## <u>Reply</u>

The preparation of the draft legislation to provide a statutory basis for the operation of the Independent Police Complaints Council (IPCC) is one of the tasks under "Programme (2): Internal Security" of the Security Bureau and we do not have a separate breakdown for its expenditure. The draft legislation being prepared is to provide a statutory basis for the existing operation of the IPCC and to empower the IPCC to appoint the Secretary, Legal Adviser and other staff of its secretariat. The existing police complaints system is fairly transparent and has credibility. With regard to resources, the estimated expenditure for 2004-05 under Head 121-Independent Police Complaints Council is \$13.1 m while the estimated expenditure for the Complaints Against Police Office in 2004-05 under Head 122-Hong Kong Police Force is \$55.5 m. The proposed bill will further enhance the independence of the IPCC.

<u>Question</u> : Under the Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2004-05, it is stated that the bureau will take measures to combat the problem of drug abuse in particular that of psychotropic substance. What are the specific measures? How many resources will be involved?

Asked by : Hon.YOUNG, Howard

Reply:

The Government adopts a multi-pronged strategy comprising legislation and law enforcement, treatment and rehabilitation, preventive education and publicity, research and international cooperation to combat the problem of drug abuse.

In 2004-2005, the Hong Kong Police Force will continue to take enforcement action against drug-related offences, particularly offences related to psychotropic substance while the Customs and Excise Department will take proactive action against drug trafficking activities through border control points.

On regional cooperation, the Security Bureau will continue to work closely with Guangdong and Macao on coordinating anti-drug measures in the three places. The Narcotics Division of Security Bureau and related Government departments will take part in the third tripartite conference on policy to tackle drug abuse and trafficking to be hosted by Macao in September 2004.

Regarding treatment and rehabilitation services, the Security Bureau will oversee the implementation of the recommendations of the Third Three-year Plan on Drug Treatment and Rehabilitation Services in Hong Kong (2003-2005) and the licensing scheme for residential drug treatment centres.

On the preventive education and publicity front, the Hong Kong Jockey Club Drug InfoCentre (DIC), an anti-drug education centre specially designed to deliver preventive education activities to young people, will be opened for public use in June 2004. Furthermore, a new publicity campaign comprising TV and radio APIs aimed at steering young people away from substance abuse will be launched in June 2004 to tie in with the grand opening of the DIC. These special initiatives will complement the regular programmes conducted by government departments and non-government organizations such as school talks, counselling services for high risk groups, etc.

To promote exchanges between local professionals in the anti-drug and anti-money laundering fields and their overseas counterparts, an international conference on combating drug trafficking, drug abuse and related crimes as well as money laundering will be held within 2004-2005.

In total, the government expenditure on anti-drug work for 2004-2005 is estimated at \$603.25 million.

# <u>Question</u> :

Under Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2004-05, it is stated that the bureau will continue to co-operate with relevant bureaux and departments in the fight against illegal employment and to step up enforcement actions on this front. What are the concrete plans and how much resource and manpower will be involved?

# Asked by : Hon. YOUNG Howard

Reply:

The Government has always been vigilant against illegal employment. Vigorous efforts have been and will continue to be made by all enforcement agencies to tackle the problem.

An Inter-departmental Task Force was set up in April 2003 to strengthen crimeprevention measures, including combating illegal employment. Its membership includes the Security Bureau, Police, Immigration Department, Customs and Excise Department, Correctional Services Department, Labour Department, Lands Department and Food and Environmental Hygiene Department. Through close coordination and enhanced intelligence exchange, the Task Force has launched proactive and pre-emptive measures to identify black spots of illegal employment, strengthen enforcement actions and increase the number of joint operations among various departments in order to combat illegal employment in a focused manner.

We will adopt the following measures in the coming year in order to achieve better results in terms of prevention and tackling the problem at source:

- (i) To strengthen control at immigration control points so as to keep away visitors whose bona fides are in doubt;
- (ii) To implement a facial recognition system to detect visitors seeking entry on false identities;
- (iii) To step up anti-illegal employment operations and joint operations involving all law enforcement agencies with a role to play;
- (iv) To hold capacity building seminars for property management companies so that they can help to prevent illegal decoration workers from entering public

and private housing estates;

- (v) To step up publicity campaigns against the hiring of persons not lawfully employable and to enhance the efficiency in handling report from the public on illegal employment; and
- (vi) To maintain close liaison with the Mainland authorities so as to ensure that future visit applications of Mainland residents suspected, arrested or prosecuted for involvement in illegal activities would be carefully scrutinised.

The costs incurred by the above efforts are absorbed within the existing resources of the Departments concerned and not met through a specific provision.

Please provide details of the initiative to take forward further improvement works for the Lo Wu Footbridge and the Lo Wu Control Point. How much resources and manpower will be involved.

Asked by : Hon. YOUNG Howard

Reply:

At the Lo Wu Terminal Building, improvement works mainly comprise widening of the passageway to the Departure Hall, expansion of the Departure Hall to provide 14 additional immigration counters (+18%), and construction of a new passageway leading to the eastern Departure Hall. Upon completion of these improvement works in early 2005, there will be an extra 1,100 square metres of space at the Departure Hall, providing an additional buffer for circulation and queuing room for up to 3,800 passengers. The Finance Committee approved the funding of \$108 million for this project under head 703 – Buildings on 10 May 2002. Additional annual recurrent expenditure arising from the project is about \$1,210,000, which will be absorbed by the relevant departments from their existing resources.

As regards the Lo Wu Footbridge, improvement works include enclosing the footbridge, installation of air-conditioning system and widening the footbridge by 5.5 metres, or some 60%. These works are expected to be completed by end 2004. The Finance Committee approved the funding of \$39.7 million for this project under head 703 – Buildings on 18 July 2003. Additional annual recurrent expenditure arising from the project is about \$1.1 million, which will be absorbed by the relevant departments from their existing resources.

The above projects aim to improve the hardware facilities of the Lo Wu Control Point and will not involve additional manpower.

The Automated Passenger Clearance (APC) System and Automated Vehicle Clearance (AVC) System will take advantage of smart identity cards issued to Hong Kong residents and apply fingerprint recognition technologies so as to allow self-service immigration clearance. This obviates the need for manual inspection by immigration control officers.

On 24 January 2003, the Finance Committee approved the funding of \$352.753 million under Head 710 Computerisation for implementing these two systems. Additional annual recurrent expenditure arising from these systems is about \$46.194 million. Necessary financial provisions are earmarked in the draft Estimates 2004-05 under Head 70 Immigration Department.

The Immigration Department awarded the contract for implementing APC/AVC to the successful tenderer in March 2004. We expect that the two systems will be rolled out in phases around end 2004. Tentatively, AVC will be installed for all kiosks at Man Kam To, Lok Ma Chau and Sha Tau Kok control points by end 2004-05. Installation of APC channels at control points will be carried out progressively and is expected to be completed by 2006-07.

The proposed development will relocate all existing penal institutions on Hong Kong Island and in Kowloon and all remand facilities in the territory, and will provide 2 600 additional places. The preliminary estimated capital cost of the whole project is \$12 billion.

Given the scale of the proposed project, a feasibility study and preliminary site investigation for land formation and infrastructure works (FS) is now being conducted. The Finance Committee (FC) has approved \$46.7 million under Head 705 – Civil Engineering for carrying out the FS in two stages. Stage 1 of the FS will be completed by mid-2004. We will report to the FC on the findings of the Stage 1 study before starting stage 2 of the FS.

For the purpose of a long-term prison development plan, we propose to build a 7 220-place prison complex at Hei Ling Chau to address the problems of prison overcrowding and archaic facilities, and to meet the forecast growth in penal population in the coming decade. The proposed development will relocate all existing penal institutions on Hong Kong Island and in Kowloon and all remand facilities in the territory, and will provide 2 600 additional places. The preliminary estimated capital cost of the whole project is \$12 billion. The proposed project is scheduled for completion by 2013.

Given the scale of the project, a feasibility study and preliminary site investigation for land formation and infrastructure works (FS) is now being conducted. The Finance Committee (FC) has approved \$46.7 million for carrying out the FS in two stages. Stage 1 of the FS will be completed by mid-2004. We will report to the FC on the findings of the Stage 1 study before starting stage 2 of the FS.

Protection of job opportunities for local workers remains one of the top priorities of the Administration. In this connection, enforcement actions against hiring of illegal workers have been stepped up as reflected in the increase in the number of arrests and prosecution of illegal workers and their employers. In 2003, Immigration Department conducted 5 739 operations against illegal employment, representing an increase of 60% as compared to the 3 580 operations conducted in 2002. The number of arrests and prosecution made in 2002 and 2003 is shown below:

An Inter-departmental Task Force was set up in April 2003 to strengthen crime-prevention measures and enforcement action against illegal activities, including illegal employment. Its membership includes the Security Bureau, Police, Immigration Department, Customs and Excise Department, Correctional Services Department, Labour Department, Lands Department and Food and Environmental Hygiene Department. Through close coordination and enhanced intelligence exchange, the Task Force has launched proactive and pre-emptive measures to identify black spots of illegal employment, strengthen enforcement actions and increase the number of joint operations among various departments in order to combat illegal employment in a focused manner.

We will adopt the following measures in the coming year in order to achieve better results in terms of prevention and tackling the problem at source:

- (vii) To strengthen control at immigration control points so as to keep away visitors whose bona fides are in doubt;
- (viii)To implement a facial recognition system to detect visitors seeking entry on false identities;

- (ix) To step up anti-illegal employment operations and joint operations involving all law enforcement agencies with a role to play;
- (x) To hold capacity building seminars for property management companies so that they can help to prevent illegal decoration workers from entering public and private housing estates;
- (xi) To step up publicity campaigns against the hiring of persons not lawfully employable and to enhance the efficiency in handling report from the public on illegal employment; and
- (xii) To maintain close liaison with the Mainland authorities so as to ensure that future visit applications of Mainland residents suspected, arrested or prosecuted for involvement in illegal activities would be carefully scrutinised.

(a) Juvenile delinquency and involvement in crime is a complicated problem. Government departments including the Education and Manpower Bureau, the Social Welfare Department and the Hong Kong Police Force, schools and non-government organizations offering youth services all share the view that the multi-agency approach can effectively address youth problems.

On this premise, the Police launched the "Secondary School Liaison Officers" Programme in 2001. The work of the Liaison Officers including visits, seminars, group/individual discussions, etc., aims at conveying to students the importance of observing the law. Students will learn that the use of violence and certain bullying acts may constitute criminal offences and the consequences are very serious. The work will strengthen the students' awareness of civil responsibilities, moral values and discipline norms, and reinforce their communications with the Police.

Juvenile crime prevention work falls under the Programme of Prevention and Detection of Crime. No specific breakdown of the expenditure in this area is available.

In 2004-05, the Police will continue to co-operate with the Social Welfare Department, voluntary organizations and schools for the prevention of juvenile crimes. The Police will also continue to initiate co-operation with secondary and primary schools through the "Liaison Officers" in various police districts. Talks and activities will be organized to publicize fight-crime messages.

The Police have also participated in more than 40 youth programmes organized by different organizations. Through their activities, the programmes help instil positive values of life in the youths and prevent them from going astray. Examples of the programmes are the "Smart Teen Challenge Camp" jointly organized with the Education and Manpower Bureau and the "Junior Police Call Scheme" implemented by the Police for 30 years.

Moreover, during routine enforcement actions and inspections, the Police will constantly take note of places where youths frequent for juvenile crime prevention.

(b) The Police attach great importance to the work of the Secondary School Liaison Officers. A full review was made a year after the implementation of the "Secondary School Liaison Officers" Programme (i.e. in September and October 2002). The result indicated that the parties concerned (the school management and the students in particular) had a very high opinion of the Programme and recognized its role. In a questionnaire survey conducted, 447 (86%) out of 520 headmasters considered the Programme useful to both schools and students. The Police will conduct regular reviews of this Programme to ensure the appropriate use of resources and the effective reduction of crimes at school.

The Police consider the present deployment of resources appropriate. In 2004-05, the Police will maintain the present 33 Secondary School Liaison Officer posts and the manpower expenditure required is around \$8.6 m a year.

- (a) The number of juveniles arrested for crime by type of crimes and age group are given in Annex (1).
- (b) Juvenile delinquency and involvement in crime is a complicated problem. Government departments including the Education and Manpower Bureau, the Social Welfare Department and the Hong Kong Police Force, schools and non-government organizations offering youth services all share the view that the multi-agency approach can effectively address youth problems.

The Police have now initiated co-operation with secondary and primary schools through the School Liaison Officers in various police districts to publicize the fight-crime messages and the consequences of committing crimes, and strengthen the students' civil responsibilities, moral values and discipline norms by holding talks and organizing activities. The Liaison Officers will advise the school management on the appropriate approach in regard to unruly behaviour of secondary school students as required.

The Police have participated in more than 40 youth programmes organized by different organizations. Through their activities, the programmes help instil positive values of life in the youths. Examples of the programmes are the "Smart Teen Challenge Camp" jointly organized with the Education and Manpower Bureau and the "Junior Police Call Scheme" implemented by the Police for 30 years.

In 2004-05, the Police will continue its work and co-operate with the Social Welfare Department, voluntary organizations and schools to prevent the youths from going astray. During routine enforcement actions and inspections, the Police will constantly take note of places where youths frequent for juvenile crime prevention.

The resources required for prevention of juvenile crimes are included in the Programme of "Prevention and Detection of Crime" and no separate breakdown is available. Appropriate resources will be allocated when actual situations so required for the prevention of juvenile crimes.

(c) In general, bullying acts at schools may not constitute criminal offences, while acts involving the use of violence, damage of property or intimidation are treated as criminal offences.

Although recently the incidents involving bullying acts of students have aroused the public concern, there was in fact no great change in the criminal offences involving students in the past two years as indicated in our records.

As regards the bullying cases at school of comparatively minor nature, in general, the schools can handle them properly. In this respect, the school management, social workers and parents can make better coordination to deal with the problems. The Police can provide advice and assistance through the School Liaison Officers as required.

The work in this area is part of our routine policing work. The resources including those for the crime investigation work fall under the Programme of "Prevention and Detection of Crime" and no separate breakdown is available.

- (b) The Force will implement the Sham Shui Po Police District Amalgamation Project in 2004-05 to realign and amalgamate the Sham Shui Po Division, Cheung Sha Wan Division and Shek Kip Mei Division. After the amalgamation, 16 front-line police officer posts will be created while 25 disciplined posts and 15 civilian posts will be deleted. As a result, the Force will save about \$9.7 m in emolument per year.

The patrol coverage will remain unchanged after the amalgamation. The manpower of the patrol sub-units and their supervision will be enhanced, thus further strengthening the front-line policing work with greater flexibility in staff deployment.

#### Reply:

The total number of crimes reported in 2003 increases by 12 500 compared with 2002. Those on the increase are mostly non-violent crimes, including miscellaneous thefts, theft from vehicles, criminal damage and shop theft, which adds up to 9 500 cases. Apart from depending on the efforts of the Police to reduce such crimes, it is also vital that the public maintain their awareness of theft prevention. In this respect, the Police will continue to step up its publicity on theft prevention, reminding the public not to leave their personal belongings unattended at public places in order to reduce such crimes.

The breakdown of the main crimes reported in 2003 is at Annex 1.

In respect of the police hotlines, a total of 35 981 calls in connection of crimes were made to the hotlines in 2003.

In the first two months of 2004, 6 400 reported crime cases were recorded on average each month. In comparison to the 7 364 cases on average per month recorded for 2003, it represents a decrease of 13%. The Police will continue its efforts on the prevention and detection of crimes. In respect of the number of calls to the hotlines, it is estimated that it will be very much the same in 2004-05.

In view of the growing public concern over the number of cases and seriousness of juvenile crimes involving the use of violence in 2003, will there be any work or activities conducted in this regard?

Reply:

Juvenile delinquency and involvement in crime is a complicated problem. Government departments including the Education and Manpower Bureau, the Social Welfare Department and the Hong Kong Police Force, schools and non-government organizations offering youth services all share the view that the multi-agency approach can effectively address youth problems.

On this premise, the Police launched the "Secondary School Liaison Officers" Programme in 2001. The work of the Liaison Officers, including visits, seminars, group/individual discussions, etc., aims at conveying to students the importance of observing the law. Students will learn that the use of violence and certain bullying acts may constitute criminal offences and the consequences are very serious. The work will strengthen the students' awareness of civil responsibilities, moral values and discipline norms, and reinforce their communications with the Police.

Since the implementation of the Programme, the Secondary School Liaison Officers have established good relations and maintained close liaison with the school management, school social workers, parents and non-government organizations in a joint effort to take preventive initiatives targeted on susceptible youths to help them stay away from crimes.

More than 40 youth programmes are now being organized by the Police in various districts with the participation of the Police under a multi-agency approach. Through various activities, a sense of discipline is instilled in the youths, so as to prevent youth crimes and reduce recidivism. The Secondary School Liaison Officers will play an important role by co-ordinating, organizing or participating in such activities.

The Police attach great importance to the work of the Secondary School Liaison Officers. A full review was made a year after the implementation of the "Secondary School Liaison Officers" Programme (i.e. in September and October 2002). The results indicated that the parties concerned (the school management and the students in particular) had a very high opinion of the Programme and recognized its role. In a questionnaire survey conducted, 447 (86%) out of 520 headmasters considered the Programme useful to both schools and students. The Police will conduct regular reviews of this Programme to ensure the appropriate use of resources and the effective reduction of

crimes at schools.

In 2003, the Secondary School Liaison Officers made 10 941 visits and interviewed 2 041 secondary school students. The Police will continue to work closely with the school management and the school community to prevent the involvement of students in crime. The number of seminars and group/individual discussions will be increased as required.

Under the law enforcement policy of the Police on parking offences, when vehicles which are illegally parked constitute serious obstructions to road traffic and pose imminent danger to other road users, the Police will take legal actions to remove or drive them to safe places. However, for general illegal parking where the vehicle does not constitute serious obstruction or pose imminent danger, a fixed penalty ticket will be issued every two hours. If the vehicle is not driven away after a number of fixed penalty tickets have been issued, the Police will consider towing it away under the law.

The guideline that no penalty ticket will be issued to the same vehicle within two hours is targeted on vehicles which do not constitute serious obstructions and which left unattended. In making this guideline, the Police has sought to strike a proper balance between public acceptability and deterrent effect. It is regarded that the guideline needs not to be changed for the time being. Moreover, the Police will review its traffic prosecution policy including this guideline every year. Appropriate amendments will be made as necessary.

(a) As the expenditure for the prevention and detection of technology and cyber crimes is part of the expenditure for Commercial Crime Bureau, no specific breakdown is available in the estimates.

In 2003-04, apart from the expenditure for detection operations, the actual expenditure for training in handling technology and cyber crimes and installation of computer equipment was around \$300,000.

- (b) In 2004-05, in order to strengthen the capabilities in preventing and detecting such crimes, the Force will continue to keep abreast of the development of information technology, enhance its capabilities in collecting intelligence, develop computer forensics technology, maintain links with the industry and overseas enforcement agencies, organize and launch anti-computer crime publicity activities etc. As the relevant estimated expenditure is included in the expenditure for Commercial Crime Bureau, no specific breakdown is available.
- (c) The 58 members in Technology Crime Division and 160 front-line officers in regions have already undertaken training in the investigation of technology crimes. In 2004-05, about 112 regional front-line officers will receive such training to enhance the Force's capabilities in detecting such crimes.

The estimated provision for Programme (1) Maintenance of Law and Order in the Community in 2004-05 is 3.3% lower than the revised estimate for 2003-04. This is mainly due to the civil service pay cut in 2004-05. The actual amount of resources allocated for the maintenance of law and order has not been reduced.

- (a) The Police will continue to conduct anti-burglary publicity activities to teach shopkeepers precautions against burglary and remind the public to keep their doors secured and take care of their property through publicity leaflets, posters and publicity buses. The Police will also maintain a close liaison with the property management sector to join efforts in burglary prevention. For the first two months in 2004, there has been an average of 629 burglary cases each month, 16.8% less than the monthly average of 756 cases in 2003. All police districts will continue to conduct patrols in areas where burglaries are likely to occur and stop check suspicious people for crime prevention.
- (b) The Police will continue to enforce the existing law to fight against illegal debt collection activities. Cases involving criminal activities will be followed up by crime investigation officers. Moreover, the Hong Kong Monetary Authority, in its "Code of Banking Practice", has also laid down guidelines for loan recovery and stipulated that the approved institutions should ensure that the debt collection agencies they hired do not collect debts by way of harassment or improper means.

- (d) burglary crimes.

Reply:

The estimated provision for Programme (2) "Prevention and Detection of Crime" in 2004-05 will be 2.2% lower than the revised estimate for 2003-04. This is mainly due to the civil service pay cut in 2004-05. The actual amount of resources allocated for the prevention and detection of crime has not been reduced.

- (c) In respect of the prevention and detection of criminal offences and non-criminal nuisance activities, the Police will continue to enforce the existing law to fight against illegal activities.
- (d) The Police will continue to conduct anti-burglary publicity activities to teach shopkeepers precautions against burglary and remind the public to keep their doors locked and take care of their property through publicity leaflets, posters and publicity buses. The Police will also maintain a close liaison with the property management sector to join efforts in burglary prevention. All police districts will continue to conduct patrols in areas where burglaries are likely to occur and stop check suspicious people for crime prevention.

The Controlling Officer's Report reflects our performance pledge, i.e. to clear 92% of passengers within 15 minutes for the Airport and 30 minutes for the land and sea control points. The actual performance achieved in 2003 is 99.7%, 99.5% and 99.7% respectively for these control points. We expect that the actual performance for 2004 will continue to exceed the pledged targets.

To cope with growing passenger and vehicular traffic, we will continue to improve the efficiency of immigration clearance through flexible redeployment of staff, streamlining of procedures and use of technology. Following the installation of Expeditious Immigration Clearance System in 2003, the Department will roll out the Automated Passenger and Vehicle Clearance Systems in phases from end 2004. The Finance Committee approved on 24 January 2003 the funding of \$352,753,000 under Head 710 - Computerization for implementing these systems. Additional annual recurrent expenditure arising from these systems is \$46,194,000. Necessary financial provisions are earmarked in the draft Estimates for 2004-05.

These include stepping up the vigilance of front-line staff and conducting detailed examination on suspicious visitors. To an extent, the effectiveness of these measures is reflected by the increase in the number of visitors refused entry. In 2003, a total of 27 655 visitors were refused entry into Hong Kong, as compared to 21 221 in 2002.

In 2004-05, we shall continue to step up these measures within our existing resources.

Reply:

Protection of job opportunities for local workers remains one of the top priorities of the Administration. In this connection, enforcement actions against hiring of illegal workers have been stepped up as reflected in the increase in the number of arrests and prosecution of illegal workers and their employers. In 2003, Immigration Department conducted 5 739 operations against illegal employment, representing an increase of 60% as compared to the 3 580 operations conducted in 2002. The number of arrests and prosecution made in 2002 and 2003 is shown below:

In parallel, an Inter-departmental Task Force was set up in April 2003 to strengthen crimeprevention measures and enforcement action against illegal activities, including illegal employment. Its membership includes the Security Bureau, Police, Immigration Department, Customs and Excise Department, Correctional Services Department, Labour Department, Lands Department and Food and Environmental Hygiene Department. Through close coordination and enhanced intelligence exchange, the Task Force has launched proactive and pre-emptive measures to identify black spots of illegal employment, strengthen enforcement actions and increase the number of joint operations among various departments in order to combat illegal employment in a focused manner.

We will adopt the following measures in the coming year in order to achieve better results in terms of prevention and tackling the problem at source:

(i) To strengthen control at immigration control points so as to keep away visitors whose bona fides are in doubt;

- (ii) To implement a facial recognition system to detect visitors seeking entry on false identities;
- (iii) To step up anti-illegal employment operations and joint operations involving all law enforcement agencies with a role to play;
- (iv) To hold capacity building seminars for property management companies so that they can help to prevent illegal decoration workers from entering public and private housing estates;
- (v) To step up publicity campaigns against the hiring of persons not lawfully employable and to enhance the efficiency in handling report from the public on illegal employment; and
- (vi) To maintain close liaison with the Mainland authorities so as to ensure that future visit applications of Mainland residents suspected, arrested or prosecuted for involvement in illegal activities would be carefully scrutinised.

The costs incurred by the above law enforcement efforts are not met through a specific provision but absorbed within the existing resources of the Departments concerned.

Enhancing visa-free access for HKSAR passport holders remains an on-going priority of the HKSARG. Currently, a total of 131 countries and territories have agreed to grant visa-free access to HKSAR passport holders. While we will continue to lobby for visa-free access to more countries, it is unrealistic to draw up any rigid schedule as visa-free access hinges on a variety of factors including immigration and security considerations, trade relations, reciprocity and circumstances of individual country or territory.

The Director of Immigration personally steers the visa-free lobbying work of the Immigration Department. Other senior officials of the Government also contribute towards the lobbying work when suitable opportunity arises. The costs incurred by these lobbying activities are not met by a specific provision but are absorbed by the Bureax/Departments concerned within their existing resources.

## Reply:

- (a) Business Visit Endorsements are issued to Mainland residents by Mainland Public Security Bureau Offices. We do not have information on the number of such endorsements issued by Mainland authorities.
- (b) In 2002 and 2003, 1 552 and 2 823 Business Visa Endorsement holders respectively were arrested for taking up unapproved employment. It is difficult to come up with a realistic estimate of the number of such arrests in 2004-05 because a variety of factors are at play. These include the economic situation, the prevailing labour market, the deterrent effects of penalties meted out by the court, public education, the intensity and the effectiveness of law enforcement and the co-operation of other relevant authorities.

(c) Protecting employment opportunities for the local workforce is a top priority for the Immigration Department as well as the Government as a whole. In this connection, an Inter-departmental Task Force was set up in April 2003 to strengthen crime-prevention measures and enforcement action against illegal activities, including illegal employment. Its membership includes the Security Bureau, Police, Immigration Department, Customs and Excise Department, Correctional Services Department, Labour Department, Lands Department and Food and Environmental Hygiene Department. Through close coordination and enhanced intelligence exchange, the Task Force has launched proactive and pre-emptive measures to identify black spots of illegal employment, strengthen enforcement actions and increase the number of joint operations among various departments in order to combat illegal employment in a focused manner.

We will adopt the following measures in the coming year in order to achieve better results in terms of prevention and tackling the problem at source:

- (i) To strengthen control at immigration control points to keep away visitors whose bona fides are in doubt;
- (ii) To implement a facial recognition system to detect visitors seeking entry on false identities;
- (iii) To step up anti-illegal employment operations and joint operations involving law enforcement agencies with a role to play;
- (iv) To hold capacity building seminars for property management companies so that they can help to prevent illegal decoration workers from entering public and private housing estates;
- (v) To step up publicity campaigns against the hiring of persons not lawfully employable and to enhance the efficiency in handling report from the public on illegal employment; and
- (vi) To maintain close liaison with the Mainland authorities so as to ensure that future visit applications of Mainland residents suspected, arrested or prosecuted for involvement in illegal employment activities would be carefully scrutinized.

The costs incurred by the above efforts are absorbed within the existing resources of the Departments concerned and not met through a specific provision.

In 2003, 27 655 visitors were refused permission to land.

The fact that a visitor seeking entry into Hong Kong is pregnant does not per se constitute a valid ground for refusal of permission to land. A pregnant visitor may still be allowed to enter Hong Kong if she is a bona fide visitor with a valid travel document.

The Removal Sub-division is responsible for removal of persons liable to be removed under the Immigration Ordinance, Cap. 115. In addition, the San Uk Ling Immigration Clearance Centre is responsible for processing and repatriating illegal immigrants from the Mainland. The total staff establishment of the Sub-division and the Centre is 98 (annual salary cost at \$30.5 million). There is no plan to change the establishment in 2004-05.

Reply:

Although the financial provision for Programme (2) for 2004-05 will be 2.7% lower than the 2003-04 Original Estimate, additional resources will in fact be provided under this Programme to fund the creation of 191 posts for strengthening immigration clearance services at existing control points and providing such services at the new Tuen Mun Ferry Terminal in 2004-05. The increase in provision can however be fully offset by the effect of the civil service pay cut as well as the deletion of 43 posts upon completion of time-limited projects and delivery of efficiency savings. This accounts for the decrease in provision for this Programme area in 2004-05.

To cope with growing passenger and vehicular traffic, we will continue to improve the efficiency of immigration clearance through flexible redeployment of staff, streamlining of procedures, improvement works and use of technology. For example, following the installation of Expeditious Immigration Clearance System in 2003, the Automated Passenger and Vehicle Clearance Systems will be rolled out in phases around end 2004.

As mentioned in the document, the work under Programme (5) in 2004-05 involves providing assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress outside Hong Kong. The estimated expenditure is \$5.6m and the staffing provision is 13. In this respect, the number of requests for assistance in 2003 is 1 470 and the number of such requests in 2004 is expected to be 2 200. In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee:

# Reply:

- (a) The Assistance to Hong Kong Residents Unit (AHU) comprises 1 Senior Immigration Officer, 2 Immigration Officers and 1 Clerical Assistant. Following a reorganization of duties in July 2003, the AHU comes under the line management of the head of the International Co-operation Section (ICS), who is a Chief Immigration Officer. To cope with the increasing workload, 3 Immigration Officers and 1 General Clerk have been redeployed to reinforce the Section.
- (b) Among the 1 470 request for assistance cases, there were 903 persons who were stranded in the Mainland for various reasons such as loss of travel documents, traffic accidents, hospitalization or being subject to criminal compulsory measures. We have no statistics on the number of persons who have returned to Hong Kong as a result of our efforts.
- (c) The establishment of ICS is set out in (a) above. To facilitate the discharge of their duties, the officers concerned will make reference to booklets on the "Introduction to Mainland Criminal Procedure" published by the Security Bureau, "Mainland Criminal Law and Regulations" published by the Beijing Office and "A Comparative Study Criminal Procedure in the Mainland and Hong Kong Special Administrative Region" jointly published by the Procuratorate Theory Research Institute of the Mainland, Department of Justice and Security Bureau. To an extent, the increase in refusal cases reflects the effectiveness of our preventive efforts.

Reply:

Following the implementation of the "Individual Visit Scheme" (IVS) since 28 July 2003, the number of Mainland visitors to Hong Kong has continued to grow. In 2003, the daily average arrival of Mainland visitors was 23 059, representing an increase of 24.2% over 2002. In the first two months of 2004, the average daily arrival of Mainland visitors surged to 32 050. We expect this figure to continue to grow as the IVS extends to cover the entire Guangdong province by May 2004 and to other Mainland cities progressively thereafter. We however do not have any specific estimate, as much would depend on the operation of market forces.

We will continue to improve conditions at our control points and to cope with the increase in workload arising from the implementation of IVS through flexible redeployment of staff, streamlining of procedures, improvement works and use of technology. How effective were the efforts in investigating the use or manufacture of forged travel documents by individuals or syndicates over the past year? Did such efforts successfully lead to the dissolution of any forgery syndicate?

Reply:

Combating the use of forged travel documents and preventing clandestine migrants from using Hong Kong as a springboard in their journey to destinated countries are priorities of the Immigration Department. Through heightened efforts at the airport and co-operation and joint operations with counterparts in Mainland and overseas, we have seen the number of forged travel document detected dropping by 13% from 3 549 in 2002 to 3 094 in 2003.

In a joint operation with the Police and Guangdong Public Security Bureau in November 2002, the Immigration Department cracked down a cross-boundary illegal syndicate soliciting Hong Kong residents to sell their HKSAR passports. The operation eventually led to successful prosecution of 9 persons in late 2002 and 2003.

In July 2003, 17 Mainland visitors being smuggled to South Korea and USA were found hiding inside a storeroom of a container vessel 'Hyundai Kingdom' at Kwai Chung Container Terminals. They were subsequently prosecuted and repatriated to the Mainland after imprisonment. Further liaison and intelligence exchange with the Fujian Public Security Bureau have led to the arrest of three syndicate members in Fujian who now await trial in the Mainland.

## Reply:

The number of requests for assistance increased from 994 in 2002 to 1 470 in 2003. Possible reasons are set out below:

- (a) With the partnership between Hong Kong and the Mainland getting strengthened and becoming more diversified on various fronts, more and more Hong Kong residents frequently travel to or live in the Mainland;
- (b) the increased occurrences of traffic accidents in the Mainland involving Hong Kong residents; and
- (c) with its hotline more widely publicized, the service of our Assistance to Hong Kong Residents Unit (AHU) has been well received by the public. For example, many Hong Kong residents who have lost their identity cards or home visit permits would approach the Immigration Department for assistance.

On receipt of a request for assistance in relation to Hong Kong residents in distress outside Hong Kong, the AHU will normally seek to establish contact and maintain close liaison with their family members in Hong Kong as a first step. Depending on the circumstances of individual cases, the AHU will also contact overseas Chinese Diplomatic and Consular Missions, the Office of the Commissioner of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the People's Republic of China in Hong Kong, the Office of the Government of the HKSAR in Beijing, relevant government departments and Mainland authorities, as well as private organizations such as airlines and the Travel Industry Council to render suitable assistance.

The AHU did its best to render assistance in respect of all cases where a request for such assistance had been made in 2003.

Question : In 2002, 91.8% of emergency calls could be met within the 12-minute target response time. The percentage rose to 93.2% in 2003 and then dropped to 92.5% in 2004. What are the reasons?

<u>Reply</u>: The performance pledge for ambulance service of the Fire Services Department is to respond to emergency ambulance calls within a response time of 12 minutes. The target is to meet this response time in 92.5% of all emergency calls.

In 2002, the total number of emergency ambulance calls was 505 980, representing an increase of 4.4% as compared with 2001. The response time performance was slightly below the pledged target because of the increase in the number of calls.

In 2003, the total number of emergency calls dropped to 478 109, representing a decrease of 5.5% as compared with 2002. This might be due to the effect of charging for Accident and Emergency Service and the SARS outbreak, which resulted in a decrease in public demand for using ambulance to convey patients/casualties to the Accident and Emergency Departments of hospitals. Furthermore, the Fire Services Department has implemented a series of management measures to better match the deployment of ambulance resources with service demand. These include the introduction of a staggered shift system, the establishment of an urgent care fleet, etc. As a result of the above, the response time performance in 2003 exceeded the pledged target.

It is expected that the overall demand for ambulance services will resume its rising trend in 2004. The Fire Services Department will continue to flexibly deploy ambulance resources and endeavour to meet the pledged performance target.

Reply: In 2004-05, the financial provision for ambulance service is 4.8% (or about \$41.6 m) lower than the Revised Estimate for 2003-04. The expenditure items with decrease in provision mainly include personal emolument and capital account. The reduction of provision for personal emolument is mainly due to the civil service pay cuts in 2004 and 2005. As for capital account, residual payment for the additional and replacement ambulances procured was fully or largely settled in 2003-04, resulting in a decrease in the cash flow requirement. The reduced provision for the above two items is partly offset by the additional provision required for filling of vacancies.

The reduction in provision will have no impact on the provision of ambulance service for Tung Chung. In 2003, there were only 3 075 emergency ambulance calls from Tung Chung, representing about 0.6% of the territory's total emergency calls. 97.1% of these calls were responded within the 12-minute target response time, which is 4.6% higher than the performance pledge target of 92.5%. The Fire Services Department will continue to closely monitor and flexibly re-deploy ambulance resources to meet service demand.

- <u>Reply</u>: The Third Generation Mobilizing System will replace the existing one. The new system, with enhanced functions and efficiency as compared with the existing system, comprises 21 sub-systems, including a computerized mobilizing system, a geographical information system, a wireless digital network, an automatic vehicle location system, an information management system, a calling line identification system, a telephone system, a mobile data terminal, etc.

As regards service quality, the new system will enable staff of the Fire Services Communication Centre to speedily confirm the address of the scene of incident, promptly turn out resources, and provide all relevant information to facilitate emergency operations. These are conducive to further enhancing the quality of fire and ambulance services.

As regards performance indicators, the new system can conduct a more accurate and effective search for appropriate resources, and a higher accuracy of resource mobilization can be achieved through the automation of certain intercommunication and information exchange procedures. The activation time for fire and that for ambulance operations are one minute and two minutes respectively. For fire operations, the current one-minute activation time is already a very quick response and there is little scope for further shortening. As for ambulance operations, we envisage that there may be scope for further improvement. Actual improvement will be subject to thorough assessment and analysis of all relevant data after the commissioning of the new system.

The new system will have no bearing on the number of fire stations. As for the manning scale of the Fire Services Communication Centre, it is anticipated that no additional console operators are required to cope with the increasing number of calls in the next ten years. As regards expenditure on equipment and public expenditure, the approved estimate for the new system is \$718.6 m, which is funded by the Capital Works Reserve Fund. Upon commissioning of the system, the Fire Services Department will require additional recurrent expenditure estimated at \$39.4 m each year.

Reply: The First Responder Programme is a value-added service provided by the Fire Services Department to the public at district level. Its objective is to deploy frontline fire-fighters who have received basic life support training to provide appropriate treatment to casualties/patients suffering from cardiac arrest, severe haemorrhage, absence of breathing or airway obstruction before the arrival of ambulance personnel. The Fire Services Department first launched the First Responder Programme in seven fire stations on a trial basis on 8 September 2003. The scheme will be extended to 28 fire stations by the end of this month. Taking into account training progress to date, we envisage that the Programme will be extended to 64 fire stations by end 2004.

The provision required for the full implementation of the First Responder Programme is about \$2.25 m, which will be mainly used for the procurement of essential tools and equipment. The expenditure will be met by departmental expenses.

The Fire Services Department has conducted a review of the programme after the 3month trial. All participating frontline fire-fighters were supportive to the Programme and the feedback from the public was positive. As such, the Department has decided to roll out the service to all districts by phases.

In addition, the above 13 cases were referred to the Fire Service Installation Contractors Disciplinary Board for disciplinary proceedings, of which nine have been completed. In accordance with the results of proceedings, the Department reprimanded the registered contractors concerned or removed their names from the register temporarily. The Department's expenditure on the community education programme in 2003–04 was about \$0.4 m.

Officers may be reimbursed the amount up to the specified ceilings. It is not a fringe benefit and is fully accountable. Before the 2004-05 Financial Year, rent allowance in respect of Customs and Excise Department was paid from Head 046 General Expenses of the Civil Service whereas rent allowance in respect of staff in other bureaux/departments who were on external postings was paid from the vote of the concerned bureaux/departments. To align the arrangement with the normal practice, starting from 2004-05, Customs and Excise Department will pay rent allowance for its own staff who are on external postings from its own vote.
- 2. The Department has seconded a senior inspector to work in the World Customs Organization Regional Intelligence Liaison Office for the Asia and Pacific Region in Beijing. Her job is to assist in the coordination and dissemination of intelligence on customs-related offences such as drug trafficking, smuggling, etc. among member administrations within the Region. The estimated provision for the Rent Allowance Scheme covers her rental expenses during 2004-05.



#### Reply:

The department has been operating under the one-line vote arrangement since 2002-03 which authorizes the controlling officer to utilise resources flexibly under Subhead 000 Operational Expenses to meet the requirements of the department. Despite the increasing demand for services of the department, the provision for the Operational Expenses for 2004-05 is \$29.8 million (or 1.6%) lower than the revised estimates for 2003-04. This has been achieved through containing the growth of the establishment of the department and providing our services through other means.

For 2004-05, the department has to undertake a number of new activities including the implementation of the Mainland and Hong Kong Closer Economic Partnership Arrangement, the strengthening of the cross-boundary services for passengers and vehicles and providing customs clearance services at the new Container Terminal No. 9 at Kwai Chung and new Tuen Mun Ferry Terminal.

Despite the above new requirements, the department would still manage to fulfil its obligations with a reduced number of staff. To enable us to do so, we have been adopting measures such as making use of more information technology systems (e.g. Electronic Data Interchange System for Cargo Manifests) to replace manual processes, installing specialist equipment (e.g. fixed and mobile x-ray systems) for the efficient examination of cargo and luggage, hiring of services and asking staff to work overtime when necessary to maximize our operational efficiency. This largely explains why we require less provision for salaries but more for departmental expenses and allowances within the overall reduced level of total Operational Expenses of the department.

- (a) The increase of \$0.875 million (or 10.7%) in Job-related Allowances in 2004-05 over the revised estimate for 2003-04 is mainly to meet the increased operational needs arising from the establishment of two new Explosives Detector Dog Teams, manning of the four new high speed pursuit crafts to strengthen maritime patrol duties for combating sea smuggling, and the increase in the requirement for undertaking driving and detective duties to strengthen enforcement action against Customs related offences.
- (b) The department has streamlined work procedures and reduced expenses and will continue to do so. The department exercises a tight control over the payment of Jobrelated allowances. Only where there are definite operational needs and where the specified payment criteria are met will the allowances be paid. About 75% of the MDMA tablets seized in 2003 were smuggled by drug couriers via the airport. Besides, small quantities of MDMA were smuggled via the land boundary control points. The high volume of seizure in 2003 was attributable to a significant case in which 22 542 tablets of MDMA were found from two Hong Kong men who were about to depart for Japan in January 2003.

2. The major sources of "ecstasy" are Europe and the Mainland.

3. The department takes the following measures in the suppression of the inflow of psychotropic drugs -

- (a) strengthening intelligence collection and analysis to support the application of risk management to achieve greater accuracy for screening and selection of passengers and cargoes for inspection;
- (b) enhancing cooperation and intelligence exchange with the Mainland and overseas enforcement agencies focusing on a pre-emptive approach to intercept psychotropic drugs before they reach Hong Kong;
- (c) stepping up enforcement actions by mounting joint/parallel operations with other law enforcement agencies in Hong Kong and the Mainland at various control points; and
- (d) enhancing anti-drugs publicity at control points.

- (b) There was an increase of 3 seizure cases of poisons/anti-biotics in 2003 when compared with that of 2002 but the volume (kg) and number of tablets seized had decreased significantly. What are the reasons?

Reply :

- (a) The substantial difference between the seizure figures in 2002 and 2003 was mainly attributable to the detection of two significant cases in 2002, which led to the seizure of large quantities of poisons and antibiotics (i.e. 12 kg and about 55 000 tablets of poisons and antibiotics).
- (b) Most of the cases detected in 2003 were related to pharmaceutical products brought in by Hong Kong citizens returning from their visits to the Mainland. In these cases, the offenders usually carried a small quantity of pharmaceutical products. This explains the drop in the total quantities of poisons and antibiotics seized despite a slight increase in the number of cases detected in 2003 as compared to 2002.

The deletion of posts will be achieved through organizational restructuring and work process re-engineering within the Department, including re-ranking of posts to allow for redistribution of duties; re-assessing job requirements and merging work areas to cut down manpower provision; and reducing staff resources in less essential services. All deletion of posts will be absorbed through natural wastage or internal redeployment.

- 2. The deletion of posts is not related to outsourcing of work.
- 3. After the reduction in staff establishment, the ratio of frontline staff (custodial staff in CSD's context) to inmates as compared with the existing one is summarized below:

1 staff : 3.4 inmates (as at 15.3.2004 before the deletion of 80 posts)

1 staff : 3.5 inmates (projected figure after the deletion of 80 posts)

There is no significant change in the ratio of staff to inmates.

4. The savings concerned are generally achieved through careful re-engineering of work processes, re-prioritizing of needs and re-organizing of departmental structure. We have also done extensive job-matching and introduced the use of technology where appropriate. By these methods, we would be able to maintain an acceptable standard of service after implementing the savings proposal. As there will be minimal change in the ratio of staff to inmates, there will be no significant impact on staff workload and work pressure.

To maintain the quality of service and staff morale, we will step up training and coaching to ensure that the quality of our staff will not be compromised while implementing the savings proposal. In fact, we have all along been maintaining a regular dialogue with all levels of staff, and review with them regularly on how best to ensure smooth delivery of our services.

#### Staff Allowances

The reduction of staff allowances provision from the revised \$43.99 m in 2003-04 to \$30.51 m in 2004-05 is mainly attributable to a reduction in the provision for Standby Duty Allowance. CSD has reviewed its operational needs and concluded that there is scope to reduce the number of Assistant Officers (AO) performing "Sleep-in Standby" duties in some CSD institutions. As a result, the maximum number of AOI & II who are required to perform "Sleep-in Standby" at CSD institutions every night will be reduced from 34 and 94 respectively in 2003-04 to 27 and 57 respectively in 2004-05. Standby duty allowance is payable on an hourly basis at a specified percentage of the officer's monthly salary. The allowance rate will be reduced in step with the civil service pay reduction which will take effect from 1 January 2005. The 2004-05 draft estimate for staff allowances provision has taken this factor into account.

- (c) The following measures have been carried out to alleviate the overcrowding problem in female penal institutions : -
  - (i) Conversion of the entire Ma Hang Prison by phases to provide 220 penal places for female prisoners. Works completed in February 2004.
  - (ii) Construction of sleeping accommodation to provide 80 additional penal places with associated workshop facilities for female inmates at Hei Ling Chau Addiction Treatment Centre (Annex). Works commenced in April 2003 for completion by April 2004.

Reply:

- (a) In the light of the attack on CSD staff at Stanley Prison on 26 January 2004, additional precautionary measures have been implemented to strengthen the management of dangerous prisoners. Adequate escort will be arranged and, where necessary, mechanical restraints such as handcuffs will be applied on a dangerous prisoner when he is taken to interview with visitors. CSD will ensure that there is no physical contact between such prisoner and the visitors anytime during the interview. Specially trained staff are assigned for the escort duties through internal deployment and no additional resources are required.
- (b) The revised estimate of the operating expenditure of CSD is \$2,578.5 m in 2003-04 and the average daily penal population is estimated at 12 632 persons.

It is difficult to provide an estimation of the average unit cost of detaining a prisoner. This is because apart from detaining prisoners, the day-to-day operation of CSD includes the admission and discharge of prisoners, escort of prisoners to and from courts and hospitals, transfer of prisoners in custody between penal institutions, handling visits to prisoners, provision of training and supervision in workshops, as well as medical and welfare services for prisoners. In addition, there are on average 3 000 discharged prisoners receiving aftercare counselling/supervision every day. Some of such services are not applicable to the penal population. If an estimation has to be made on the average daily cost of detaining a prisoner, a rough calculation is to divide the operating expenditure by the penal population and the corresponding figure in 2003-04 is \$558.

(c) CSD has not made such estimation.

(b) The authorities of the HKSAR and the Mainland commenced discussions on the arrangements for transfer of sentenced persons in March 2000. Because of the differences in the legal and judicial systems of the two places and the complexity of the issues involved, the discussions have not been completed. We will continue to pursue this subject with a view to reaching early agreement with the relevant Mainland experts on an appropriate arrangement for the transfer of sentenced persons between the HKSAR and the Mainland.

The transfer of a prisoner is subject to the conclusion of a satisfactory arrangement between the two governments concerned and the consent of the prisoner himself. It is not clear how many Mainlanders would apply to be transferred, even if a transfer arrangement with the Mainland were in place. Moreover as stipulated in all the transfer agreements that we have signed with other countries, the prospective transferee must have a balance of at least one year to serve at the time of the request for transfer. As of end 2003, the majority (61%) of all Mainlanders imprisoned in Hong Kong were serving a sentence of one year or less. We therefore expect that, overall, implementation of the transfer arrangement with the Mainland will not have a major impact on the size of our penal population.

- (c) The following expansion and improvement works will be carried out in 2004-05:-
  - (i) Victoria Prison

The Victoria Prison will be decommissioned to enable the release of its site at Central for tourism and heritage development. The Lai Chi Kok old staff married quarters will be converted into a 650-place temporary female prison for reprovisioning the penal places at Victoria Prison and to provide additional penal places to relieve overcrowding in female institutions. Works on the project started in March 2004 for completion by end 2005. The capital cost is about \$230 m.

#### (ii) Lai Chi Kok Reception Centre

The Department has proposed to construct additional dormitory accommodation at the Lai Chi Kok Reception Centre. The proposed project will provide additional sleeping accommodation and dayrooms for 144 remands. Subject to funding approval, the project is scheduled to commence in 2004 for completion in 2005. The capital cost of the project is about \$14 m.

Based on the penal population as of 19 March 2004, and assuming no change in the penal population, the overall occupancy rate of penal institutions will be reduced from 115.7% to 112.2% after completion of the above mentioned projects.

- (d) (i) The 'Reprovisioning of Victoria Prison at Lai Chi Kok Old Staff Married Quarters Site' project was approved by the Finance Committee in May 2003. No further submission to the Legislative Council is required.
  - Since the cost of the 'Proposed Additional Dormitory Accommodation at Lai Chi Kok Reception Centre' project is below \$15 m and within the ambit of Minor Building Works, submission to the Legislative Council for funding approval is not required.

- (a) The average daily number of young prisoners and inmates decreased from 1 128 in 2002 to 1 012 in 2003; and
- (b) As one of the preventive measures against Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) during its outbreak in 2003, all evening classes provided to the young inmates in drug addiction treatment centres and detainees of detention centre were suspended from mid-April to September 2003. This resulted in the decrease in the average daily number of young prisoners and inmates receiving education in 2003.

Reply:

The smart card patrol management system is one of the on-going projects to upgrade the surveillance systems in penal institutions/premises. The smart card system will replace the mechanical system used to record the visit history of patrol staff. As of March 2004, 21 penal institutions/premises have installed the smart card system. The remaining eight penal institutions/premises will install the new system in two phases in 2004 and 2005.

The smart card sytem is more user-friendly than the mechnical system and will enahnce the efficiency of patrol duties. The implementation of the smart card system will not reduce the frequency of visits to the required locations by patrol staff nor lower the level of direct supervision of inmates and prisoners.

## Reply:

- (a) Under the health surveillance programme drawn up to combat the SARS outbreak last year, the AMS assisted the Department of Health in temperature screening of all inbound and outbound travellers at the Hong Kong International Airport. This temperature screening service was subsequently extended to cover all travellers arriving at land and sea immigration control points, where an average of 350 AMS members were deployed daily until mid-November 2003. At the peak of the SARS outbreak, the AMS also mobilised members for duty at the medical stations set up in the Amoy Gardens, where they carried out temperature checks on residents and distributed SARS-related information. In addition, AMS members reinforced the staff at the four designated medical centres and the three isolation centres established under the mandatory medical surveillance programme for persons who had had close contact with SARS patients and the Amoy Gardens residents who were required to undergo the 10-day period of quarantine.
- (b) Starting from June 2003, AMS has provided training to members on handling infectious diseases, and as at today, 500 members have completed such training. Together with 260 doctors and nurses under the AMS establishment, there are a total of 760 volunteer members (representing 17.2% of the total number of AMS members) who have received training in handling infectious diseases. In 2004-05, AMS plans to include the infectious diseases training as part of the general regular training without incurring additional resources.

In order to take over AMS's duty of temperature screening of inbound and outbound travellers arriving at land and sea control points, DH recruited a large number of Health Surveillance Supervisors and Assistants in 2003 whose basic entry requirement was the possession of a valid first aid certificate. In anticipation of the decrease in number of Health Surveillance Supervisors and Assistants to be recruited by DH in 2004, the number of persons attending the first aid training in 2004 is estimated to be smaller than that in 2003.
- (b) As the first aid training provided by AMS are mainly for civil servants, there is no indicator to show the demand for first aiders in the community.

Those falling outside the pledged time are mainly due to inclement weather, time taken to obtain more details about the operation and urgent aircraft repair.

- (a) Among the 3,569 cases endorsed by the Independent Police Complaints Council (IPCC) in 2003, 212 (involving 286 allegations) were found to be substantiated. These cases involved 316 police officers.
- (b) In examining the complaint investigation reports submitted by the Complaints Against Police Office (CAPO), the IPCC may propose to re-classify the investigation results depending on the evidence available. In 2003, the IPCC raised 151 queries of this kind with CAPO. As a result of these queries, 105 investigation results were changed subsequently. All the investigation results concluded by CAPO in the year, except for one complaint case, were endorsed by the IPCC after its review and in the light of the amendments, explanation and clarification by CAPO. As regards the case in which no

consensus could be reached with the Police regarding the classifications of the allegations, the IPCC has made a report to the Chief Executive.

- (c) The imposition of disciplinary action and warning on police officers is the prerogative of the Commissioner of Police. The IPCC may, however, comment on whether the level of the disciplinary action or warning is commensurate with the gravity of the misconduct. The IPCC made 24 such comments in 2003. Of these, 22 (91.7%) were accepted by the Police and 2 (8.3%) were satisfactorily explained/followed-up. The IPCC had no further question about the disciplinary action or warning imposed on police officers after explanation or clarification was furnished by the Police and made no suggestion in this regard to the Commissioner of Police or the Chief Executive in 2003.
- (d) It is anticipated that the number of complaint cases considered in 2004 will be similar to that for 2003. As regards the complaint investigation results, since each and every complaint case has to be examined on its own merits, it is not possible to predict the proportion of complaint cases that will be substantiated.

- a. In 2003, the Beijing Office handled 4 cases of missing Hong Kong residents in the Mainland. In all cases, the Hong Kong residents had been found. The breakdowns of the cases were as follows:
  - i) place of occurrence: 2 cases in Shenzhen, 2 cases in Tianjin;
  - ii) reasons of missing: arrest (2 cases), mental illness (1 case), business dispute (1 case).
- b. From March 1999 to 29 February 2004, there was still one outstanding missing person case, which involved a mentally retarded child, reported missing in August 2000.

c. From March 1999 to 29 February 2004, 12 missing persons reported to the Beijing Office had been found. Five of them were found by the Public Security Department, four found to be under arrest, two returned to Hong Kong on their own, and one withdrawal of request for assistance by family members.

Regarding the cases of Hong Kong people being detained in the Mainland, please provide details on the following:

- a. the number of cases for which assistance was sought in 2003, with a breakdown by the departments and Mainland authorities to which the cases were referred;
- b. the number of cases for which assistance was sought from the Beijing Office but the person concerned was still being detained, with a breakdown by detention time, reason for detention or nature of cases;
- c. the number of cases for which assistance was sought from the Beijing Office and the person concerned was allowed to leave the Mainland, with a breakdown by reason of being allowed to leave the Mainland or nature of the cases.

Reply:

a. In 2003, the Beijing Office received 96 requests for assistance involving detention cases. The Beijing Office sent letters to the relevant Mainland authorities according to the case nature and requests of family members. A total of 339 letters were issued, as follows- People's Courts (121), People's Procuratorates (72), Public Security Departments (48), Customs (10), Bureau for Letters and Calls (16), National People's Congress Standing Committee/ National Committee of Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (26), People's Government Offices (8), Prison/Detention Centre (20), Committee of Political Science and Law under the Communist Party of China Central Committee/Central Committee of Communist Party of China Central Committee Inspection (13), Ministry of Foreign Affairs (1), Provincial Justice Department (1), Hospital (3).

b. From March 1999 to 29 February 2004, 38 detention cases which sought assistance from the Beijing Office were still under detention. The period of detention of these 38 cases were (with the number of cases in brackets) : less than one year (26); between one to two years (6); between two to three years (6).

The reasons for detention were (with the number of cases in brackets): fraud/illegal operation/false capital contribution (13), smuggling/tax evasion (11), trafficking/possession of narcotics (4), misuse of office tort/misappropriation (2), murder (4), robbery (1), organizing illegal migration (1), breach of state order (1), giving away information without authorization (1).

c. From March 1999 to 29 February 2004, there were 187 cases which sought assistance from the Beijing Office with the persons concerned eventually allowed to leave the Mainland. Reasons for their release were (with the number of cases in brackets): discharged after serving sentence (77), released/acquitted (72), released on bail (38).

Question:

According to the Estimates, provision of full-time and part-time training for volunteers to ensure high standard of performance will be reduced from the actual man-hours of 96 960 in 2003 to the planned man-hours of 47 000 in 2004-05. At the same time, the Civil Aid Service will decentralize about 40% of the courses being run by the Training School and incorporate them into regular training of individual units. Could the Government inform us of the following: -

- (a) How much could it be saved through decentralization of training courses? What mechanism does the Department possess to ensure the performance quality in providing emergency services?
- (b) The target man-hours of training are reduced by over 50% when compared with the actual man-hours in the last year; whereas about 40% of the training will be decentralized and incorporated into individual units. Does it imply that actual training hours for volunteers will be reduced by 10%? Does such arrangement involve reduction of expenses?
- (c) What is the estimated cost of providing performances for major government activities? Please explain why the performance expenses are not reduced while the training hours are largely deducted.
- (d) There will be no change to the establishment of the Department in the next year while the training hours are largely reduced. Please provide the number of staff in the Department responsible for providing training to the volunteers and explain why there is no reduction of those training staff due to reduction of training hours.

Reply:

(a) Decentralizing 40% of the courses being run by the Training School and incorporating them into the regular training of individual units would achieve an estimated saving of \$1,500,000. The following measures will ensure the performance quality in providing emergency services: -

- The CAS Training School will centrally administer the training manuals used by individual units and train up sufficient instructors for them to conduct training on the decentralized subjects.
- Individual units are required to submit quarterly unit training programmes to ensure that the decentralized subjects are properly included.
- CAS Training School inspectors and permanent training staff of the Department will periodically inspect the unit training sessions.
- Examinations will continue to be centrally organized by the CAS Training School.
- (b) In the year 2003, full-time and part-time training provided by the CAS Training School amounted to 96 960 man-hours, which is more than the target of 78 000 manhours for the year. It was mainly because two instead of one recruit courses had to be run to meet the need to fill 500 vacancies. There is no direct relationship between the figure of 50% in reduction of planned training man-hours and the figure of 40% in decentralization of courses for incorporation into regular training of individual units.
- (c) The planned 8 000 man-hours in providing performances for the public on major government campaigns and activities bear an estimated cost of \$384,000. There is no plan to reduce this expense because staging performances to enhance public attention to major campaigns or activities organized by government departments and outside agencies is one of the duties of the Service.
- (d) Restructuring of training mode will not reduce the workload of the 38 permanent training staff of the Department. More effort will be required from them in supporting the Training School and in monitoring the unit training sessions.

- (a) On Lantau Island, the unit at Mui Wo Government Offices will move to share the same office with the unit at Tung Chung Post Office Building.
- (b) In Shatin, the units at Lek Yuen Estate, Mei Lam Estate and Sha Kok Estate will move to share a new office at Shatin Government Offices.
- (c) In Tuen Mun, the unit at Tai Hing Estate will move to share the same office with the unit at Tuen Mun Government Offices.

The regrouping in fact aims at enhancing efficiency in administering the cadet units.

- Question: Regarding the performance target for nuclear safety, what will be done to ensure the availability of fully-trained and competent officers round the clock to provide an immediate response to an initial alert. Is there any indicator for the response time? Is there any plan to upgrade the target in 2004-05 and what are the estimated resources involved?
- Asked by: Hon. WU King-cheong, Henry

Reply: Since 1985, EMSD has been providing regular local and overseas nuclear engineering training to in-house staff to support the Daya Bay Contingency Plan. In the past five years, we arranged overseas nuclear engineering training courses for four engineers. In April 2004, we will send two engineers for a 4-week nuclear energy training programme to be held in Korea. Further local training will also be planned in 2004-05 financial year. Hence, there are adequate trained staff within EMSD to cater for an immediate response in the unlikely occurrence of any emergency at the Guangdong Nuclear Power Station or LingAo Nuclear Power Station.

At present, there are one senior engineer and two engineers specially assigned to respond to nuclear emergency or alert on a round-the-clock basis. They are provided with radio pagers and mobile telephones to facilitate performing their jobs. Each engineer takes turn as the duty officer on a monthly basis to serve as the first point of contact. The directorate staff in the Department are also equipped with mobile telephones for backup purpose. It is always our target to provide an immediate response to an initial alert. There is no plan to increase the existing resources for this service.
