#### Reply:

A working group of prosecutors has very recently made recommendations to the Director of Public Prosecutions as to possible means by which potential miscarriages of justice can be avoided. Among these recommendations are guidelines for expert witnesses, closer liaison between prosecutors and frontline enforcement personnel, greater circumspection in the use of prison informants, retention of case materials in serious cases for longer periods to facilitate future scientific inquiry, and ad hoc reviews of cases involving miscarriages of justice. These recommendations are being studied by the Director of Public Prosecutions, who will consult outside bodies as required. It is anticipated that this exercise will be completed by late 2004. If implemented, the bulk of the recommendations will have no or minimal cost implication.
