Re: Defining "indoor"

Dear Hon. Members,

You have heard that it would take tornado force winds to reduce the pollution from tobacco smoke inside a building to safe levels. Yet, outside a building under a roof or cover, tobacco smoke may still be hazardous to health.

To prevent arguments and any legal challenges to loopholes in the definition of "indoor" we propose a quantifiable definition, that is not open to interpretation:


4. Interpretation

"indoor" (..) means—

- a) having a ceiling or roof, or a cover that functions (whether temporarily or permanently) as a ceiling or roof; and
- i) completely or substantially enclosed (whether temporarily or permanently), except for any window or door, or any closeable opening that functions as a window or door; or
 - ii) partially enclosed or unenclosed; and

NOT certified under the Hong Kong Indoor Air Quality Certification Scheme during normal operations when tobacco smoke is present.

This definition meets both the letter and the spirit of the proposed amendment.
