A non-recurrent commitment of \$2.9 million has been earmarked for this process.

This is mainly due to the charging of remuneration of the Principal Officials appointed under the accountability system, except the Secretary for Justice, to this item under Head 142 as an interim arrangement. From 2003-04 onward, the remuneration of the 11 Directors of Bureaux will be charged to the respective bureaux.

#### Reply:

- (a) The Protocol Division received a total of 280 visits to the HKSAR by national leaders and overseas senior officials over the past three years (106 in 2000-01, 76 in 2001-02 and 98 in 2002-03). Based on past experience, the number of such visits in 2003-04 is estimated to be in the region of 100. The purposes of these visits are normally related to the promotion of bilateral trade and relations, signing of bilateral agreements, and attendance of major events, international conferences and forums, etc.
- (b) For budget planning purpose, the estimated expenditure for 2003-04 in respect of activities for national leaders and overseas senior officials visiting Hong Kong is \$8.5 million. The items of expenditure cover hotel accommodation, transportation and programme arrangements. The amount of financial provision varies from one visit to another, depending on the status and security requirements of the principal visitor, the length of stay and the size of the delegation, etc.
- (c) Provision for the Protocol Division in 2003-04 is increased by 1% as compared to the revised estimate for 2002-03. Salary increments for staff accounts for approximately one-seventh of the overall 1% increase. The increase is also partly due to lower-than-expected spending in departmental expenses in 2002-03.

#### Reply:

(a) We have set up an inter-departmental Steering Committee under the chairmanship of the Director of Administration since May 2002 to oversee the preparation and implementation of the Tamar project. We have also set up a Special Selection Board under the chairmanship of the Chief Secretary for Administration with two Legislative Council Members, two senior government officials and a professor in architecture as members to assess applications for prequalification, select tenders and decide on the award of the contract. The schedule of implementation of the project is set out below:

Finalisation of user requirements and preparation of tender document 1<sup>st</sup> Ouarter, 2003 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter, 2003 Formal submission to the Public Works Sub-committee and Finance Committee Commencement of invitation of tenders 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter, 2003 3<sup>rd</sup> Ouarter, 2003 Closing of tender period 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Ouarter, 2003 Evaluation and selection of tenders 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter, 2003 Preparation of contract documents and if necessary, submission to Town Planning Board

Contract Period early 2004 - 2007

(b) On the Establishment Sub-committee's and the Finance Committee's approval, one post of Administrative Officer Staff Grade C (supported by one Chief Executive Officer, one Executive Officer I and two personal secretaries) was created in January 2003 on a supernumerary basis for a period of two years to coordinate and monitor the implementation of the project. The salary provision for the post for 2003-04 is \$1.5 million. The four non-directorate posts underpinning the post are internally redeployed from within the Administration Wing and hence have no additional financial implications. As for the capital cost of the project, we shall be seeking the Finance Committee's approval for upgrading the project to Category A in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter of 2003.

#### **Question**:

Under Programme (1) Efficiency Unit, the financial provision for the Efficiency Unit has seen increases for consecutive years. The financial provision (estimate) for the Unit for 2003-04 will even be increased by 44.9%. Why is there an increased financial provision for the Efficiency Unit while various departments are experiencing cutbacks in financial provision? Does the Administration have any key projects that call for an enormous increase in provision? How is the effectiveness of the Efficiency Unit assessed? How can the Administration follow up to see if a department has implemented changes on the Unit's recommendations?

#### Reply:

Provision for the Efficiency Unit for 2003-04 is \$39.1 million (44.9%) higher than the revised estimate for 2002-03. This is attributable to the following:

- (a) \$18.4 million of the increase being full-year effect of the integration of the former Management Services Agency and its staff into the Efficiency Unit. It should be noted that with the integration, there was a net deletion of 14 posts and a net annual savings of \$7.7 million already delivered to the centre;
- (b) \$13 million being additional staffing, system enhancement and maintenance, and other operating expenses to be incurred by the integrated call centre when it takes over the call handling functions from additional departments;
- (c) \$6.3 million being cashflow adjustment of capital non-works projects, including consultancy studies and seminars, etc.; and
- (d) \$1.4 million being salary increments and full-year provision for posts created and vacancies filled.

The aim of the Efficiency Unit is to promote a measurable transformation in the management and delivery of public services. In pursuing this aim, the Unit seeks to provide bureaux and departments with high quality management consultancy services that identify opportunities for performance enhancement, design practical solutions, develop compelling cases, and secure effective implementation. The ultimate measure of the effectiveness of the Unit is evidence that there is an active investigation of opportunities and a programme of proposals being developed and implemented to improve productivity, service quality and operational efficiency, and an increased awareness and support for change.

In 2002-03, we have assisted bureaux and departments in furthering the private sector involvement programme, re-engineering their business processes and mode of service delivery, and improving management flexibility. Recent research shows that the number of outsourcing contracts is increasing within the Government and there is a strong commitment to improving the contract specifications in order to provide better value for money. We have been supporting the development of public private partnership approaches to the delivery of new facilities and services, and this will be one of our priority areas for 2003-04.

For the effective monitoring of the progress of these projects and initiatives, the Efficiency Unit has developed a progress report system which tracks the updated position of all projects, including the implementation of recommendations. The Efficiency Unit will also bring up cases which are not seen to be progressing at a satisfactory pace with a view to helping the bureaux or departments concerned iron out any problems.

#### Reply:

The fundamental task of the Efficiency Unit is to pursue the Government's commitment to transforming the management and delivery of public services so that the community's needs are met in the most effective and efficient manner. The Unit provides bureaux and departments with high quality management consultancy services that identify opportunities for performance enhancement, design practical solutions, develop compelling business cases, and secure effective implementation.

In 2002-03, the Efficiency Unit saw the full implementation of the integrated call centre which is now handling enquiries and complaints for 11 departments. Another major initiative was to develop and present a Management Forum for 14,000 senior civil servants that was designed to create a common understanding of the Asia's world city vision and of the need to embrace change so as to deliver that vision. Following the Management Forum, departments have already identified a large number of innovative projects to improve service delivery and cost-effectiveness. Other major initiatives that came to fruition in 2002-03 included the development and promotion of a private sector involvement programme through outsourcing and public private partnerships; the undertaking of various cross-department re-engineering projects through the adoption of new technology; and the conduct of management improvement projects. All these projects will lead to considerable improvements in public sector productivity, service quality and better value for money.

In 2003-04, the Efficiency Unit will continue to work in partnership with bureaux and departments to enhance the quality of public services as well as seeking greater efficiency in the use of limited public resources. Whilst it will continue its efforts to extend the service of the integrated call centre to cover more departments, the Unit will focus its attention on following up with departments in taking forward the innovative improvement projects identified after the Management Forum. Drawing on lessons learned from studies on public private partnerships (PPP) conducted in 2002-03, the Unit will support the development and implementation of PPP approaches to the delivery of recreational and cultural facilities projects, as mentioned in the Financial Secretary's Budget Speech. It will also pursue other PPP opportunities as required by other bureaux.

#### Reply:

The Sustainable Development Unit (SDU) under the Administration Wing is responsible for promoting the principles of sustainable development both within the Government and in the wider community. Specific initiatives for 2003-04 include: -

- (a) supporting the newly appointed Council for Sustainable Development in working with stakeholders on key issues related to building a sustainable future, including the preparation for a sustainable development strategy for Hong Kong;
- (b) setting up a Sustainable Development Fund to support initiatives by the non-government sector to promote sustainable development in the community, such as educational programmes and projects that will help citizens and students to develop an awareness of the importance of sustainability;
- (c) reviewing the sustainability assessment system in the light of operational experience and updating the baseline data contained in the computer tool used for sustainability assessment purposes. The SDU will also continue to provide training and seminars to keep bureaux and departments abreast of the best practices of sustainable development; and
- (d) continuing with publicity and community education programmes that help promote the principles of sustainable development. For example, the SDU organised in 2002-03 a roving exhibition, an international symposium, a community fair and a school outreach programme.

Provision of \$4.1 million has been included in the 2003-04 draft Estimates for:

- (a) \$0.4 million as the remaining balance of the study on terrestrial habitat mapping and ranking based on conservation value which is scheduled for completion by May 2003;
- (b) \$1.2 million, out of an approved non-recurrent commitment of \$2.9 million, for consultancy studies to be conducted in consultation with the Council for Sustainable Development; and
- (c) \$2.5 million for SDU's review of baseline data for sustainability assessment purposes and for other studies.

The total cost of the project is \$7.1 million under Capital Works Reserve Fund Head 710 Computerisation, including procurement of hardware and software, data preparation and digitization services, system security review and contract staff expenditure.

Subject matters of liaison include corruption prevention or other general issues that involve coordination with Government bureaux and departments, furtherance of new anti-corruption initiatives, handling of complaints against ICAC staff, general policy issues, etc. In addition, in view of his role of being the official contact point in the Administration for ICAC, the Director of Administration or his representative serves as an ex-officio member of various ICAC advisory committees, viz. the Advisory Committee on Corruption, the Operations Review Committee and the Corruption Prevention Advisory Committee. These committees meet on a regular basis to discuss a wide range of operational, administrative and policies issues of ICAC.

Similarly, we cannot provide an account of our exchanges with the Office of The Ombudsman in 2002. We would arrange meetings or discussions, or resort to telecommunication or written correspondence whenever we see the need to. The more prominent issues that we took up with the Office in 2002 include the comprehensive follow-up work under The Ombudsman (Amendment) Ordinance 2001 to ensure full independence of The Ombudsman over her management of the financial and staffing arrangements. We also helped coordinate relevant Government bureaux' or departments' response to the publication of investigation reports by The Ombudsman, particularly in the context of the preparation of the Government Minute in response to the recommendations made by The Ombudsman on an annual basis.

#### Reply:

- (a) The revised estimate for remuneration for special appointments for 2002-03 is \$33.483 million higher than the original estimate. This is mainly due to the charging of remuneration of the Principal Officials appointed under the accountability system, except the Secretary for Justice, to this item under Head 142 as an interim arrangement. From 2003-04 onward, the remuneration of the 11 Directors of Bureaux will be charged to the respective bureaux.
- (b) We have included provision of \$0.753 million and \$1.44 million in the 2003-04 draft Estimates for the payment of honoraria to the Chairman of the Administrative Appeals Board (AAB) and part-time members of the Central Policy Unit (CPU) respectively.

For the AAB, the original estimate for 2002-03 was \$0.753 million, but the revised estimate is reduced to \$0.242 million due to a smaller number of appeal cases lodged with the AAB and hence lower spending in 2002-03. The provision of \$0.753 million sought in the 2003-04 draft Estimates is the same as the original estimate for 2002-03 to take into account the fluctuation in the number of appeals lodged with the AAB from year to year. The AAB consists of a Chairman, three Deputy Chairmen and a panel of 38 members. Each appeal will be heard by an Appeals Board comprising the Chairman or a Deputy Chairman, and two panel members.

For the CPU's part-time members, the provision of \$1.44 million sought in the 2003-04 draft Estimates represents an increase of \$0.408 million over the revised estimate of \$1.032 million for 2002-03. This is due to the anticipated need to involve more part-time members in the work of the CPU.

The revised estimate for honoraria for the CPU's part-time members for 2002-03 is \$1.032 million. Details are as follows:

It is mentioned in the document that the estimate for 2003-04 will be increased by 1.1% over last year. Of the five targets, the performance of four of them will fall by 2% to 5% when compared to those of previous years. Regarding the indicators which show relatively large increase in workload, i.e. enquiries and applications received in relation to civil cases, the workload will merely increase by 5%. Furthermore, among the matters requiring special attention in 2003-04, the Department "will continue to monitor the processing time and improve the quality of its services". Reply: (a) Concerning "salary increments for staff" of the Department, the number of staff involved will be about 220, including staff members of all ranks (except officers at DL3 and above). The amount involved will be about \$2 million for 2003-04.

(b) On the premise of cost-savings, the Department will actively review and examine its work through re-engineering, re-organizing and re-prioritizing business as well as making use of the market force with a view to providing same or better services with less resources.

(c) The savings arising from civil service salary reduction in 2002-03 is about \$3 million, which has already been excluded from the revised estimate of 2002-03. The expenditure mentioned in item (a) is fully offset by the aforesaid savings.

- 2. Requiring assigned solicitors to report on the costs of the case upon application for extension of legal aid and as requested.
- 3. Issuing and revising Guidance Notes to legal aid practitioners to ensure compliance with the relevant statutory provisions and requirements for handling legal aid cases.
- 4. Issuing internal guidelines to in-house Professional Officers to enhance monitoring of assigned-out cases.

  - 1. Assigning matrimonial work to practitioners who have indicated willingness to elect fixed costs.

The Department has assisted the Council in devising the scheme to provide free counsel certificates to appellants including drawing up the panels of lawyers willing to provide the service.

Apart from item (C) in respect of which a consultant firm was engaged at a fee of \$259,500, the other measures were undertaken without incurring any additional expenditure.

As for 2003-04, the Department will study further measures to strengthen monitoring of assigned out cases in connection with LASC's planned study on costs control and monitoring of case progress and will provide input in reviewing the scheme mentioned in (D) above. The work involved will be absorbed by existing staff without additional expenditure.
