdong's investment and trade environment are reflected to the Guangdong officials as appropriate. Such visits will continue in 2003-04.

The above activities are carried out with the existing resources of the Department.

Creation of these posts is cost-neutral because the creation will be offset by the deletion of similar posts in the Information Technology Services Department.

Apart from the creation of nine posts for the ITMS, one Assistant Clerical Officer post and one Clerical Assistant post will also be deleted in 2003-04 following the transfer of licensing function for imports and exports of pharmaceutical products to Department of Health. The savings in salary of these two posts is \$0.3 m.

The net result is the creation of seven permanent posts in 2003-04.
