The full savings (\$1.5 million) arising from the deletion of the eight posts will not be reflected in 2004-05, as the majority of the posts will be deleted towards the end of the year.

Reply: The Buildings Unit in Housing, Planning and Lands Bureau headed by a Principal Assistant Secretary is responsible for the policy on building safety, including the overall monitoring of the rectification measures implemented by the Buildings Department (BD) to improve environmental hygiene. The actual implementation work is carried out by the Buildings Department and resources for this purpose are accordingly reflected under Head 82 Buildings Department.

Within BD, an Assistant Director in the Existing Buildings Division who looks after, inter alia, the implementation of hygiene improvement measures recommended by Team Clean is responsible for coordinating implementation work to rectify building defects which have caused environmental hygiene problems in private buildings. In 2004-05, BD will continue its enforcement action on drainage defects in private buildings and unauthorized building works in rear lanes and blackspots. There will be 293 existing BD staff working together with 72 contract staff recruited last year (i.e. a total of 365 staff) to implement the rectification measures as part of their enforcement duties under the Buildings Ordinance. In addition, through an outsourcing arrangement, 38 staff of the Housing Authority are also engaged in carrying out these measures.

In 2004-05, BD will take follow up enforcement action on some 3,100 buildings with drainage problems and 1,700 repair orders issued, arising mainly from the territory-wide inspection of private buildings since May 2003 to detect defective drainage pipes in the wake of the SARS outbreak. Moreover, BD will take follow up action on some 300 outstanding orders arising from the joint effort with other government departments to clear environmental blackspots since May 2003.

The expenditure incurred in implementing the rectification measures is mainly related to staff costs. As the professional and technical staff in BD are engaged in such work as part of their enforcement duties under the BO, it is not possible to provide a breakdown of the estimated expenditure in terms of existing BD staff costs involved. However, BD estimates that the expenditure in 2004-05 for the 72 contract staff will be \$19 million whilst the cost for outsourcing part of the work to the Housing Authority will be \$24.4 million.

- (iii) carrying out consultancy studies on standards of building design and conditions of existing buildings, amounting to \$9.3 million.

We have pledged to make the records available for viewing and copying within 10 working days from the date of application. The performance we have achieved in processing applications within the pledged time over the past three years expressed in terms of the percentage of the total applications has improved from 90% in 2001 to 95% in 2003.

In early 2001, we started a pilot project to digitise building records and to set up a computerized Building Records Management System (BRMS) covering Tsim Sha Tsui, Yau Ma Tei, Mongkok and Wanchai districts. The pilot BRMS has been accessible by the public since June 2001 offering instant viewing of building records in these districts. We have recently obtained funding to extend the BRMS to cover all existing private buildings in Hong Kong. Upon completion of the project by the end of 2005, instant viewing and copying of building records will be available for all existing buildings.

In 2004-2005, the Buildings Department (BD) will select 1,000 buildings for clearance of external unauthorized building works (UBW) under blitz operations. Some of the work in the operations will be outsourced to private consultant firms, and the estimated outsourcing cost amounts to \$18 million. In addition, a total of 365 professional and technical officers in the department are responsible for these operations, along with their duties to take other enforcement actions under the Buildings Ordinance. As the carrying out of blitz operations forms only part of the duties of these BD staff, it is not possible to provide a breakdown of the estimated expenditure in BD staff costs devoted to these operations.

BD has also set a target to clear illegal rooftop structures on 700 single-staircase buildings in 2004. A total of 91 professional and technical officers in the department are responsible for carrying out these clearance operations. The staff cost involved is \$25.3 million.

There is no provision under the Buildings Ordinance for recovering the cost of the enforcement work incurred in the above operations where the owners carry out removal works at their own expense. In the event that orders served for the removal of UBW are not complied with, the department will take prosecution actions to urge the owners to carry out the removal works themselves. There are 23 officers responsible for taking prosecution actions, and the staff cost involved is \$10 million. Alternatively, BD may remove the UBW on behalf of the owners in default. In the latter circumstances, the department may recover the cost of removal from them.

Last year, the Buildings Department implemented a series of public education activities and publicity events to promote public awareness of building safety and maintenance. To increase public awareness of the importance of drainage maintenance, two types of posters publicising the messages "An Attack Out of the Blue Can Kill" and "Illegal Drainage Connections Pose Health Hazard" were produced and displayed at bus stops and on the body of buses for 13 weeks, at MTRC stations for 26 weeks and KCRC stations for 13 weeks. The posters were also distributed to building management companies. The total advertising cost amounted to \$850,000.

Leaflets entitled "What You Need To Know About Drainage Pipe Maintenance" and "Guidelines on Maintenance and Repair of Drainage System and Sanitary Fitments" were printed and distributed to the public, including building owners. The total printing cost amounted to \$520,000. The pamphlets entitled "What You Need to Know About Drainage Pipe Maintenance" were distributed by post to 1.2 million households in private buildings throughout the territory. The postage cost amounted to \$857,000. Buildings Department staff also distributed the guidelines to building management companies while conducting preliminary drainage pipe inspections.

A publicity campaign promoting the "Proper Maintenance Makes Hygienic Homes" message was launched in November 2003 and a series of roving exhibitions was held at 21 locations throughout the territory from November last year to early January this year. These events involved an amount of \$600,000.

The Buildings Department and the Education and Manpower Bureau jointly organized an Inter-School Stage Performance Competition in late 2003 to promote a better building care culture. Secondary school students were invited to express their understanding of building maintenance through drama, dancing and singing. The competition attracted 22 school entries and six school teams were selected for performance at the competition held on 10 March 2004 at the Kwai Tsing Theatre. The competition involved a cost of \$77,000.

Building management seminars for building owners were also held from time to time.

A Principal Information Officer, underpinned by two Information Assistants, was mainly responsible for the public education campaign and promotion activities. Professionals and general grade staff of the department also provided professional and logistic support from time to time.

Regarding the Hire of Services and Professional Fees, the Administration anticipates that the expenses in 2004-05 will be more than \$86 million, much higher than the revised estimates of the same in 2003-04. Why is there such an increase? As for the hire of professional services, what kind of professional services are included? Could these services be provided by the professional staff in the Buildings Department?

Reply:

Compared with the revised estimates in 2003-04, there will be an increase of \$49.8 million in 2004-05 for the hire of services and professional fees. The main reasons for the increase are:

- (i) increased outsourcing in the investigation and removal of unauthorized building works (UBW) in progress, large scale clearance of UBW and investigation and monitoring of building repairs, amounting to \$24.2 million;
- (ii) outsourcing part of the enforcement actions to the Housing Authority in respect of backlog removal orders, drainage defects in private buildings and UBW in rear lanes and blackspots, amounting to \$16.3 million; and
- (iii) carrying out consultancy studies on standards of building design and conditions of existing buildings, amounting to \$9.3 million.

The duties imposed on and the powers granted to the Building Authority under the Buildings Ordinance have to be carried out and exercised by officers of Government departments as set out in the Buildings Ordinance and cannot be outsourced.

Amongst the services required in respect of items (i) and (ii) above, the tasks outsourced to private consultants are non-statutory services required before and after the issue of statutory orders. They mainly comprise building inspections, preparation of inspection reports, drafting of statutory orders, preparation of compliance reports and answering enquiries from the owners concerned. For item (iii), specialized professional services are involved in specific areas of the consultancy studies in question.

The tasks under items (i) and (ii) above can be performed by Buildings Department staff. However, outsourcing of these tasks is in line with Government's policy to contain the growth of the civil service. In addition, the tasks involved are time-limited in nature and professionals providing such services are available in the private sector.

Reply:

Since the implementation of the Coordinated Maintenance of Buildings Scheme (CMBS) in November 2000, a total of 550 buildings have been covered by the Scheme. The work involved in carrying out CMBS is absorbed by internal redeployment of resources within the Buildings Department. The total cost involved so far is estimated to be \$98 million.

While the scheme has demonstrated how government departments can work together to coordinate repair works in private buildings and how a more integrated service can be provided to the public, we have also identified the following difficulties that building owners encountered in carrying out repair works:

(a) Many building owners have a poor understanding of the importance of proper building maintenance and management;

- (b) In some cases, the building owners have difficulties in reaching agreement and contributing financially to carry out the repair works amongst themselves. In case of financial difficulties, we help the owners apply for loans under the Building Safety Loan Scheme; and
- (c) In general, the building owners need to take some considerable time to organize and complete the works.

Reply:

In early 2001, the Buildings Department (BD) started a pilot project for the digitization of building records and setting up a computerized Building Records Management System (BRMS) covering Tsim Sha Tsui, Yau Ma Tei, Mongkok and Wanchai districts. The pilot BRMS has been open to public access in the Building Information Centre of BD since June 2001 offering instant viewing and copying service of building records. Staff in the Centre will provide assistance to the public in using the system where necessary.

With the success of the pilot BRMS, we will commission a project in 2004-05 to extend the BRMS to cover all districts in the territory. The project will digitize all the building plans and related documents kept by BD and store the electronic images in the BRMS for easy retrieval. Upon completion of the project by the end of 2005, the records of existing buildings in the entire territory will be available for instant viewing and copying by the public via workstations in BD's Building Information Centre.

The funding for the project approved by the Finance Committee in July 2003 is \$50.3 million which comprises \$37.8 million for data conversion and \$12.5 million for the purchase of computer hardware and software, implementation services, site preparation and project administration. The digitization of the building records will be outsourced to a service provider. The estimated recurrent expenditure for maintaining and operating the system is \$3.2 million per annum which will be absorbed by BD within the existing resources.

The manpower involved in overseeing and administering the project will be one professional staff, supported by seven clerical staff as well as six to seven IT staff.

Out of this staff of 365, 115 are professional grade officers (building surveyors and structural engineers) and the remaining 250 are technical staff.

In order to enhance our capability in dealing with increased number of reports on UBW, additional resources in the form of 12 Building Safety Officers, 30 Building Safety Assistants and 9 Contract Clerks have been provided at an annual staff cost of \$8.765 million in 2004/05. Part of their duties is the handling of reports on UBW received from members of the public.

The Buildings Department's estimate for the coming year is \$803.9 million, which is 9.3% significantly higher than the revised estimate for 2003-04. One of the major increases is under Subhead 000 "Hire of services and professional fees" which is estimated to be \$86.021 million in the coming year. It is about 25 times over the original estimate for 2003-04, and more than doubled the revised estimate for 2003/04.

Please provide details of the relevant services items and compare if this would affect the total estimates of expenditure when the works are undertaken by departmental staff, and how to ensure the standard of the hire services is in the best sense of cost-effectiveness.

Reply:

In the 2003-04 original estimate, \$191.9 million was included under "General departmental expenses" of Subhead 000. As outsourcing to private firms was adopted for the investigation and removal of unauthorized building works (UBW), \$33.9 million was re-grouped to "Hire of services and professional fees" in the 2003-04 revised estimate, amounting the revised estimate for "Hire of services and professional fees" to \$36.2 million. In the event, the 2004-05 estimate figure of \$86.0 million when compared to \$36.2 million would only represent an increase of about 2 times. The increase in expenditure is for:

- (i) increased outsourcing in the investigation and removal of UBW in progress, large scale clearance of UBW and investigation and monitoring of building repairs, amounting to \$24.2 million;
- (ii) outsourcing part of enforcement actions to the Housing Authority in respect of backlog removal orders, drainage defects in private buildings and UBW in rear lanes and blackspots, amounting to \$16.3 million; and
- (iii) carrying out consultancy studies on standards of building design and conditions of existing buildings, amounting to \$9.3 million.

For item (i), the outsourced professional work includes building inspections, drafting of removal and repair orders and follow-up actions on the orders issued. For item (ii), the services include both the above professional work and enforcement duties which can only be performed by departments specified under the Buildings Ordinance. For item (iii), the consultancy studies in question call for professional services in specialized areas.

The total departmental expenditure would be higher if the above outsourced tasks are to be carried out by departmental staff. The cost of hiring private services is generally lower than that of using civil servants because of higher staff cost in the latter case. In addition, the tasks involved are time-limited in nature and professionals providing such services are available in the private sector.

All necessary requirements and standards relating to the delivery of services are laid down in the contract brief. The performance of consultants and contractors is closely monitored and appraised. The Environment, Transport and Works Bureau Technical Circulars entitled "Reporting and Management of Consultants' Performance", "Preparation of Technical Proposals and Marking Scheme", and "Contractor Performance Index System" set out details and procedures on selection, monitoring and appraisal of consultants and contractors. BD has also set up a performance management system to assess the performance of the consultants and contractors. Where performance is found to be continuously poor, we will suspend or terminate the contract under the General Conditions of Employment.

Reply:

The 10,824 plans received and processed in 2003 include first submissions and resubmissions of general building plans, demolition plans, site formation plans, foundation plans, structural plans and drainage plans of new building proposals; and plans for alterations and additions of existing buildings. These plans are related to 1,881 sites. The building plan proposals comprise various types of building works and we do not keep a breakdown of the number of properties related to these proposals.

The following table summarizes the number of submissions made for the 198 approved new building projects:

We do not have up-to-date statistical information on the manpower and expenditure for the processing of a single new submission plan or a single resubmission plan.

Buildings Department has introduced a number of improvement measures since August 2002 to expedite and streamline the plan processing process. Such measures include the provision of enquiry service, curtailing the checking of plans, verification of floor area calculations by computer and waiving the requirement of prior approval and consent for minor amendments made to approved plans. We have also introduced the Buildings (Amendment) Bill 2003 into LegCo in April 2003. The Bill seeks to, inter alia, allow certification of minor works by qualified persons, thus dispensing with the requirements for obtaining Buildings Department's approval and consent prior to commencement of such minor works. The department will keep the processing system under constant review and will introduce additional improvement measures as and when such measures are identified.

(b) The majority of the repair orders issued in 2003 are drainage repair orders arising mainly from the territory-wide inspection of private buildings carried out to detect defective drainage pipes in the wake of the SARS outbreak. Of the 2,676 repair orders issued in 2003, 2,100 have not been complied with up to mid-March 2004. It is difficult to estimate the number of outstanding orders in 2004, but we will ensure owners' compliance and enforce outstanding orders through prosecution actions or employing the Buildings Department's term contractor to carry out the works and recover the cost from the owners afterwards.

With streamlined procedures and better utilization of resources, it is anticipated that the impact on the regulatory service of lifts and escalators would not be significant.
- (b) The number of staff members in EMSD designated to inspect lifts and escalators was increased from 7 in 2001 to 9 in 2002 and remained the same up to the present.
- (c) Based on the actual figures for 2003, the average number of lifts and escalators inspected was 11.3 per inspector per week. The normal working hours of an inspector is 44 hours per week.

Kong.

The inspections of lifts and escalators are conducted in order to monitor the performance of the registered lift/escalator engineers and contractors. Under this arrangement, the inspection of all new lifts and escalators and random inspection of existing lifts and escalators will continue in 2004-05. Whilst there is a small reduction in the number of random inspections of existing lifts and escalators in 2004-05 due to the re-organisation of work to achieve better resource utilization, it is not expected that this reduction will have any significant effect on the performance of the said engineers and contractors. Moreover, with continued publicity and public education on the safe use of lifts and escalators, the overall impact on the safety of lifts and escalators should not be significant.

The major projects will include Penny's Bay Reclamation (\$1,061 million), Deep Bay Link (\$93 million), East Rail Extension – Essential public infrastructure works for Hung Hom to Tsim Sha Tsui extension (\$76 million), Rural Drainage Rehabilitation Scheme – drainage rehabilitation works at Ping Yuen River (\$45 million), Yuen Long south western extension (\$35 million), Main drainage channels for Yuen Long and Kam Tin – Tin Tsuen channel – Ancillary road works (\$32 million), Yuen Long bypass floodway (\$30 million), Construction of roads and drains to serve the housing development in Area 56, Tuen Mun (\$26 million), Sai Sha Road widening between Kam Ying Road and future Trunk Road T7 junction (\$26 million), Castle Peak Road improvement between Area 2 and Sham Tseng, Tsuen Wan (\$25 million), Remaining engineering infrastructure works for Pak Shek Kok development (\$10 million), etc.

As regards the manpower involved, these major projects are carried out throughout the territory and involve input of different offices at the Headquarters and district level. The Department's ability to fully meet the performance targets for the year was affected by the poor property market sentiment in 2003. This was reflected in the lengthier negotiations over the terms of the lease modification. Moreover, the processing of lease modification applications is often very complex, involving liaison with a number of government departments. Progress is often affected by factors beyond the control of Lands Department.

Of the number of posts (i.e. 235) to be deleted in 2004-05, more than half (i.e. 129) are project-specific time-limited posts in the Task Force (Black Spots) Team and the Railway Development Section of the Department. These posts are not related to the work of processing lease modification cases. The remaining posts are mainly related to the second Voluntary Retirement Scheme and most of them are not directly related to the processing of lease modification applications. Hence, we envisage that the processing of lease modifications in 2004-05 will not be adversely affected by the aforementioned deletion of posts. Barring any factors beyond Lands Department's control, we will strive to meet our performance targets in the coming year.

The land to be acquired will cover 16 Rural Planning and Improvement Strategy (RPIS) projects under the auspices of the Home Affairs Department. The required land is for the construction of access roads and the implementation of drainage improvement works at some villages in the New Territories.

These minor projects, as shown in the attached list, are scattered throughout the New Territories. Staff from a variety of grades in the various District Lands Offices provide input of different extent to these projects as part of their duties. Hence, it is not feasible to specify the exact number of staff involved. Reply: The revised Master Schedule of Notes to Statutory Plans (MSN) could only take effect when it has been incorporated into the Notes of individual statutory plans. Amendments to the statutory plans to incorporate the revised MSN would take time as the plans are at various stages of the plan-making process and certain plans might require more time to review. Since Town Planning Board's endorsement of the revised MSN on 28.2.2003, we have so far amended 49 (out of 107) statutory plans currently in force. Given that the bulk of the amended plans were only gazetted in the last quarter of 2003 and amendments to the remaining statutory plans are still in progress, the savings arising from the revised MSN are not yet fully apparent at this stage.

The Town Planning (Amendment) Bill 2003 currently being scrutinized by the Bills Committee of the Legislative Council has introduced further proposals to streamline the planning and development process. The Planning Department has held numerous discussions and consultations with stakeholders and relevant professional bodies before the formulation of the various proposals and will continue to maintain such dialogue in the future.

Only 191 objections were processed in 2003 because less controversial issues were involved in the plans gazetted in that year.

The Northern Link provides rail connections between North West (NW) and North East (NE) New Territories, improves connections to boundary crossing stations, and opens up a new corridor for New Development Areas (NDAs).

In the light of rapid population growth estimated in the mid-nineties, consultancy studies were commissioned in 1999-2000 to identify NDAs in NW and NE New Territories to accommodate about 400,000 population by 2016. Several NDAs were identified. Of these, San Tin/Ngau Tam Mei and Kam Tin/Au Tau were proposed, among other considerations, to take advantage of the Northern Link.

However, the latest round of population projection reveals that our population may not grow as fast as the earlier forecast. As a result, the requirement for extra land to accommodate population growth is no longer that pressing. The timing for all NDAs is currently being reviewed in the HK2030: Planning Vision and Strategy Study. According to the latest assessment, which is the subject of the on-going HK 2030 Study Stage 3 public consultation, the NDAs in San Tin/Ngau Tam Mei and Kam Tin/Au Tau are unlikely to be required before 2020. The HK2030 Study is expected to be completed in end 2004/early 2005.

Reply: The revised estimate for Allowances in 2003-04 is less than the actual expenditure because the Department has exercised very stringent control over expenditure on acting allowance and over-time allowance during the year. Allowances are only approved for situations where acting appointment or over-time work are strictly unavoidable. For officers who have undertaken overtime work, they are compensated with time-off in lieu of allowance as far as possible.

The 2004-05 draft estimate for Allowances is 30% higher than the 2003-04 revised estimate because it is anticipated that there would be an increase in short-term acting appointments incurring allowances, arising from vacancies which cannot be immediately filled upon departure of retiring officers. However, this is only a provision made and the Department will exercise the same stringent control over the payment of allowances in the course of the year.
