Proposed arrangements for the debate on the 2005 Policy Address

Purpose

This paper informs the House Committee (HC) of Members' views on the arrangements for the debate on the 2005 Policy Address (the 2005 Debate) proposed by the Committee on Rules of Procedure (CRoP), and invites HC to consider CRoP's recommendations.

Background

- 2. At its meeting held on 11 November 2004, CRoP agreed that:
 - (a) subject to agreement by Members and the Administration, the arrangements for the debate on the 2004 Policy Address should be adopted for the 2005 Debate to be held from 26 to 28 January 2005, two weeks after the delivery of the 2005 Policy Address on 12 January 2005. Details of the arrangements are as follows:
 - (i) the 2005 Debate should adopt the "3-day-5-session" format, i.e. a total of five debate sessions should be held on three consecutive days. Each debate session should be devoted to one group of policy areas. The number of debate sessions in each day should depend on the length of the debate on each group of policy areas. The grouping of policy areas should be agreed between the Administration and HC;
 - (ii) policy briefings for Panels should be held after the delivery of the 2005 Policy Address and before the commencement of the 2005 Debate;

- (iii) each day of the Debate should start at 2:30 pm and end at 10:30 pm, but should be extended to 11:00 pm where necessary;
- (iv) subject to the total speaking time limit of 20 minutes, and provided that no Member may speak after the designated public officer(s) has/have spoken, a Member can speak once in each of the five debate sessions;
- (v) the HC Chairman may speak for more than once in the fifth session on the amendment(s) and in reply respectively. The HC Chairman, as mover of the motion for the 2005 Debate, should have an additional 15-minute speaking time for moving the motion and in reply. If there is/are amendment(s) to the motion, another five minutes to speak on the amendment(s) should be allowed;
- (vi) after Members' speeches in each session, there should be a 10-minute suspension of the Council meeting for the Administration to coordinate its response;
- (vii) the total speaking time limit for designated public officers in each debate session should be -
 - (a) for one or two officers, each officer may speak for not less than 15 minutes, subject to the total speaking time limit of 45 minutes. Under this arrangement, where two officers are to speak, the officer speaking first should not speak for more than 30 minutes, leaving at least 15 minutes for the other officer. Subject to such a restriction, it should be up to the officers to determine their order of speaking and actual speaking time; and
 - (b) for three or more officers, it should be calculated on the basis of 15-minute speaking time limit for each officer; and
- (viii) the timing and manner in which the Policy Address-related publications are released, as decided by the Administration, should not cause inconvenience to Members; and
- (b) Members' views on the arrangements should be collected for consideration by CRoP at its meeting to be held on 7 December 2004.

Members' views on the proposed arrangements

- 3. 59 Members responded to the questionnaire on the proposed arrangements. Their views are detailed in **Appendix I**.
- 4. Members' views on the proposed arrangement set out in paragraph 2(a)(iv) above are as follows:
 - (a) 29 Members support the proposed arrangement;
 - (b) 26 Members suggest that the speaking time limit for each Member should be 30 minutes;
 - (c) two Members have no comment on the proposed arrangement;
 - (d) one Member has no particular view on the speaking time limit for each Member and considers that subject to the time limit, each Member can choose to speak once or more than once in each session; and
 - (e) one Member does not support the proposed arrangement or give reasons for that.

A number of the Members suggesting the 30-minute speaking time limit also have suggestions on the proposed arrangements regarding the number of days and the duration of each day of the 2005 Debate set out in paragraph 2(a)(i) and (iii) above respectively.

5. The majority of Members support the other proposed arrangements set out in paragraph 2(a)(ii) and (v) to (viii) above.

CRoP's recommendations

- 6. Having considered the above views at its meeting on 7 December 2004, CRoP agreed to the following:
 - (a) the proposed arrangements set out in paragraph 2(a)(i), (iii) and (iv) should be adjusted to meet the following requirements:
 - (i) the number of days for the 2005 Debate should be kept to three:
 - (ii) the starting times for the first day and the other two days should be 2:30 pm and 9:00 am respectively;

- (iii) meal breaks should not be provided on any of the three days; and
- (iv) the scheduled ending time for each day may be extended for a period of not more than 30 minutes where necessary, provided that the total duration of the Debate will not be exceeded;
- (b) the following three options on adjustments to the speaking time limit and ending time of each day of the Debate, which meet the above requirements, should be presented to HC for consideration;
