Progress of measures to improve environmental hygiene in Hong Kong

Purpose

This paper briefs Members on measures taken by respective departments to improve the environmental hygiene in Hong Kong since the issue of the Final Team Clean Report in August 2003.

Background

- 2. The Chief Executive announced the establishment of Team Clean in May 2003 and tasked the Chief Secretary to develop and take forward proposals for entrenching a high level of public and environmental hygiene in Hong Kong. The 'Interim Report on Measures to Improve Environmental Hygiene in Hong Kong' and 'Report on Measures to Improve Environmental Hygiene in Hong Kong' were published in end May and early August 2003 respectively setting out the various recommendations which should be implemented.
- 3. One of the recommendations of the 'Report on Measures to Improve Environmental Hygiene in Hong Kong' is to task the Home Affairs Department (HAD) to play the central co-ordinator role in spearheading inter-departmental

efforts in district hygiene improvement as well as in community involvement

and civic education. This is to sustain the intensive efforts of Team Clean

following the disbandment of the core team, and to enable the spirit of Team

Clean to take root in the community. A Steering Committee on Team Clean

Follow-up has been set up under the Home Affairs Bureau/HAD to monitor

and review progress made on Team Clean measures.

5. Under the charge of the Steering Committee on Team Clean Follow-

in entrenching a high standard of personal and public hygiene.
